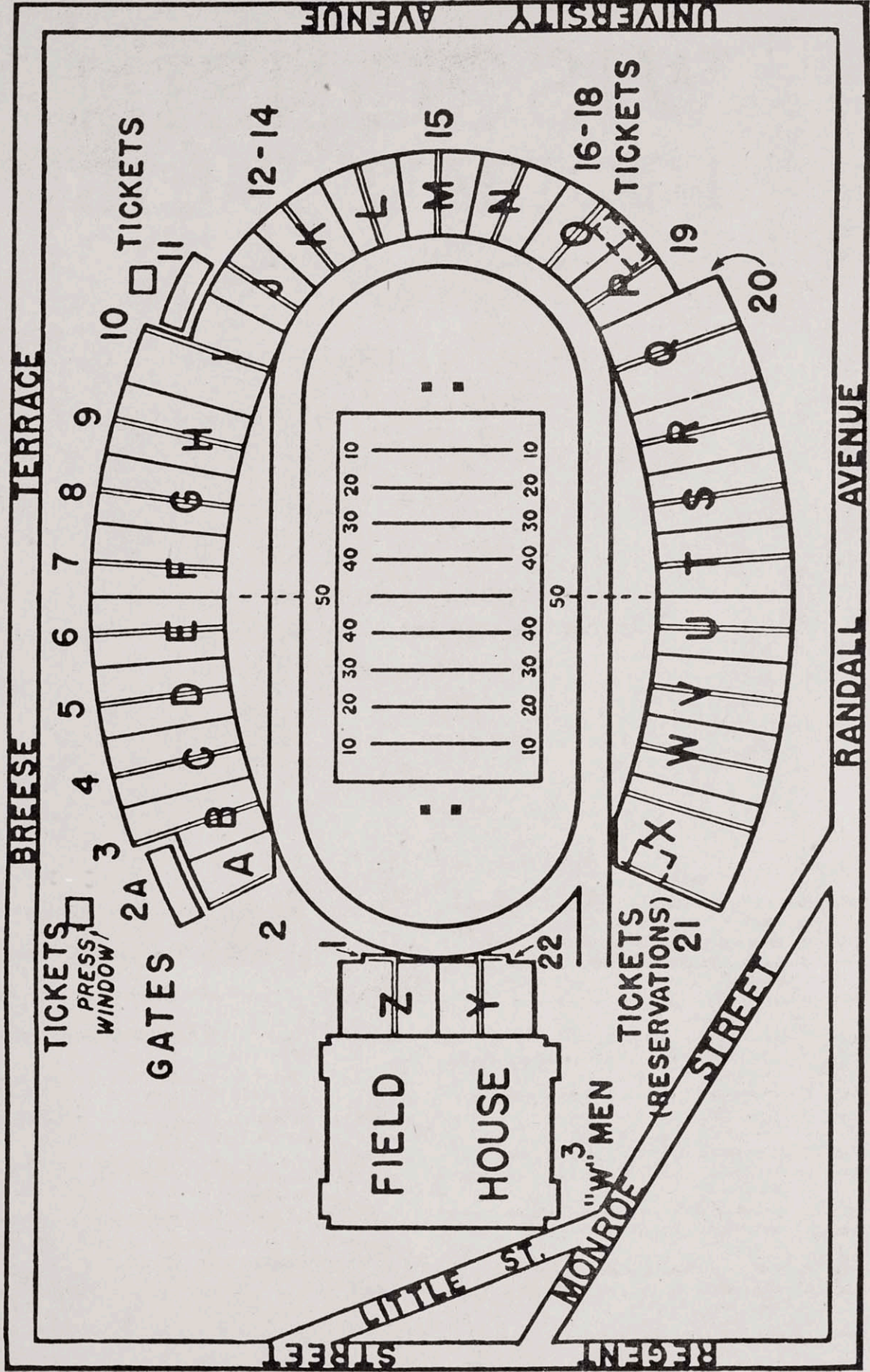

Harry Stuhldreher

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR and HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

HARRY STUHLBREHER, athletic director and head football coach at Wisconsin since 1936, opens his 12th season as pilot of Badger grid fortunes this fall.

A graduate of Notre Dame in 1925, he was a unani-

mous choice for All-American honors while a member of the famous Four Horsemen backfield on the teams coached by Knute Rockne, and he still rates as the most brilliant field general who ever piloted the Fighting Irish eleven. *(continued on next page)*

Stuhldreher Began Coaching Career in 1925

Stuhldreher went directly into coaching in the fall of 1925, guiding the fortunes of Villanova College for the next 11 years. In that time, he raised the football standards of Villanova from mediocrity to a position among the best of its class in the East. His 11-year record there included 65 victories as against 25 losses and 10 ties.

Coming to Wisconsin in May, 1936, Stuhldreher quickly established himself as among the most astute mentors in the toughest league in the nation—The Big Ten. His first Badger team won only two out of eight games in 1936 but improved rapidly in 1937, winning four, losing three, and tying one. A victory over UCLA at Los Angeles highlighted the 1938 season which included five wins as against three setbacks. A loss in the final game of that season cost Wisconsin Big Ten title honors, Minnesota stopping the Badger bid.

The team of 1939 could only win one game, losing six, and tying one. An even break in eight games followed in 1940, Columbia's last minute 7-6 win keeping Wisconsin from a winning season.

High scoring ability by the Badgers was not enough to win more than three games in eight starts in 1941. Wisconsin averaged 18 points a game but its opponents more than matched that. The Badgers lost to Ohio State 46-34 and to Syracuse 27-20, after beating Indiana 27-25, just to give an example of the touchdown parades.

The season of 1942, however, tops Stuhldreher's first decade of coaching here. The Badgers won eight games, tied one, and lost only one, a surprise 6-0 upset by Iowa which cost Wisconsin the mythical national championship as well as Big Ten title laurels. Elroy Hirsch, left halfback, and Pat Harder, sterling fullback, were just two of a host of players who ranked with the best in the country.

The wartime years of 1943 and 1944 found Wisconsin playing interesting football but not a too successful brand. The Badgers won only one out of nine games in 1943 and three out of nine in 1944. In 1945 Wisconsin won three, lost four, and tied two, a victory at Minnesota climaxing the season. Last fall, Wisconsin won three out of its first four games, but when key players were injured, the Badger fortunes faded. The season record was four wins and five losses.

Stuhldreher also has a fine record as athletic director. Under his leadership, a well-rounded development of all sports and all sports facilities has come about at Wisconsin. Chief among his accomplishments are the addition of a second balcony in the field house, making it one of the finest sports arenas in the Midwest, the addition of 7,500 seats in the football stadium, and the building of new team quarters for boxing, wrestling and rifle ranges under the east side of the stadium. He also plans a great sports hall and gymnasium in the future.

Equally impressive is Stuhldreher's record as goodwill agent for the entire University of Wisconsin. In the last decade he has spoken before practically every Badger alumni club from New York to California. He also is much in demand among state high schools, service clubs, and various other organizations. His travel mileage on speaking engagements annually runs into five figures.

A native of Massillon, Ohio, Stuhldreher was graduated from Massillon High School in 1921, and that fall entered the University of Notre Dame. As a high school gridman, Harry was a midget, weighing a puny 130 pounds, and offering no immediate signs of the brilliance and ruggedness which made him one of the Notre Dame "greats."

His freshman record at the Irish institution was not exceptionally conspicuous, except for the determination he showed in overcoming the deficiencies his size and weight had over his desire to play varsity football. A vigorous spirit and a constant persistency combined with a keen intelligence eventually attracted the attention of Coach Knute Rockne, and the midget Stuhldreher finally got his chance at varsity rating in his sophomore year.

Thereafter, Harry Stuhldreher was a regular and one of the outstanding field generals of intercollegiate football. His forward passing ability, his deadly and accurate blocking, and his trigger-judgment in the midst of hair-raising emergencies eventually ended in his selection as All-American quarterback, following his piloting of Notre Dame's immortal "Four Horsemen" in the 1924 season. Of Stuhldreher, Coach Rockne said: "Harry made one error in generalship in his sophomore year. He never made another."

Badger Mentor Well Known as Speaker, Author

Stuhldreher's proficiency is not one-sided. With the versatility he exhibited on the gridiron and in coaching togs, he is just as diverse in his cultural achievements. In the field of fiction, several of his stories have appeared in such national magazines as the Saturday Evening Post and Colliers, most popular of these being "Bench Warmer", "Off Guard", and "Gravy Game". He is the author of two books: "Knut Rockne, Man Builder", a biography of his great coach, and "Quarterback Play", in the Harvard University library publications.

His article debate with "Pop" Warner, veteran Temple University coach, in the Post on the question: "Is the Notre Dame System 'Slipping'?", won a favorable comment on all sides and he wrote critical comment on football for a press syndicate for three years. Most ambitious effort in the field of fiction was his novel, "Blocking Back", running serially in the American Magazine.

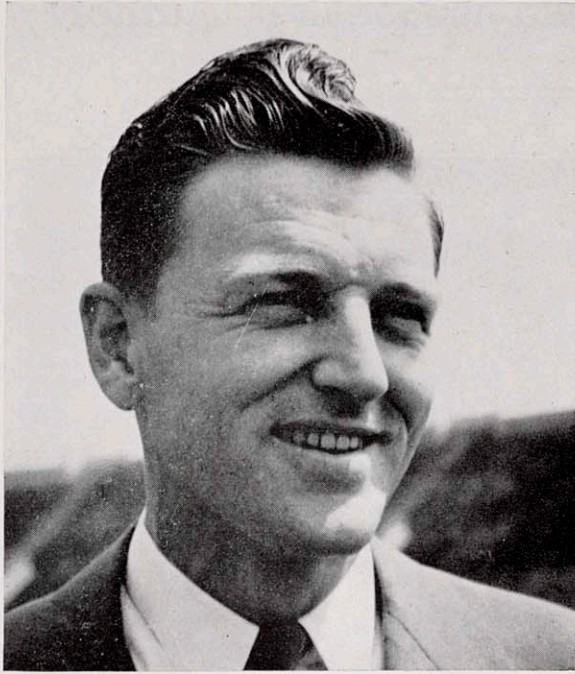
The Badger leader is married and the father of four boys. The oldest, Harry, Jr., is a senior at Madison West High School, plays football, and won his letter in 1946 as quarterback and also as a pole vaulter in 1946-47.

End and Tackle Coach George Fox

Wisconsin ends since 1937 have been among the outstanding wingmen in the Big Ten. Much of the credit for the fine performances for their work belongs to George Fox. In fact, they have been his only students in his coaching career, but he made the big jump from playing to big time assistant coaching with the same unassuming ease which characterizes him in all his activities. He learned his college football under Stuhldreher when the quarterback of the former Four Horsemen was coaching at Villanova. Fox also moved into the job of tutoring Wisconsin tackles in 1942.

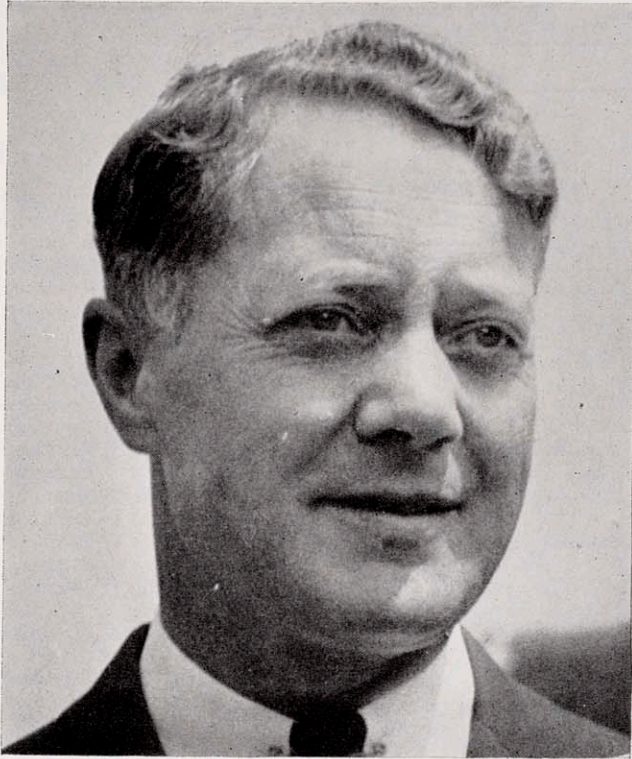
Assistant Football Coaches

Backfield Coach Guy M. Sundt

Guy Sundt, one of the greatest plunging backs and kickers ever to represent Wisconsin, closed four years of gridiron activity with Cardinal elevens in 1921 when he was captain. Upon graduation he became athletic director at Ripon College for two years. Returning to his alma mater in 1924 he has remained in Madison ever since in some capacity with the Badger athletic department. He has continuously been freshman track coach since that time and up until the 1936 season he worked with either the varsity or freshman football squads. When Harry Stuhldreher came to Wisconsin, Sundt gave up his football activities to move into the job of assistant athletic director, but he became an assistant football coach again in 1942.

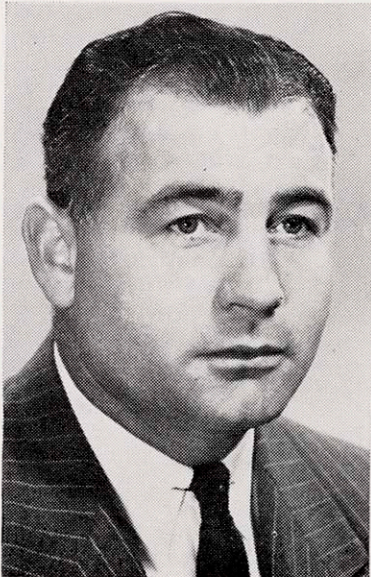


RUSS RIPPE

Guard and Center Coach Russell Rippe

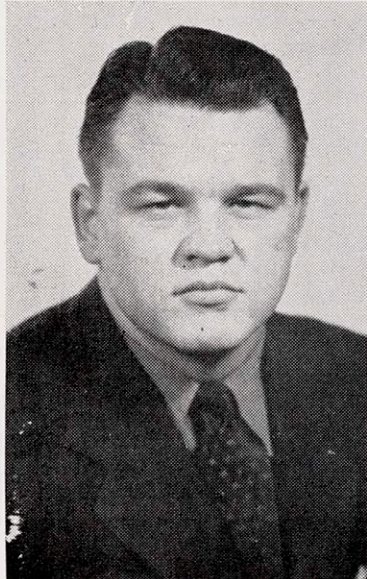

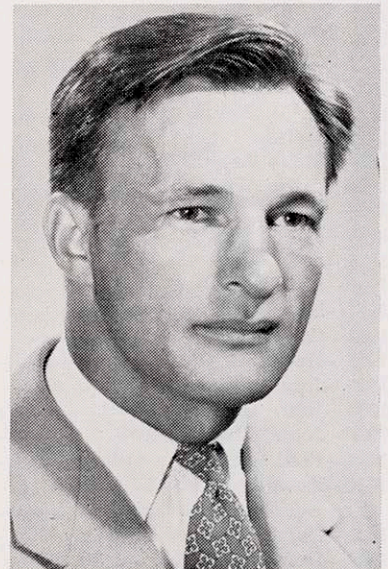
GEORGE LANPHEAR

Badger Football Biographies

STANLEY BECHTEL now makes his home in Waukesha but his prep athletic career took place at Chaska, Minn., where he was born. Last year he was a quarterback on Coach Frank Jordan's junior varsity eleven where he earned his numerals. With Chaska high school he played basketball, baseball, and was all-conference left halfback on the 1938 Minnesota Valley Football championship team. Stan is married and his scholastic ventures are in the field of civil engineering.

BEN BENDRICK, burly fullback, was the Badgers' leading scorer last season, scoring 30 points on five touchdowns. Besides this, he was second only to Earl Maves in rushing with 4.94 yard average. Big Ben is one of Coach Win Brockmeyer's products at Wausau high school where he was all-conference fullback in 1943 and 1944 and was nominated the best athlete in 1944. Besides his football achievements, he earned prep letters in hockey and basketball. He is studying to be a forest ranger and showed his proficiency this spring as a log-roller by winning first prize in a log-rolling contest at the annual Madison Sports Show.

TOM BENNETT doubles in high class athletic performances in football and track. This former Green Bay West athlete capped his achievements this spring by sharing the Big Nine pole vault championship. However, his best mark of the year in that event was a 14 foot 2½ inch jump he made in a meet against Iowa. Last fall as a freshman he started most of the games at left end for the varsity and was also used as a punter where he averaged 39.23 yards in 13 attempts. Twenty-two of his army months were spent in France, Luxembourg, and Germany and despite that, his conference championship in the pole vault, and his 14 foot 2½ inch jump, his greatest thrill was a 13 foot vault made in high school.

BOB BENNIE, another Green Bay product, earned a minor "W" as a right halfback on the 1946 Badger squad, but during Spring practice was tried at quarterback and performed so capably that he will probably be a decided asset to Coach Stuhldreher's generalship corps. Bob once played with Wentworth

Military Academy which shared the 1942 interstate Missouri conference title.

LISLE BLACKBOURN JR. prepped at Milwaukee Washington high school where he was a three sports star with exceptional ability as a football player and in track. He still holds the WIAA 200 yard dash record and was an all-state selection in football. In his first season on the Wisconsin football squad last fall, "Blackie" performed at the left halfback spot and was one of the Badgers' best passers. His adept toe booted 15 placements after touchdowns for the only Badger points in that column. This fall Coach Stuhldreher will move him from the left half spot to quarterback to make better use of his abilities.

EDWIN BRUHN, sophomore from Merrill, is spending his first year on a Wisconsin football squad. During his service in the navy he played on the Fort Pierce Amphibian football team. Ed is one of the most versatile athletes on the squad having turned in top flight performances in basketball, golf, tennis, hockey, swimming, boxing, and football while in high school. He is also a nifty on skis and he says that skiing has given him some of his greatest sports thrills. His ambition is to become a coach.

GAIL BUTT, better known to his teammates as "Whitey," hails all the way from Miamisburg, Ohio, where he was a star performer for two years on the football team which won Miami Valley championships in 1941 and 1942. "Whitey" earned his numerals on the 1946 Badger junior varsity eleven performing as a guard and despite 180 pounds which is packed into five feet and only five inches, he is making a determined bid for a high spot on the 1947 pigskin machine.

GWYNN CHRISTIANSEN was an athletic standout at Lake Mills where he won 11 letters. As a halfback coached by such well known former Badger athletes as Joe Capicek, Harley Graf, and Andy Smith, Gwynn earned four letters and gloried in the Rock River Valley championships in 1940 and 1941. He played forward on the basketball team for three years and won four letters in golf. Twenty-seven months in the air corps kept him busy while he was in the navy.

NICK COLLIAS will be remembered by football fans for his high class performance in the Northwestern game, his first game in a cardinal uniform back in 1944. Soon after that football season he was inducted into the army and was discharged this spring. He prepped at Fenwick high school in Chicago where he played guard for three years on the football team being mentioned on Chicago's all-city team. He was also the 175 pound boxing champ. Nick will be a valuable addition to Coach Russ Rippe's squad of guard candidates.

T. A. COX has the oddity of having no given name, only initials. This 200 pound fullback comes all the way from Texarkana, Texas, which gives his buddies the right to call him "Tex." Used last year mostly as a punter, "Tex" distinguished himself by being the second best punter in the Big Nine with an average of 39.9 yards in 46 boots. Although he carried the ball only three times he had a total yardage of 42 yards.

KENNETH CURRIER, burly guard who played his high school football at Rice Lake, received a gash on the knee in the Northwestern game last year and was lost to the Badgers for the remaining six games. He was a standout on the 1942 cardinal squad being named on the sophomore all-western eleven. During service in the army, he was an Air Force pilot.

DAVID DONNELLAN will be making a bid for a regular tackle berth with a lot of experience behind him from playing with the 1942 Badgers and last year's junior varsity eleven, both years of which he was awarded minor letters. Dave played end while prepping at Eau Claire and also won letters in basketball, track, and baseball. He served three years in the army with the infantry. Two more years of varsity competition remain for him and on graduation he hopes to pursue labor relations as a career.

ROBERT DOWNING came to Wisconsin last year from Kenosha where he performed with the Big Eight football champs of 1945. He was named all-conference center and was picked to play with the South in the prep all-star game of 1946 where he shared individual center honors with Bob Wilson. Last fall he performed with the varsity squad until the latter part of the season when he shifted over to the junior varsity. He is enrolled as a pre-law student and some day hopes to be a Supreme Court Justice. His national honor scholastic standing gives him a head start to this goal.

WALTER DREYER spent three years with the marines and part of that time in the Pacific Theater but he still thinks his greatest thrill was the 92 yard touchdown kickoff return against Illinois last fall. Wally was on the great 1942 Wisconsin freshman team and then moved over to Michigan as a marine trainee where he played right half. He comes from Milwaukee where he played his high school football at Washington and Milwaukee University schools. At Washington he was named co-captain in 1940 and in 1942 was track captain at the latter school.

GENE EVANS is a 154 pound mite from Green Bay who proved his mettle with the Badgers last fall as a freshman. Although used only as a "spot" player, Gene performed capably in the kicking, passing and running department. His three punts averaged 42.33 yards, he completed four of ten passes, and has a rushing average of 3.55 yards. Football, basketball, baseball, and track occupied his time in Green Bay

West high school where he won 12 letters. He graduated from there with honors and is now in the school of journalism and later would like to go into radio work.

MIKE FISHER, 28-year-old fullback from Chicago, has won two minor "W's" at Wisconsin, the first of which was as a freshman in 1942. He played on the Tilden Tech high school team which won the Chicago city championship in 1938. Besides this he captured the city's 175 pound wrestling title. In 1945 he was a member of the Gulfport Army Air Base football team.

JERRY FREI of Stoughton earned himself a regular starting guard position by his vicious play last year. He first played with Wisconsin in 1942 and then spent three years in the army air corps. He has a record of 67 missions as a P-38 photo-reconnaissance pilot in the Pacific theater.

BOB FREUND hopes some day soon to be a flourishing florist. If you think, however, that he is a softie, don't meet this 210 pound husky on the football field or the wrestling mat, he will soon show you different. Bob is making a big bid for a tackle assignment and Wrestling Coach George Martin is waiting for the end of the football season so that he can use the well-coordinated Milwaukee boy as his first string heavyweight.

WRAY GEORGE is a Madison lad who was all-city guard from East high school in 1943. He has played three consecutive years as a guard under the Wisconsin banner and although he is lacking in height (5 feet 7 inches), he makes up for it in aggressiveness. He will graduate from the School of Education and hopes to have a good coaching career. His biggest thrill was starting the Ohio State game in 1944.

EARL GIRARD broke into Wisconsin football history in 1944 as a freshman and amazed everyone with his passing and kicking achievements. He then went into the army and served in the European theater and was discharged this spring. While playing high school football with Marinette he was named to the Michigan all-state eleven. He is also a star in basketball, baseball, and tennis. This past summer he has been playing amateur baseball, being used in the outfield, and has broken up several games with his long ball hitting. "Jug" should be an important asset in the vital left half position.

ROBERT HANLEY comes from Cleveland, Ohio, and last played here in 1945 when he was a regular starting end. He is a sophomore weighing 185 pounds and standing 6 feet 1 inch.

CHARLES HALVORSON is a junior from Dodgeville. Last year he was an end on the junior varsity winning his numerals. Two of his years were spent in the navy and prior to that he was a three sport star at Dodgeville high school, winning the state class B mile run title in 1944, and earning two letters in basketball.

ELREDGE HINTZ is a 28-year-old giant from Mayville. Football fans of 1945 will remember him for the terrific block he made in the Minnesota game but Mayville fans remember him as a high school star of the first water in basketball, track, baseball, as well as football. His service record includes two and a

half years in England, France, and Germany, and his scholastic efforts are for a degree in physical education.

ARMOND HOEHN, until handicapped by a lame shoulder, played a lot of tackle for the 1946 Badgers. The Eau Claire youth earned his numerals as a freshman and then went into the service. While stationed in the Philippines, he played football during the Philippine Olympics.

FRANK KASINSKI comes from Sioux City, Iowa, where he played two years of high school football at East high, which won the Missouri Valley Conference title in 1940. Last year he won his numerals as a tackle with the Badger junior varsity. He is enrolled in the School of Commerce and is working for a C.P.A. rating.

JOSEPH KEENAN is from Chicago but his preparatory work was at Campion Academy in Prairie du Chien. Joe, one of the most genial lads on the squad, was here in 1943 and was chosen by his mates as captain and most valuable player while performing at center. This fall he has been shifted to tackle and should be a valuable addition there. Joe also played under Bernie Bierman, at Iowa Pre-Flight in 1942 and with the Fort Pierce Amphibians in 1944. He spent four years in the navy, the last of which was with Chinese guerillas behind Japanese lines.

JOSEPH KELLY is from La Crosse where he prepped at Aquinas high school. Used as a center last fall with the junior varsity, Joe was shifted to fullback in spring practice and did such a commendable job that he will probably be kept at this new position. During the war he served as an Air Force pilot with one and a half years spent in Italy.

PAUL KESSENICH is a pee-wee back from Madison West where he won all-city and all-conference honors. He played left half on the junior varsity last year. "Booter" is a Purple Heart wearer with service in China with the marines. Fishing and hunting are his favorite pastimes but on the serious side he dwells on being a good coach or successful business man.

TOM KITTELL, as a freshman, moved in and won a major "W" in 1944 although he weighed only 160 pounds at the rugged center position. He then went into the army and returned in time to make a bid for the pivot position. Tom hails from Waukegan, Ill., where he played high school football, basketball, and baseball. In his senior year he was voted the outstanding athlete. He also played on the Waukegan junior American Legion state baseball titlist.

HUBERT KLINKENBERG of Barron was a guard on the 1944 North Carolina Pre-Flight eleven and also performed with the Wisconsin junior varsity team of last year. He was captain of the Barron high school team in his senior year and earned three letters in the pigskin sport. His hobby is stamp collecting and his more serious studies are directed into the field of mechanical engineering.

DON KNAUFF was chosen on the All-State Illinois football team in 1943 while playing with Freeport high school. Last year as a freshman he won his major "W" with the Badgers, playing guard. His service record includes 21 months with the U.S.N.R.

KEN LAIRD comes from Fond du Lac where he won two football letters under Coach Mile Calvano. He also competes in boxing and baseball. He copped a Golden Gloves title in the former and played with the Melville Rhode Island P. T. Base in the latter. He also played football with Melville.

DICK LOEPFE graduated from Milwaukee East Division high school in 1939 and won his first major "W" in 1941. He was a consistent performer as the regular left tackle last year. The in-between years saw Dick with the navy—three and a half years all told. He is married to the former Hazel Ramthun and will become a coach upon completion of his studies this year.

EARL MAVES, better known as the "Stanley Steamer," was a fullback on the 1942 Badgers from where he moved over to Michigan as a marine trainee the next year. Back again as a Badger in '46, Earl was one of the best Cardinal offense backs, finishing the season with the best ground gaining average of 5.85 yards a play. In his senior year at Stanley high school, he returned a punt from the one yard line for a touchdown, the shortest punt return on record.

RALPH MEINHARDT earned his numerals as a tackle on the 1946 junior varsity eleven. He spent two years with the marines, 10 months of which were in the southwest Pacific. Prior to all of this he attended Milwaukee Boys Tech where he won two letters in the grid sport.

HENRY OLSHANSKI is one of the best skiers on the campus. His talents along this line are so good that he competed in the 1948 Olympic tryouts which were held at Seattle, Wash., last winter. He won a minor football "W" in 1942 and then went with the other Badgers to Michigan the following year. Hank competed in football, skiing, and hockey at Wausau high school where he was graduated in 1941. His marine record includes service in the South Pacific and the Orient.

EDWARD O'NEIL from Bayonne, N. J., joined the ranks of the benedicts this past spring. He won his numerals with the Wisconsin varsity last year at guard and with the undefeated, untied Bayonne high school eleven was picked All-New Jersey guard. During the war he was a pilot with the Army Air Force for two and a half years. Coaching is his desired career.

DAN ORLICH was at Wisconsin in 1945 and earned a major "W" as a halfback. He originally comes from East Chicago where he was a tri-sport figure at Catholic Central high school. Basketball and baseball are his other sports, competing as a guard in the former and as a shortstop in the latter. His outfit was state junior American Legion champs in 1944. This fall he has been shifted over to fullback.

HAROLD OTTERBACH of Menominee, Mich., is expected to be one of the top candidates for the right tackle spot this fall. Last year as a freshman he performed a creditable job to earn his major "W" and he did this behind the veteran Clarence Esser. The navy called him for twenty-two months. His high school record in Menominee shows he also was a center in basketball in which sport he won two letters. He also gained the Citizen-Scholarship award at Menominee in 1944. (Continued on page 22)

JOHN PINNOW, a product of Freeport high school, was a right halfback on the 1946 Badgers but has been shifted to quarterback. He is another one of the ex-marines on the squad with three years of service behind him. At Freeport he played fullback for three years and was a guard on the basketball team and was an all-conference selection in both sports.

BILL PRICE was one of the boys who moved off the 1946 all-star prep football team right into the varsity squad. He was awarded a minor "W" last year and earned three in football at Oshkosh high school. In addition to his football specialty, he added two letters in boxing and one in track. In 1946 he was awarded the American Legion medal.

TONY PUCCIO is a Madison boy who prepped both at Edgewood and Central. Last fall he performed with the junior varsity and earned himself a regular starting job at right half, and was awarded numerals. He played only football at Edgewood and then at Central he branched off into basketball and then in his final year he was awarded a letter in track.

JIM REGAN of Cicero, Ill., injured his knee before the first game last year and was out for the season. He first won a letter on the 1942 team and then went into the army where he served 30 months in the Burma and China theater. This spring he was an outfielder on the Cardinal nine but his baseball highlight was the time when he brought his Berwyn, Ill., Junior American Legion team to the National finals with a grand slam home run. In 1939 he was also made an all-state Illinois selection as halfback.

BOB RENNEBOHM of La Crosse was a marine trainee at Michigan in 1943 but was a reserve end on the Wisconsin team the year before that. Last year his work improved and he was a starter the last part of the season. At La Crosse Central he played three years of football and baseball, and he was an all-city selection in football and a member of the state championship Junior American Legion team in 1939.

KARL RUSTMAN played high school football at Oak Park under Pat Holmes for four years. All together he earned 11 prep letters, competing also in basketball, track and baseball. In his senior year he was placed on the All-Illinois first eleven. Last fall he was one of the best end prospects on the junior varsity until he broke his collar bone mid-way through the season.

ROBERT SHEA was a tackle on the 1945 team and then entered the army. He was another three sports star in high school at Waukegan, Ill. Although he played two brilliant years at tackle there, recognition came in basketball and baseball. As a member of the Suburban League co-champs in basketball he was named all-suburban guard as well as being chosen the most valuable. His Waukegan Junior American Legion nine went on to win the Illinois title.

TOM SONNENBERG played high school football and baseball at West Bend but now makes his home in Tomahawk. He showed promise as a guard on last year's junior varsity eleven and earned his numerals. For three years he was in the navy serving as an aerial navigator with the rank of ensign. He is a junior in mechanical engineering.

GORDON SURBER of Elgin, Ill., played guard on the 1942 freshman team and was awarded a minor "W" last fall. Before going into the navy where he spent three and a half years, Gordie was an Illinois all-state selection. He likes wrestling and track, specializing in the weights of the latter sport.

TED THOMAS of Hurley was a 10 letterman in high school. He played football for three, was a hurdler in track for four, and a guard in basketball for three. At the end of the 1942 and 1943 seasons he was named all-conference end. Ironwood is one of Hurley's most bitter rivals and Ted received one of his biggest thrills when he was on the eleven that beat Ironwood for the 1st time in 20 years. During the war, the Army Air Corps had a grip on him for 2½ years.

JAMES THOMPSON pitched a no-hit no-run game for his home town, McFarland, last summer in a Home Talent League contest. This will be his third year on the varsity squad, having won major awards in 1945 and 1946. While going to Madison East, he was awarded the William Schmitz Memorial Award as the most outstanding athlete. Big Jim, he is six feet four inches, was also a pitcher on the Big Nine baseball champions of 1946 and the team of last spring.

JAMES TOEPFFER is another Madison East athlete who was an all-city end selection for two years and all-state in 1946. Jim was named to the National Honor Society and he too received the William Schmitz award. He played three years of prep football, two of basketball, and one of track. His college competition is limited to that he met in spring football drills.

CALVIN VERNON is a well built Negro from Milwaukee and is a Lincoln graduate. During spring drills he showed some of his best form by scoring twice in the final intra-squad game with one of his touchdowns coming on an 80 yard punt return. Last fall he won his numerals on the junior varsity, and during the winter captured the 175 pound crown in the annual contenders' boxing tournament. He was in the navy for 31 months. Now he is buckling down to pre-law in preparation to be a successful lawyer.

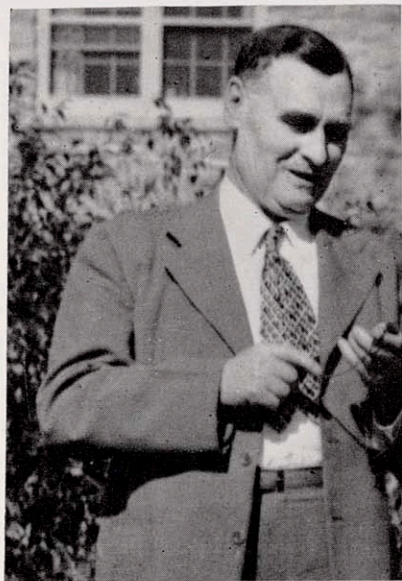
BOB WEISKE is a junior from Baraboo. During the season of 1944 he was a center on the Badgers and after a trek with the navy came back to win his major "W" last year. He was a member of the Southern Ten football champs in 1943 and the track titlist of 1944. He carries a stiff scholastic load in the College of Engineering.

ROBERT WILSON, known by his nicknames of "Bob" and "Red," is one of the best all-around prospects to come out of Milwaukee. He played second only to the great Fred Negus at center last fall as a freshman and captained the South in the 1946 all-star game. This spring he moved right in and won the first string catcher's job on Coach "Dynie" Mansfield's varsity nine. As a member of Milwaukee Washington's state champion track team in 1946 he copped the state discus title.

CHARLES WINDLE of Chicago, Ill., never competed in athletics while he was going to St. George high school because of illness. However, he was a member of the 1942 Wisconsin freshman eleven. When the war came he joined the Air Corps and as a cadet at Santa Ana played on the championship basketball team where he broke an AAU scoring mark for one game with 33 points. In 1945 he was awarded football numerals.

JACK WINK, quarterback from Milwaukee, was a brilliant performer on the 1942 Wisconsin eleven. In 1943 he followed the marine road to Michigan. Playing with a heavy brace because of a bad knee, Jack still performed capably last year and was one of the smartest quarterbacks in the Western Conference. This is his final year in school and on graduation he hopes to land a good coaching job.

1947 CROSS COUNTRY PROSPECTS

A FOURTH straight Western Conference cross country championship does not seem too unlikely an achievement for University of Wisconsin harriers this fall, if the prospects now reviewed by Coach Thomas E. Jones are any criterion.

The veteran Badger mentor, whose teams won outright crowns in 1944 and 1945, and shared Big Nine honors last season with Indiana, has a full varsity squad held over from the 1946 season. All regulars are back, along with some fine prospects up from the "green jersey" ranks.

Jones can count upon Don Gehrmann, Milwaukee, who led the Badgers to victories last season as a freshman, while other standbys will be Captain-Elect John Munson, Montpelier, Vt.; Jack Kammer, Madison; Carl Metzker, Milwaukee; Erv Leverenz, Wauwatosa (1946 captain), and Howard Smith, Geneva, Ill. (all major lettermen); Bob Smithyman, Pewaukee, and Wakelin McNeel, Madison (minor lettermen); Richard Beck, Madison; Ward Duel, Fond du Lac; Glenn Weeks, Madison (numeral winners). Newcomers are Robert Reiersen, Rio; Walter Deike, Freeport, Ill., and Bob Manske, Wisconsin Rapids.

All told, Jones expects 30 candidates for the varsity squad, with additional turnouts for the frosh group.

History of Wisconsin Cross Country

CRoss COUNTRY, as an organized intercollegiate sport at the University of Wisconsin, did not get official recognition until 1905 when the Western Intercollegiate meet was staged, with Chicago, Wisconsin, Nebraska, and Illinois as competing schools. However, there is evidence that a cross country club was organized at Wisconsin in 1900, although competition was limited to class meets.

The sport of cross country first started in England where distance running always had been popular. Remarkable records are noted at various distances, as great as 120 miles. J. Sauders, on Feb. 22, 1892, in New York, ran 120 miles in 22 hours, 47 minutes and 25 seconds while W. G. George, another great British runner, set a record of 51 minutes and 20 seconds for ten miles in 1884, a mark which stood until another Englishman, Alfred Shrub, raced the distance in 50:40.6.

Running, however, had been a great sport among the Mohawk and Seneca Indians in America. Louis Bennett, a 37-year-old Seneca Indian, better known as Deerfoot, visited England in 1863 and ran 12 miles in 62 minutes, 2½ seconds; and 10 miles in 51:26, competing against William Lang, the English champion.

The first organized cross country championship by the AAU dates back to 1890 while the first intercollegiate cross country meet was inaugurated in 1899 by the ICAAAA over a distance of 6½ miles. The meet has been held annually in the East ever since that date.

Wisconsin competed three years in the Western Intercollegiate, after which the meet was taken over

by the Western Conference and run as an open affair annually until 1926 when it was closed to outside schools.

Competing as a conference school, Wisconsin has won 14* meet titles, sharing another, and finished second 6 times since 1908. During the years of 1933-37 inclusive, the conference meets were not held but Wisconsin was second in the "unofficial" Big Ten meet in 1933, tying with Indiana for dual meet season honors in 1934 and 1936.

Wisconsin has won four state AAU championships (1936, 1937, 1940, and 1943) and three times won the Loyola, Chicago, invitational midwest meet (1937, 1938-1939).

* Iowa State won meet in 1911 and 1919 but Wisconsin, as first Big Ten school in ratings, claims conference title.

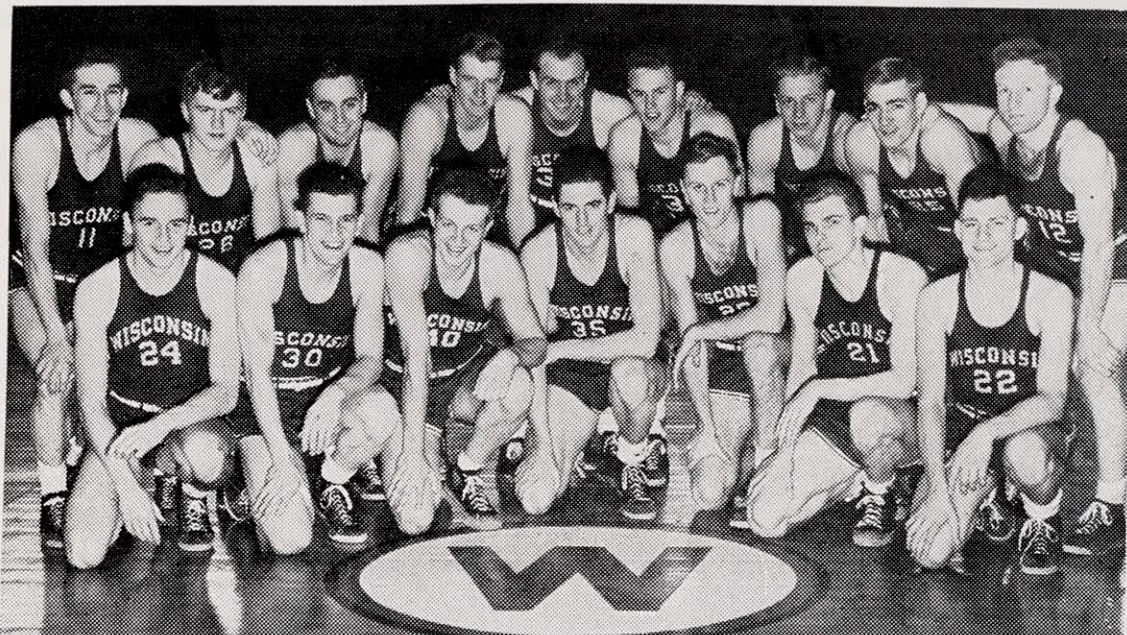

WISCONSIN SCORING FEATS IN 1947

1. Wisconsin set a new Big Nine conference free throwing record of 181 charity tosses. The old mark was 172 set last season by Minnesota (the Gophers finished this season with 180).

2. Wisconsin made 1,228 points in 22 games to surpass its own previous high of 1,022 (set in 21 games back in 1943 and equalled in 1946).

3. Wisconsin's total of 677 points in 12 conference games is the highest in Badger annals. The best previous was 603 set in 1944.

4. Wisconsin made 453 field goals in 22 games to surpass its own previous high of 381 set in 21 games in 1943.

5. Wisconsin made 248 field goals in 12 conference games to break its former mark of 232 made back in 1943.

6. Wisconsin's 322 free throws for 22 games surpasses its former high of 298, set in 23 games during the 1941 season.

7. Cook led the Badgers in all-season scoring with 323 points in 22 games. He led with 289 in 1946 in a 21-game slate. His total of 187 points in 12 conference games was close to the Badgers' best of 193 set in 1943 by Ray Patterson. John Kotz holds top Wisconsin all-season mark of 325 in 21 games (1942) and conference record of 242 in 15 games (1942).

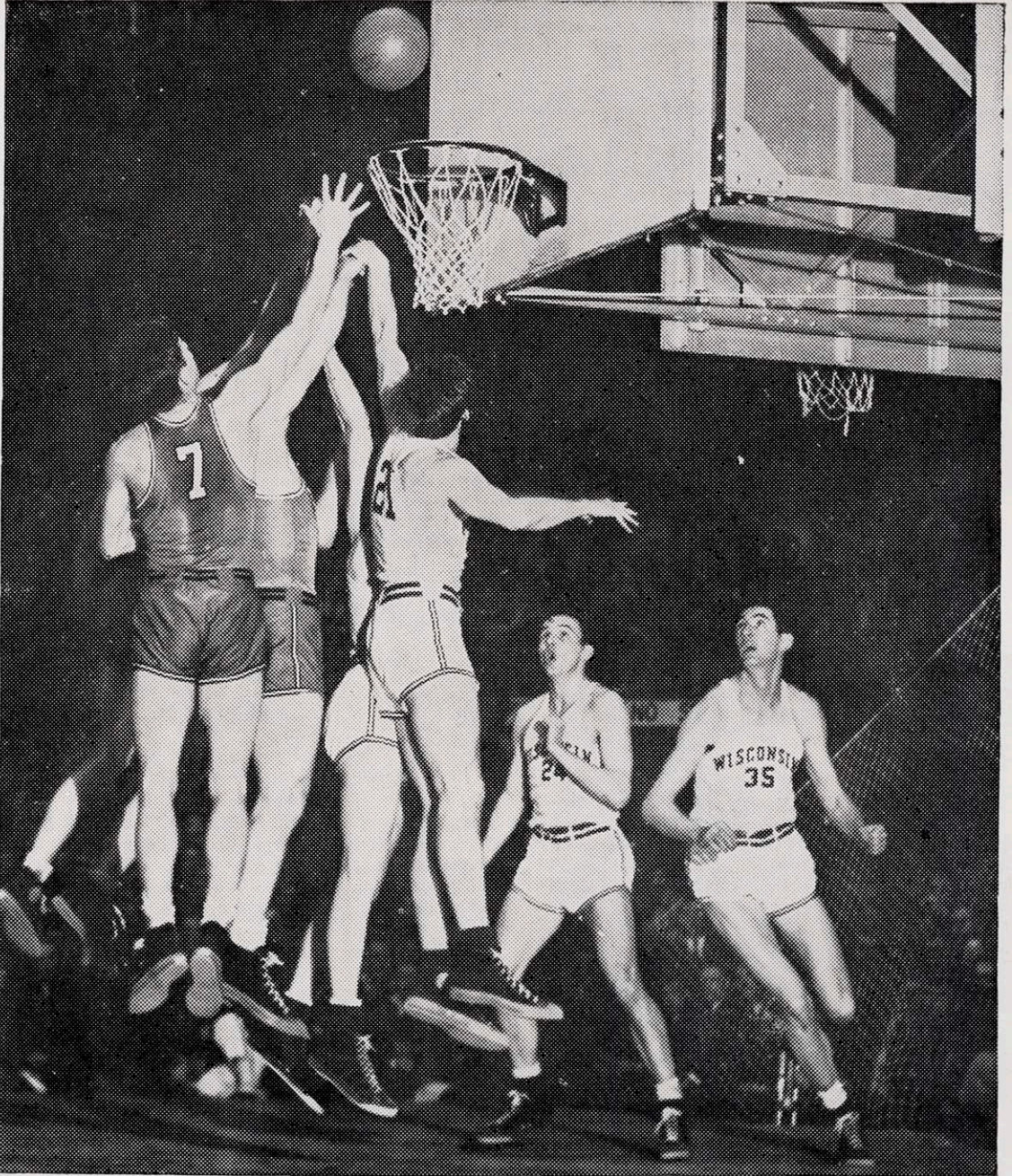
8. Wisconsin's shooting percentage of .298 was the best in the Big Nine. For the entire season, the Badgers hit at a .285 clip.

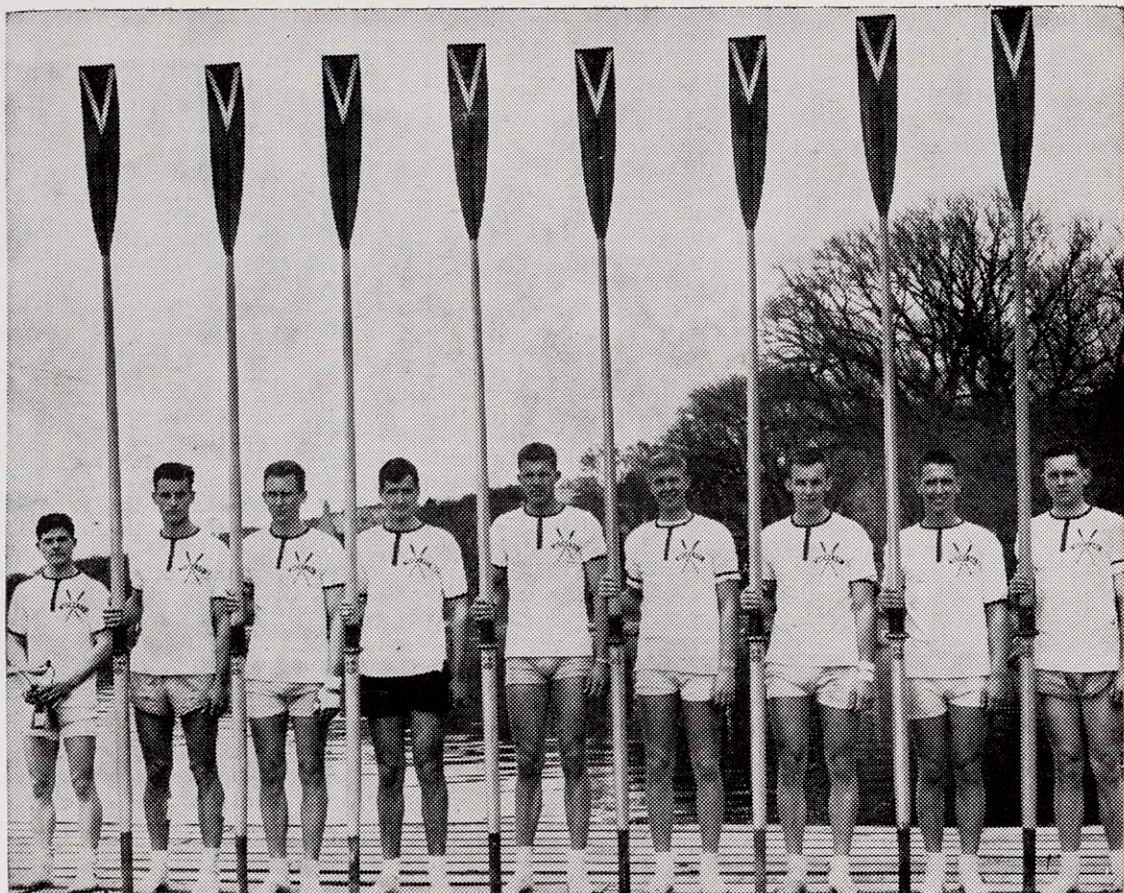
