HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.

That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 72 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from the fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

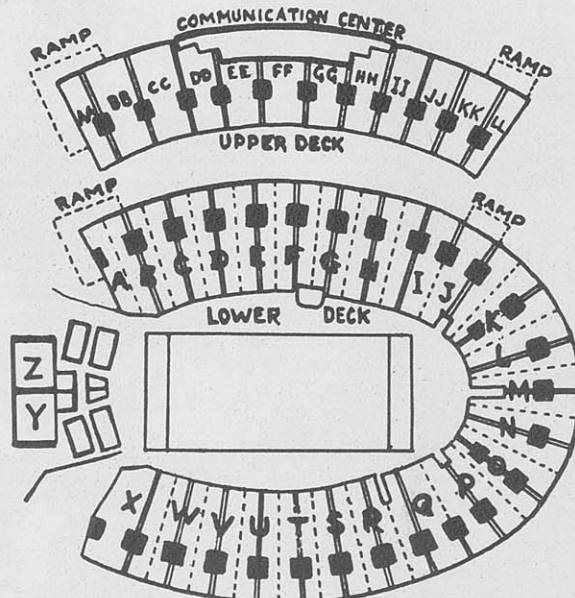
The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers; the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horse shoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

The current construction project is the third since the end of World War II which began with the completion of the horseshoe at the north end in 1950 and 1951.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field of Camp Randall lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR IVAN B. WILLIAMSON



ATHLETIC DIRECTOR IVAN B. WILLIAMSON

IVAN B. WILLIAMSON is in his 11th year as University of Wisconsin athletic director and is hailed as the man who re-established Badger football fortunes on a solid foundation during his seven year coaching reign from 1949 through 1955.

Many hail him as a resourceful, imaginative, and firm leader under whose direction the intercollegiate athletic program can continue a well-ordered, planned growth. During the past five years, Wisconsin's overall athletic program has ranked in the Big Ten's first division.

Ivy, as he is popularly known, succeeded to the athletic directorship following the untimely death of Wisconsin's beloved Guy Sundt, Oct. 25, 1955. Williamson was appointed as Guy's successor on Nov. 12 by the board of regents but did not take office until Dec. 1. Ivy is the sixth person to hold the position of athletic director. Others were Thomas E. Jones (1916-1924), George Little (1925-32), Walter Meanwell (1933-35), Harry Stuhldreher (1936-1950), and Guy Sundt (1950-55).

Williamson first came to Wisconsin in February, 1949, to take over the head football coaching responsibilities. In his seven seasons, Wisconsin won 41 games, tied four, and lost 19 against all opponents. His Big Ten record was just as impressive, the Badgers winning 29 against 13 setbacks and four ties. In addition, Wisconsin tied for the championship in 1952, played in the Rose Bowl, and for the first six years was in title contention or Rose Bowl consideration right up to the final gun of the season.

He came to Wisconsin with an excellent background. He played football at Michigan during the seasons of 1930 through 1932, won honors as an all-conference end, and captained the team in his senior year. In that three-year span, Michigan won or shared three Big Ten titles and lost only one game while winning 24 and tying two.

At Michigan, "Ivy" also earned two basketball letters and his football coach at that time, Harry Kipke, said, "Ivan Williamson is the smartest player I have ever had or hope to have."

Before coming to Wisconsin, Williamson was head coach for two years at Lafayette College. His 1947 team won six games and lost three, while in 1948, his charges won seven games out of nine, bowing only to Army and Rutgers.

Born in Prairie Depot, Ohio (now called Wayne), on Feb. 4, 1911, Williamson was graduated from Bowling Green high school after excelling in both scholarship and athletics. He entered Michigan and upon his graduation had not only won laurels as one of the outstanding athletes in Wolverine history but wound up with special honors in scholarship. He also holds a masters' degree from Michigan, obtained in 1940. He is married and has twin sons, Jack and David, age 28. Son Jack is a 1960 graduate of Stanford, while David completed his college education at Wisconsin in January, 1961.

Following his graduation in the spring of 1933, Williamson coached football and basketball at Roseville, Mich., high school, producing an unbeaten eleven. In the spring of 1934, he accepted a position as assistant coach on the Yale football staff, serving there under Raymond "Ducky" Pond through 1940, and under Emerson "Spike" Nelson in 1941.

In June of 1942, he entered the Navy and put in a season of coaching under Potsy Clark at Pensacola, Fla., Navy base. His war-time service also included duties at the naval station in Sanford, Fla., the Gunnery school at Hollywood, Fla., the Cadet Selection board at Detroit, Mich., and the training carrier, USS Wolverine, Chicago.

After his discharge in 1945, he resumed his former football duties at Yale, this time assisting Howie Odell. He left there in 1947 to take over head coaching duties at Lafayette.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH MILT BRUHN

Genial Milt Bruhn enters his eleventh campaign as the guiding hand of Wisconsin's football fortunes, and the 1966 goal is to rebuild a Wisconsin team that compiled a meager 2-7-1 record last season, only the fourth sub-500 performance by a Bruhn-coached team in his ten previous years at the helm.

Under Bruhn the Badgers have attained undisputed Big Ten titles in 1959 and 1962—their first such titles since 1912—while their No. 2 rating in the final 1962 national football polls was the highest any Wisconsin gridiron team has ever attained. The 1942 Badgers ranked third nationally, while the 1959 team ranked 6th. Coupled with Wisconsin's 1958 national rating of 7th, it gave Bruhn the distinction of being the only Badger coach ever to guide the school's football teams to successive years in the top ten football teams of the nation.

The genial mentor also ranks as the only Wisconsin football coach of the current century to guide the Badgers to two Big Ten football titles during his coaching tenure at the school. Only Phil King, who came West from Princeton in 1896 to coach Wisconsin and the fabled Pat O'Dea, has ever directed a Wisconsin football team to more than two titles during his stay in the head coaching position.

King won outright titles in 1896 and 1897, first two seasons the conference was organized, and gained a title tie with Michigan for the 1901 championship. Dr. C. P. Hutchins was the coach when the Badgers won in 1906, playing a limited schedule of three games, none against traditional rivals.

Bill Juneau coached the 1912 Badgers to the undisputed title with a perfect record, and that was the last time a Wisconsin team was to rule the Big Ten alone until Bruhn's 1959 Badgers posted a 5-2 record in gaining the conference title. Only interruption in this drought was the 1952 co-championship team directed by now-athletic director Ivan B. Williamson.

Bruhn is the 21st coach to head up varsity football at Wisconsin since that sport was inaugurated on the Madison campus in 1889. Only Harry Stuhldreher has served a longer tenure as head football coach at Wisconsin.

Wisconsin under Bruhn has won 49 games, lost 39 (including two Rose Bowl games), and tied five. Only Phil King's 65 victories in an eight year tenure back near the turn of the century ranks ahead of Bruhn's win total.

And in the matter of Big Ten wins, no Wisconsin coach exceeds Bruhn, who has seen his ten Badger squads win 33 games, lose 33, and tie four. Coupled with Ivan Williamson's seven year mark of 29-13-4 immediately preceding Bruhn's tenure, Wisconsin has won 62 games, lost 46 and tied 8 in one of the school's most successful eras of Big Ten competition. The overall record for the sixteen years is a fine 90-58-9.

Bruhn's admitted love in football is 'defense', but in 1961 and 1962 his Badgers played wide open football, annexing national statistical titles both years. In 1961 the Badgers topped the nation in passing with an average 188.4 yards per game, while in 1962 their scoring average of 31.7 points per game (285 in 9 games) was the nation's best in that category. Wisconsin also ranked 7th in forward passing in 1962 (160.4 yards per game, and 10th in total offense (349.1 yards per game).

Coaching has been Milt Bruhn's life. As Milt tells it, he first became interested in coaching at Minnesota. "When I first went there I didn't have a lot of confidence in myself so far as becoming a Big Ten player. But after I learned I could play the game, I decided to stay with it. I've always liked to work with young men."

Bruhn, graduate of the University of Minnesota in 1936, was appointed head football coach at Wisconsin succeeding Ivan B. Williamson, when the latter moved up to the position of Athletic Director following the death of Guy Sundt. Bruhn, however, did not assume responsibilities until Jan. 1, 1956. He had been varsity line coach at Wisconsin since 1949.

Bruhn was born July 28, 1912, at St. Bonifacius, Minn., and attended Mound, Minn., high school where he won letters in both football and basketball. He enrolled at Minnesota in 1932, winning letters in both his favorite sports.

He was left guard on the Gopher elevens, winners of

Big Ten Conference championships in 1934 and 1935 and also claimants of unbeaten records for those two seasons. Milt also was catcher on the baseball team which won the Big Ten championship in 1935 and he captained the team in his senior year.

Following his graduation, he went to Amherst College (Mass.) as football line coach and freshman coach in basketball and baseball. He remained there until 1943 when he returned to his alma mater, Minnesota, as end coach for that season.

He joined the Colgate University football staff as line coach in 1944, then transferred in 1946 to Franklin Marshall College as line coach, in addition to being head baseball and basketball coach.

He went to Lafayette College in 1947 as line coach under Williamson and then to Wisconsin with Ivy. His keen analysis provided excellent defensive performances for the Badgers as they compiled a fine seven year record under Williamson.

Milt is married, has two children, Peter and Mary Anne. Pete is a 1964 graduate of Wisconsin and is currently on active duty with the U. S. Air Force as a jet pilot. He won a major "W" as a center on the 1962 Big Ten title and Rose Bowl team. Mary Anne is a senior at Wisconsin this year.

WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1966

The immediate reaction of football fans following the 1965 campaign which produced two wins, seven defeats—five of them in a row at season's end—and a scoreless tie was that the rebuilding of Wisconsin's football fortunes would be an immense task.

Consider these facts:

● The losing season was coupled with a similar result in 1964 which marked the first time since the 1955-1956 seasons that the Badgers had suffered through losing campaigns two years in a row.

● The Badgers yielded a record 291 points during the course of the ten game schedule—nine more than a war-depleted 1943 squad had allowed in the same number of games—and 188 of those points were given up in the season's final four games against Michigan (50-14), Purdue (45-7), Illinois (51-0), and Minnesota (42-7).

● A total of 228 points yielded against conference opposition in seven games exceeded the total of 189 points allowed by the 1943 Badgers in a similar seven game schedule.

● The Badgers scored just 81 points of their own—just 28 of them in the final four games—and again you have to use the 1943 squad for comparison. That team was able to score just 41 points all season. Contrast the 1965 figures, if you will, with the 1962 Big Ten title team which scored a whopping 322 points in ten games (Rose Bowl included) and yielded just 130 points.

Consider further:

● Wisconsin's offense gained 581 yards rushing, 1,395 passing yards (for ten games), and ranked ninth in Big Ten play.

● Wisconsin's defense yielded 2,277 rushing yards and 1,020 passing yards (for ten games), and also ranked ninth in Big Ten statistical compilations.

● The Badgers suffered through 25 pass interceptions and 20 fumbles recoveries by the opponents during the 1965 season—contrasted to the low of 19 turnovers (ten passes intercepted and nine fumbles lost) in 1958 (7-1-1) and (twelve passes intercepted and seven fumbles lost) in 1961 (6-3-0).

The above facts re-inforce the statement of the problem—the rebuilding program is a big one.

Consider the plus values:

● A total of nineteen lettermen return for action, and most of them are counted upon to provide the nucleus of the Badgers offensive and defensive platoons.

● There is available a fine sophomore nucleus augmented by the addition of three junior college transfer players who are afforded an excellent opportunity to step in and give prompt assistance to the Badger cause.

Offensively, six starters from last year return with tight end **Bill Fritz**, a 6-1, 225 pound junior, quarterback **Chuck Burt**, a 6-2, 202 pound junior, and full-back **Tom Jankowski**, a 6-1, 197 pound senior among last year's statistical leaders.

Chuck Burt ranked among the nation's elite passers (10th) with 121 completions in 235 attempts for 1,143 yards and five touchdowns (only Purdue's **Bob Griese** ranked ahead of him from the Big Ten in national ratings) though a counter-balance is the 22 passes that opponents picked-off in defending against his passing.

Tom Jankowski was the team's leading rusher as he accounted for 271 of the 581 net yards (47 per cent) picked up by the Badgers on the ground while **Bill Fritz** snagged 31 passes for 271 yards (nine of

them against Southern California) and caught four scoring aeriels, a feat that enabled him to rank as the team's leading scorer.

Offensive line starters returning include left tackle **Phil Sobocinski**, 6-1, 220 senior; guard **Dick LaCroix**, 5-11 224 senior; and **Tony Loukas**, 6-2, 226 senior who started each game at center last year, but in spring drills was moved to right tackle where he seems destined to play his finest collegiate football this autumn.

Defensively, six starters also return from last season, including ends **Warren Dyer**, 6-2, 222 junior and **Eric Rice**, 6-4½, 217 senior who was awarded an extra year of competition by the conference due to prior injury.

Tackle **Tom Domres**, 6-2, 229 junior played exceptionally well last season and is rated as the top returning lineman while **Bob Richter**, 6-0, 217 ranks as one of the Big Ten's best returning linebackers.

Defensive halfbacks **Bob Grossman**, 5-11, 181 senior—also awarded an extra year of competition due to previous injury—and **Dave Berg**, 5-11, 188 senior have the game experience around which to build the deep secondary.

Other lettermen returning offensively include tight end **Henry Cuccia**, 6-2, 213 senior—another awarded an extra year of play—who came up with seven receptions for 91 yards last year, and junior running backs **Gale Bucciarelli** 5-9, 212 and **Tom Schinke**, 5-10, 178, both of whom missed much of 1965 due to injury. Schinke was the team's second leading ball carrier despite limited playing time with 112 yards in 39 carries.

Defensive lettermen reserves back for action include tackle **Don Bliss**, 6-4½, 226 junior; linebacker **Sam Wheeler**, 6-2, 213 junior; and defensive halfbacks **Gary Bandor**, 5-10½, 169 junior—switched in spring practice from an offensive flanker-back where he caught ten passes for 104 yards last season—and **Gary Pinnow**, 6-9, 196 senior, who has been a starter on occasion during his two previous seasons with the Badgers.

Quarterback **John Boyajian** is one of five junior "W" Award winners from last year's squad available. The others, all juniors, are linemen **Bill Grisley**, 6-3, 212 who is being counted upon to play a vital role at middle guard; **Clayton Lynde**, 6-1, 210, offensive guard; defensive end **John Tietz**, 6-3, 200; and defensive half back **Dick Schumitsch**, 6-0, 189, both of whom were offensive performers last year but when switched to the defense in spring drills made good impressions.

Tietz was limited by injury to 38 minutes of action in 1965, catching seven passes for 70 yards. **Schumitsch** utilized an 83 yard kickoff return against Michigan for his moment of glory in 54½ minutes of action last season.

Three California junior college performers expected to help are **Richard Gauthier**, 6-6, 290 pound tackle from San Diego Junior College; **Mike Blair**, 6-1, 180, pass catching end, and **Walt Ridlon**, 6-1, 185, defensive halfback, both from Palomar Junior College and presenting promising credentials.

Much progress was detected during spring drills and most pleasing was the advancement of quarterback **John Boyajian**, 5-10, 190 junior, who saw limited action in 1965. He guided his team to victory in the spring game, and showed good field generalship and sharp passing. He completed 19 of 35 passes for 235 yards and one score last season, and additionally ran six yards for the Badgers lone tally against Purdue.

Wisconsin's varsity football staff has been revamped in preparation for the 1966 season. Newcomers to the staff include former collegiate assistant coaches **Mike McGee** (Duke) and **Roger French** (Memphis State) and highly rated high school coaches **Les Ritcherson** (Waco, Texas) and **Harland Carl** (Neenah, Wis.).

They replace the late **Clark Van Galder**, who died on November 16, 1965 just prior to the Wisconsin-Minnesota game; **Fred Marsh** and **Paul Shaw**, both named assistants to athletic director **Ivan B. Williamson**, and **Fred Jacoby**, who was named Wisconsin State University Conference commissioner in July, 1966.

DERAL TETEAK

Assistant Coach

Deral Teteak, a 1953 University of Wisconsin graduate in physical education, was appointed assistant coach on March 6, 1958, moving up to the varsity to fill the vacancy created by the departure of Bob Odell. He served in 1957 as freshman coach.

The Oshkosh, Wis., native is starting his ninth season as a defensive coach on Milt Bruhn's staff and his assigned duties will be coaching the defensive secondary in the forthcoming season.

Teteak, nicknamed "Little Bull", gained lasting fame in the memory of Wisconsin football fans as a member of the famed "Hard Rocks" of the 1951 season, starring as a linebacker on the defensive platoon. He was a regular in 1949, 1950, and 1951, and capped his senior year by being named to the All-Big Ten and All-Midwest honorary first team. His greatest collegiate football thrill occurred in the 1951 Pennsylvania-Wisconsin game when he scored a touchdown from his line-backing position on defense by recovering a Penn fumble in the end zone.

He enrolled at Wisconsin in 1947 after gaining All-State honors as a fullback at Oshkosh high school. His first high school rushing attempt netted 72 yards and a touchdown from the fullback position as a junior.

Teteak played professional football with the Green Bay Packers for five seasons, 1952-56, starring in a defensive role.

Teteak was born in Oconto county, Wisconsin, on December 11, 1929. He is married and the father of three children.

HARLAND CARL

Assistant Coach

Newest member of the Wisconsin coaching staff is Harland Carl, a former Badger grid hero, who was named to Coach Milt Bruhn's staff following the naming of Fred Jacoby, offensive backfield coach, to become the first Wisconsin State University Conference commissioner in early July.

Carl, a native of Greenwood, Wisconsin has been at Neenah High school since 1958, first as an assistant to the late Marlon Batterman, and the past four seasons as head football coach during which time his teams have compiled four straight Mid-Eastern Conference titles and an overall 27-3-2 record.

Harland was recruited as a prep senior by Ivan Williamson in the spring of 1949, and upon enrolling at Wisconsin quickly became known as the most exciting Badger runner since the days of Elroy 'Crazylegs' Hirsch.

His collegiate career was marred by injury and he sat out the 1950 season with an injured hand. He saw sparse action in 1951 though he ranked 5th in rushing with 161 yards in 24 carries, including a non-scoring gallop of 82 yards in the season's opener against Marquette.

Harland played a key role in Wisconsin's 1952 Big Ten co-championship season. He was the second leading ground gainer with 414 yards in 56 carries—7.4 yards per attempt—caught 12 passes for 214 yards and he tallied seven touchdowns, including three in the season's opener against Marquette.

His 1953 senior year was highlighted by scoring the (continued on next page)

JOHN COATTA

Assistant Coach

A star quarterback in his playing days at Wisconsin, John Coatta returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach after six highly successful years as an assistant coach at Florida State University in January, 1965.

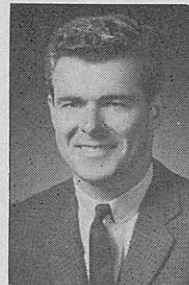
He left private business in Madison in 1959 to accept an assistant coaching job at Florida State when former Wisconsin assistant coach Perry Moss was named the school's head coach.

Coatta proved to be a versatile and well-liked member of the Florida State football staff. Under Moss he was defensive backfield coach, and when the current Florida State coach, Bill Peterson, took over in 1960, John became offensive backfield coach.

In 1964 Florida State compiled an 8-1-1 winning record, plus a convincing 36-19 win over Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl, with Coatta accepting a new assignment as coach of the ends and linebackers.

John served as Wisconsin's offensive backfield coach during the 1965 season. During spring drills he was assigned duties coaching the defensive ends and linebackers.

John is a Dearborn, Michigan native who won

quarterback on Badger teams that won 18 games, lost major "W" awards in 1949, 1950, and 1951 as the 7, and tied 2 under the coaching guidance of Ivan Williamson.

He was a versatile prep athlete at Dearborn High School playing football, basketball and baseball. He attended Kiski Prep in Pittsburgh for one year before enrolling at Wisconsin in the autumn of 1948 and lettered in football, basketball, baseball, track and ice hockey.

He was a highly effective short passer and still holds the Big Ten record for completion accuracy of .642 set in 1950 on 52 completions in 81 attempts in seven conference games. Against Ohio State in 1950 he threw ten straight completions in a 19-14 loss to the Buckeyes in as fierce a game as ever played between two Big Ten schools. In 1951 at Illinois he completed 19 passes in 32 attempts for 164 yards though Wisconsin attempts for 164 yards though Wisconsin lost 14-10.

John is 37 years old, married and his family numbers three sons and two daughters. He received both his B.A. and M.A. degrees in Physical Education from Wisconsin.

MIKE McGEE

Assistant Coach

Mike McGee is the youngest member of the Wisconsin football staff. He won't be 28-years-old until December 1 this year.

He accepted the opportunity to coach at Wisconsin on January 20, 1966 and came highly recommended following three years as an assistant coach at Duke University, his alma mater.

He was a standout lineman at Duke during his collegiate career from 1957 through 1959 and captained the football team the latter season. He played in the 1958 Orange Bowl game as a sophomore against Oklahoma. He received All-American first team mention at tackle for his play in 1959, though he was not a consensus first team All-American.

He played three seasons—1960 through 1962—as an offensive guard with the St. Louis Football Cardinals prior to his return to Duke in 1963 as an assistant under Coach Bill Murray, highly successful Blue Devil mentor, who announced his retirement following the 1965 season.

His coaching responsibilities at Duke included the offensive guards and centers with overall charge of pass protection blocking, including the backs.

Mike is a native of Washington, D.C. where he was born on December 1, 1938. He is married and has two small children, Kathleen 2, and Michael, Jr., 1.

He graduated from Duke with an A.B. degree in June, 1960 and received his M.A. degree from the University of North Carolina in February.

LaVERN VAN DYKE

Assistant Coach

LaVern Van Dyke, graduate of Stevens Point in 1941 and recipient of a masters degree at the University of Wisconsin in 1950, was appointed assistant coach on a full-time basis Jan. 7, 1956. Previously, since 1949, he had been affiliated with the coaching staff on a seasonal basis, working with a sporting goods concern during the off-season.



Van Dyke

Van Dyke was born October 20, 1916 and graduated from Kimberly high school in 1934, winning All-Northeast Wisconsin honors as an end. He played four years of football at Stevens Point State, also won letters in basketball and track.

Following graduation, he coached football and basketball at Waupaca high school for one year, then entered the army for a four-year period. While in the service he coached and played with the Camp Kilmer, N.J., basketball team, later was discharged with the rank of captain in 1946.

He returned to Waupaca as high school basketball coach in the fall of 1946. Van Dyke enrolled at Wisconsin in January of 1949 to work on his advanced degree, and joined the football staff in the fall. He is married, but has no children.

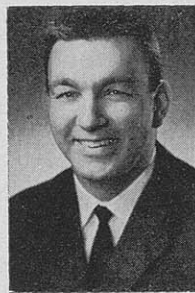

Les is a tall, neat, articulate 40-year-old who played football at Wiley College—attaining All-American mention in 1945 as an end and fullback.

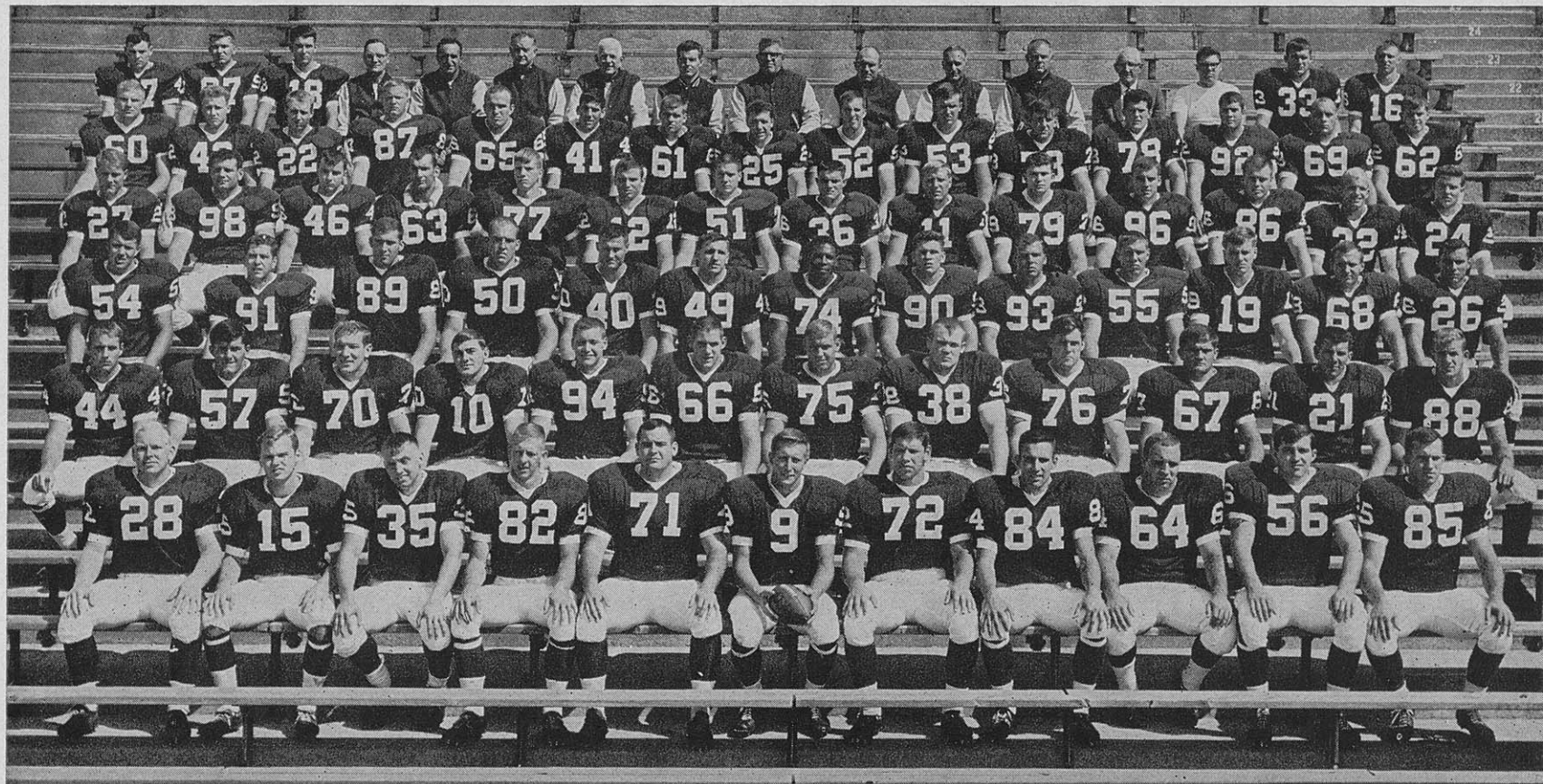

Seniors **Phil Peterson**, 6-1, 210 pound guard and **Vic Janule**, 6-0, 202 pound running back, also impressed in spring work with **Peterson** accorded the coaching staff's accolade at the 'most improved' lineman and **Janule** drawing praise for his hard-running.

Missing spring practice was **John Kim Wood**, a hard-plunging 6-0, 218 pound junior fullback who has been idled since the 1964 Michigan State game — he scored the Badgers lone touchdown in that game — with a troublesome knee injury. The report is that **Kim** is set to go once again, and he could be the power back the Badgers need to re-establish their ground game. If he's sound, that will free the eager **Gale Bucciarelli** for duty at left halfback where he has exhibited hard running in support of **Tom Schinke**.

Sophomores expected to aid the offensive platoon include end **Tom McCauley**, 6-3, 185, who has excellent speed and a fine pair of hands. He was a two-way spring performer, but it appears he will play offensively this autumn.

Quarterback **John Ryan**, 6-0, 182 missed the final two weeks of spring drills but must definitely be considered a candidate in the battle for the starting quarterback position.

Wally Schoessow, 5-11, 208 moved into the center position vacated by the shift of **Tony Loukas** to tackle, and turned in a creditable performance, while **Lynn Buss**, a rugged 6-2, 197 pound right halfback blocked and ran with authority to establish rights to that position.

Other sophomores who impressed offensively included tackle **Ron Gillingham**, 6-4, 226, guards **Dick Klusmann**, 5-10, 206 and **John Sandner**, 6-0, 202, and center **Pete Gabrielson**, 5-10, 217.

First year help on the defensive platoon appears to be available from halfbacks **Don Schaffner**, 6-1, 182; **Gary Reineck**, 6-1, 185, and **Mike Cavill**, 5-10, 180; while **Karl Rudat**, 6-2, 202, gave a good performance at middle guard (nose) and **Ken Criter**, 6-0, 196 was impressive as a linebacker.

The play of **Cavill** and **Reineck** was especially pleasing with **Cavill** moving in ahead of veteran **Bob Grossman** at left safety, and **Reineck** doing a good job at left corner, the position vacated by the departed **Tom Brigham**.

Last year's team captain **Dave Fronck** did all of the punting — 72 times for an average of 36.4 yards per punt — and thus Wisconsin will have to rely on inexperienced punters going into the 1966 season. Best bets appear to be sophomores **Tim Woellner**, who averaged 50 yards per punt, and **Don Schaffner**, who averaged 43 yards, in last year's freshman intra-squad game.

The schedule is attractive, though a rugged one.

Big Eight foes Iowa State and Nebraska appear at Madison, while a trip to Los Angeles to battle Southern California presents the Badgers with as tough a non-conference schedule as last year.

Four conference opponents journey to Madison with Michigan making its first appearance here since 1960. Northwestern, Purdue and the traditional year-end battle with Minnesota rounds out the home slate.

Trips to Iowa, Ohio State and Illinois comprise the away portion of the schedule.

Freshman Squad to Play Two Games

Wisconsin's freshman football team is tentatively set to play a two game schedule — first for the Badger yearlings since 1942. The Badgers will meet Michigan at Madison the week-end of October 29, and will travel to Illinois the week-end of November 12 if all details involved can be worked out.

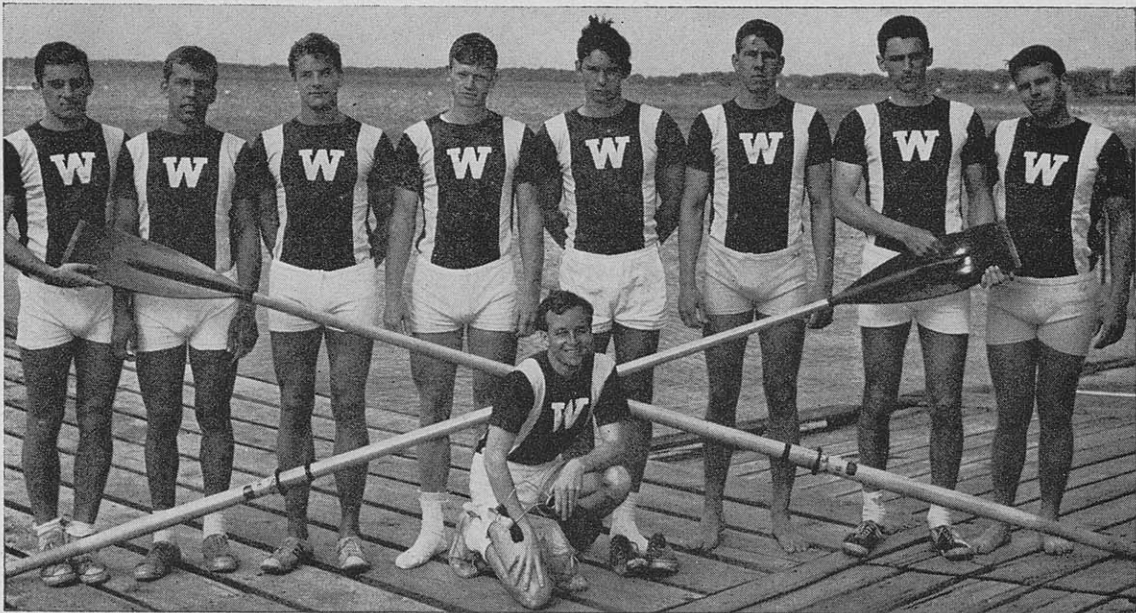

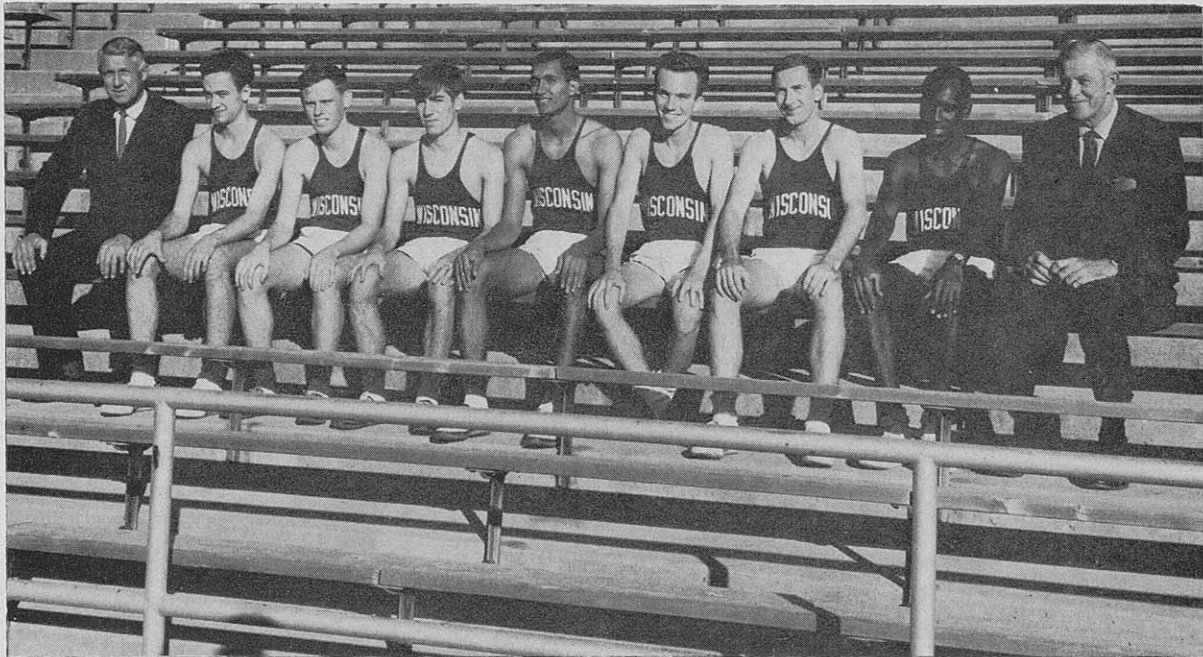

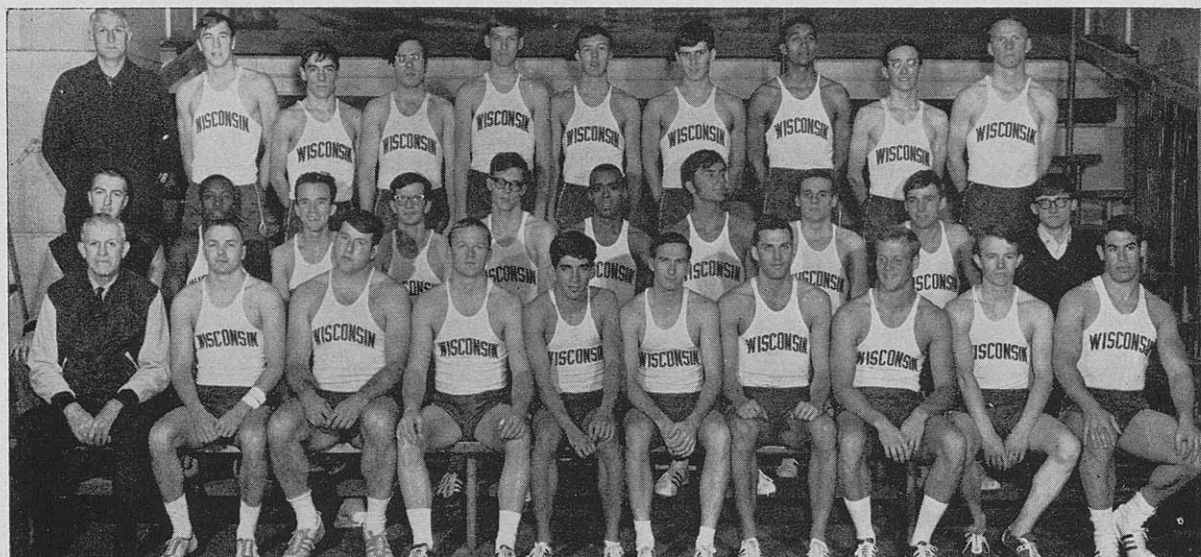
