



STEVE MALCHOW marks his 1st year as sports information director at the University of Wisconsin in 1990–91. Malchow will be in charge of publicity for Badger football, men's basketball and hockey.

Steve is a 1983 graduate of the University of lowa, where he worked four years as an undergraduate intern, before joining the Hawkeye staff in a full-time capacity in 1984. He earned degrees from lowa in journalism and mass communication, and management information systems.

FOR MEDIA COVERING WISCONSIN HOCKEY

Arriving at the Dane County Coliseum

The University of Wisconsin's working facilities for newspaper, radio and television are located in the upper level on the east side of the Coliseum. Media covering the Badgers should enter the Coliseum at the Press/Player's Entrance located at ground level on the north side of the building.

Media Credentials

All requests for working press credentials for University of Wisconsin Hockey home games must be made in advance through the UW Sports News Service Office, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. PHONE: (608) 262–1811. Requests should be made on your company's official letterhead and at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press/Player's Entrance to the Coliseum. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations.

Radio and Television

Visiting radio and television stations will be admitted for broadcast upon the recommendation of the visit-

ing school and its sports information director. Requests must be received at least one week prior to the game(s) you wish to broadcast. Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Sports News Service based on involvment with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the UW Sports News Service office thru noon on Friday and then will be placed at the Press/Player's Entrance to the Coliseum for later pickup.

Photographers

Photo passes are also limited because of space restrictions at the Coliseum. Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports News Service Office and will be granted on a priority first-come, first-serve basis. Photographers are asked to consider the paying customers when shooting in the Coliseum.

Press Parking

There is no reserved parking for visiting press at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. Visiting media should plan to arrive at the Coliseum at least one hour prior to game time to avoid parking problems.

Interviewing Wisconsin Players

UW player interviews may be conducted in the media interview room outside the University of Wisconsin dressing room following each game. No press will be permitted inside the University of Wisconsin locker room.


Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game team meeting. Player interviews may also be conducted during the week following practice at the Coliseum or the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, usually 5:30–6:30 pm.

Interviewing the Coach

Wisconsin Head Coach Jeff Sauer will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game session with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach Sauer will be conducted in the media interview room adjacent to the Wisconsin dressing room.

The best time to interview Coach Sauer during the week is between 10:00 am and 12:00 noon at the UW Hockey Office or following practice at approximately 5:30–6:00 pm. PHONE: (608) 262–3932.

Traveling to the Dane County Coliseum



BADGERS ON RADIO AND TELEVISION

Wisconsin Badger Hockey will have their own state-wide live television network for the 1990–91 season. Eighteen games, featuring 12 at home, were made available to five Wisconsin stations, WISC-TV/Channel 3 in Madison, WDJT-TV/Channel 58 in Milwaukee, WGBA-TV/Channel 26 in Green Bay, WSAW-TV/Channel 7 in Wausau and WLAX-TV/Channel 25 in LaCrosse. SportsChannel Chicago will also be part of the network.

Those games made available for telecast, include: Saturday, October 13, vs Michigan Tech; Saturday, October 27, at Minnesota-Duluth; Saturday, November 10, vs St. Cloud State; Friday/Saturday, November 23–24, vs North Dakota; Saturday/Sunday, December 8–9 at Minnesota; Friday/Saturday,

December 13–14, vs Denver; Friday/Saturday, January 4–5, vs Minnesota-Duluth; Friday/Saturday, January 25–26, vs Minnesota; Saturday, February 2, at North Dakota; Friday/Saturday, February 8–9, vs Colorado College; Friday/Saturday, February 22–23, vs Northern Michigan.

WHA-TV/Channel 21 in Madison will be the production unit for the Badger Hockey Network, providing the television feed and satellite uplink which will allow local network stations to carry the games. WHA has been televising Badger hockey since the 1960's and regularly since the 1973–74 season. Channel 58 out of Milwaukee will televise all 18 games offered, while Green Bay will pick up 17. SportsChannel Chicago will carry ten, Madison and

Wausau eight, and LaCrosse will televise six to eight of the games.

Broadcasting for the Badger Network will be veteran Badger Hockey play-by-play announcer, Paul Braun. Paul has been doing Badger play-by-play since 1973–74. Assistant Badger coach Bill Howard will be doing color and Bob Leu will handle between period interviews.

On the radio, the Badgers are carried by both WTSO (1070 AM) and WIBA (1310 AM). For WTSO, Jack Swanson handles play-by-play and Bill Brophy will do color this year. Calling the action for WIBA are Paul Braun and Bill Howard. In those games which are televised, WIBA will pick up the Badger Network feed.

THE 1990-91 BADGER OUTLOOK

When the Wisconsin Badgers take the ice for the 1990–91 season, they will inherit the enviable task of defending not only their National Championship, but also their WCHA Championship. The 1989–90 season was a "dream season" and one that will stand as one of the most successful seasons ever by a college hockey team. Four championships—their own Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown, both WCHA regular season and playoff championships and the NCAA—seasons don't get any better than that. The Badgers compiled a 36–9–1 (.793) record, the second most wins in the Badgers' storied history. (The 1977 Badger NCAA Champions compiled a 37–7–1 mark).

Ninth year head coach Jeff Sauer must replace seven seniors lost to graduation—forwards Gary Shuchuk, Chris Tancill, John Byce, Tom Sagissor and Steve Rohlik, and defensemen Mark Osiecki and Rob Mendel. Shuchuk was a first team All-America selection in 1990 and the WCHA's MVP. Shuchuk, Tancill and Byce scored over 100 goals last season and combined for 222 points of the team's 670. There is no question Wisconsin has holes to fill.

"You never replace a group of players," said Sauer. "You only hope the returnees have gained knowledge as to what it takes to have success. Last season's team had a personality hard to duplicate. We knew how to win and now the returnees have the responsibility to teach that work ethic to the new players coming in."

But, 1990-91 brings a new year and a new team. A team which returns 17 lettermen and boasts one

of the top recruiting classes in the country. The Badgers return four veteran defensemen and the league's top netminder in Duane Derksen. Experience and depth are the keys to this year's team.

"Depth, as in last year's championship season, may be our greatest strength. We have a lot of experience coming back, especially championship experience. That desire (to return to the NCAA Championship), along with the leadership returning, and the work ethic this team possesses are definitely strengths that make for a great base to build from heading into the upcoming season."


Leading the way offensively for the Badgers is a pair of postseason honor candidates in co-captain Don Granato and Doug Macdonald, Granato, a 5-10, 160-pound senior, is one of the league's top skaters and a player to watch in '90-91. He showed 12-11-23 a year ago, playing in every contest for the Cardinal and White. Macdonald enters his junior campaign as the team's top returning scorer at forward after scoring 16-35-51 last year. He notched nine power play goals last year including a team-high five gamewinners. Other solid, experienced lettermen who will be looked to for offensive production are seniors Dennis Snedden (9-17-26), John Parker (11-9-20), Joe Decker (4-10-14), Tray Tuomie (2-6-8). Jon Helgeson (2-2-4) and juniors Brett Kurtz (8-11-19) and Jason Francisco (0-1-1). Sophomore Barry Richter is one of the top three returning scorers for the Badgers. He showed 13-20-33 a year ago. Additional varsity candidates include Matt Buss. Noel Rahn and Jeff Sanderson.




Defensively, the Badgers return an experienced blueline corps and the team's leading returning scorer in junior Sean Hill. He had 14–39–53 in 1989–90 and is the WCHA's top scoring defensemen returning. He is an All-WCHA second-teamer and a member of the All-WCHA tournament team. In two seasons with the Badgers, he has played in 87 games and scored 16–61–77. Co-captain Rob Andringa enters his senior season with 136 games under his belt and will be a definite key to the Badgers blueline success. Rob netted 9–23–32 last year and is a solid postseason honors contender. Adding depth at defense are senior Rodger Sykes (3–5–8), juniors Chris Nelson (1–3–4) and Joe Harwell.

In the nets for the Badgers is standout goalie Duane Derksen who a year ago was the league's top goaltender. In 41 games, Derksen had a record of 31–8–1, a 3.40 goals against, 1,061 saves and two shutouts. Number 29 has already found a place in the Badger record books for most victories in a single season with 31. First-year letterwinner Jon Michelizzi is the back-up.

Sauer's incoming freshmen class is one of the tops in the country and includes some promising student-athletes. Highly touted forwards Jason Zent and Dan Plante will be strong contributors from the start. Other newcomers up front are Blaine Moore, Angelo Ricci, Andy Shier and Chris Tucker. Others to watch are defensemen Matt Smith and Jacques Auger and goaltender Brian Volp.

Wisconsin faces another challenging schedule in 1990–91 with 32 head-to-head battles in league play. (St. Cloud State joins the WCHA this season, which expands the league to nine teams). Four non-conference face-offs with Alaska-Anchorage and Alaska-Fairbanks are slated with Team Canada coming to the friendly confines of the 'Great Dane' on Monday, October 29, in an exhibition game. The Badgers host the second annual Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee on Friday and Saturday, December 28 and 29. This year's Showdown features North Dakota, Bowling Green and St. Lawrence.

PRE-SEASON INTERVIEW WITH COACH JEFF SAUER

Please evaluate and give a general overview of last year's championship season.

"I could tell right from the beginning—from the first day we went out to run the football stadium steps—there was dedication and a tremendous work ethic in this group of guys. Dedication from Day One to one goal, which just built as the season went along.

"You can't accomplish, or ask for anything more, than what this team accomplished in 1989-90. Winning the NCAA Championship, the WCHA Championship, the WCHA Playoff Championship . . . it was just a remarkable year. The real key to our success last year was our consistency—game by game, series by series—over the course of the entire season.

"The seniors made last year easy, from a coaching standpoint. They were outstanding leaders and have a lot of class and character, which carried over to the rest of the team. Last year's team was made up of a tight-knit group of guys who went out there to have *fun* every day. The dedication, the work ethic, the leadership and friendship, those factors combined with a little luck, made for a great year.

"It was a very, very fun year. We achieved goals we set out to at the beginning of the year. When you do that, you can't ask for anything more."

What area's most concern you heading into the 1990-91 campaign?

"Heading into the '90-91 season, there are a few areas that are of concern to me. For one, our scoring and who is going to step in and replace the scoring lost to graduation. We lost our top three scorers in Gary Shuchuk, Chris Tancill and John Byce (combined for 107-115-222). We have returning players in Don Granato, Doug Macdonald, Dennis Snedden, Sean Hill and Barry Richter who definitely have the potential to score a lot of goals for us.

"Another area of concern is the formulation of our forward line combinations. We have some talented, experienced players coming back, but there is also a lot of youth and inexperience in our defensive system. These players need time to develop and learn the system. Defense will be a key for us this year and we have to play consistent, strong defense.

"Finally, as in any sport, coaches worry about injuries. They are something you have no control over and they can make or break your season. Last year, we were fortunate in that we had few major injuries to worry about. Hopefully, this team has worked hard over the summer to prepare for this season, and has come into pre-season work-outs in top condition.

What do you think will be the greatest strengths of the '90-91 squad?

"Depth, as in last year's championship season, may be our greatest strength. We have a lot of experience coming back, especially championship experience. The guys have been there (the NCAA Championship) and want to return. That desire, along with the leadership returning, and the work ethic this team possesses are definitely strengths that make for a great base to build from heading into the upcoming season.

What players will you look to for leadership this season? Defensively? Offensively?

"Defensively, leadership should come from Duane Derksen in goal and four of the six returning defensemen from last year's team. Sean Hill (All-WCHA defenseman) and Rob Andringa give us the experience on the blueline not only from a defensive standpoint, but also offensively in their ability to score. Rodger Sykes and Chris Nelson add leadership and experience, and we expect junior Joe Harwell to contribute on defense. We hope freshmen Jacques Auger and Matt Smith can step in and fill in the holes for us."

On offense, we will look to the experienced forwards who are returning. We have tremendous potential up front in Don Granato, Doug Macdonald, Dennis Snedden and Barry Richter. Joe Decker, Tray Tuomie and Brett Kurtz really played well for us down the stretch last year and we hope they can continue their level of play for us this year. In addition, our incoming freshmen Chris Tucker, Jason Zent, Angelo Ricci and Blaine Moore bring with them some outstanding credentials and great scoring stats.

The Badgers have some big holes to fill in order to defend their national title with the loss of big guns Gary Shuchuk (41-39-80), Chris Tancill (39-32-71) and John Byce (27-44-71). Who will supply the firepower in 1990-91?

"I think there are a number of guys that given

increased playing time all have potential as good scoring forwards . . . Joe Decker, Jon Helgeson, Doug Macdonald, John Parker, Barry Richter, Brett Kurtz, Don Granato and Dennis Snedden. The freshmen class has proven scorers, but those players must have time to make the next step up for us. Also in defensemen Rob Andringa, Sean Hill and Chris Nelson, we have guys who have shown they can score from the point. Hopefully they can contribute for us again this year.

Please comment on the loss of seven seniors, who not only supplied the goals and assists, but were tremendous leaders and role models on and off the ice.


"You never replace a group of players ... you only hope the returnees have gained knowledge as to what it takes to have success. Last season's team had a personality hard to duplicate. We knew how to win ... the returnees have the responsibility to teach that work ethic to the new players coming in.

"Last year's team was an especially close-knit group of guys. From a coaching standpoint, it makes your job much easier when you have a group of players who are 'team oriented' and not 'individual oriented'. The guys were unselfish and that determined, to a great extent, the amount of success we enjoyed last year.

Obviously you will need contributions from newcomers this year. Who will need to produce from this year's freshman class?

"We will expect all of our incoming freshmen to be contributors. Jason Zent, Chris Tucker, Dan Plante and Blaine Moore have great experience, but they have to learn to adjust to this level of play. Jacques Auger and Matt Smith must develop quickly to be able to help us out on defense.

"In addition to the freshmen, Jason Francisco, Joe Harwell, John Parker, Jon Helgeson and Tray Tuomie are going to add a lot of enthusiasm and bring a great deal of experience to the team."

Comment on the return of the league's top netminder in Duane Derksen.?

"Duane will have a lot of pressure on him, especially with the loss of the experienced players up front . . . everyone will be pointing at him. But, Duane is very solid fundamentally and has a good work ethic. I think he proved to everyone last year the type of goaltender he is. Duane seems to thrive on pressure and he handles it well. With the ability Duane has to play the position and the experience he now brings with it, I know he is looking forward to the upcoming season and having another outstanding season in the nets."

How do you see the WCHA race shaping up in 1990-91??

"The league, again, is going to be very competitive. From top to bottom, the WCHA has been a balanced league and I don't see it being any different this year. The same scramble should develop with Minnesota, North Dakota, Minnesota–Duluth, Northern Michigan and Wisconsin looking to finish in the upper division. There have been quite a few changes around the league this year, and that, of course, brings with it renewed optimism to those programs.


"I feel we have the ability to be in the hunt, and definitely be a solid contender."

What concerns, if any, do you have about college hockey? Do you see any trends developing

"I am very concerned about a number of changes the NCAA is making regarding college hockey. These include changes in staff size, reduction of scholarship aid, number of games played and the selection process of NHL teams.


"The major concern I have, is the feeling of help-lessness as far as offering input into these decisions. If all of these situations are passed, I feel it is the first step downhill in college hockey . . . at least the way we know it today. These changes reduce to an even greater degree the talent available to us, from a college hockey standpoint. It also plays into the hands of the professional teams and major junior clubs who actively recruit the same players as colleges.

"Reducing games, hurts our other sports that we help to support, because you lose the money that would be incoming from those games. As far as the proposed cutback in staff size . . . this only limits the development of young coaches, who have a great deal to do with the calibre of hockey teams we will see in the future.

HEAD COACH

JEFF SAUER

ne of the most respected and influential coaches in the collegiate game today, 1990–91 marks the ninth year for Jeff Sauer as the guiding force of the University of Wisconsin ice hockey program.

In eight seasons at the helm of the Badgers, Sauer's teams have averaged nearly 28 victories per year and have compiled an impressive 220-115-14 record and a .650 winning percentage. Getting off to his best start since coming to Wisconsin, Sauer's 1989-90 team posted a 36-9-1 record, en route to capturing the school's fifth NCAA Championship and the second under his tenure. The Badgers came away with "both" the regular season (and with the regular season championship brought home the distinguished MacNaughton Cup for only the second time in school history) and playoff championships in the WCHA, and garnered honors in the inaugural 'Badger Hockey Showdown' held at Milwaukee's Bradley Center. Fittingly, the 6-3 win over Boston College in the championship game of the "Showdown" was Sauer's 200th victory at Wisconsin. In Sauer's 1988-89 season, his team posted 25-16-5 record, finished third in the WCHA race and advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals. In 1987-88, his Cardinal and White put together a 30-13-2 overall mark, advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals, and fashioned a 22-12-1 record and second place WCHA finish.

The Badgers' 36 victories in '89-90 marks the 3rd time under Sauer's leadership that a Wisconsin team has won 30 or more games. No other Wisconsin hockey coach can boast of such a distinction. In addition, it was the tenth straight year a Badger squad had posted 20 or more wins in a season, and the 19th time in the past 22 seasons, that a Wisconsin team has won 20 or more games. Under Sauer, the Badgers have won at least 21 games all eight seasons.

Some of the outstanding players that Sauer has coached at Wisconsin include Gary Suter (Calgary Flames), Chris Chelios (Chicago Blackhawks), Bruce Driver (New Jersey Devils), Patrick Flatley (New York Islanders), Scott Mellanby (Philadelphia Flyers), Tony Granato (Los Angeles Kings), Steve Tuttle (St. Louis Blues), Paul Ranheim (Calgary Flames), Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (St. Louis Blues), Paul Stanton (Pittsburgh Penguins) and John Byce (Boston Bruins).


In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has a wealth of international hockey experience as well. This past July, he was head coach of Team USA in the 1990 Goodwill games in Seattle (WA). Prior to the games, Team USA beat the Soviet Union's National Team in an exhibition contest at the Oakland Coliseum. It was the first time since 1980 that a U.S. squad had beaten a team from Russia. Under Sauer's guidance, Team USA advanced to the gold medal game against the Soviet Union, but fell one goal short in a 4–3 decision decided by a shootout at the end of sudden death. In April of

1989, he coached the USA Selects Hockey Team (composed primarily of top collegiate players) at the Pravda Cup tournament in Leningrad, USSR. He is a regular consultant to USA Hockey Teams and served as one of four head coaches at the Olympic Festival in North Carolina in the summer of 1988. In the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the 1985 USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia. That team put together a fine fourth place finish—just out of the medal picture and behind World Champion Czechoslovakia, runner-up Canada, and third place Russia.

Sauer reached a personal milestone during the 1987–88 campaign, posting his 300th career coaching victory. It was a victory that put him into select

company in college hockey circles. 1989–90 saw Sauer witness his 200th victory at Wisconsin in only his eighth year. He has been the coach for Wisconsin wins #500 and #600, and this past season, under his direction, Wisconsin played in its' 1,000th hockey game since 1963. Only 47 years old, Sauer will also mark his 20th season as a Western Collegiate Hockey Association head coach this winter, qualifying him as the "Dean" of league coaches. In his first year at Wisconsin in 1982–83, Sauer

In his first year at Wisconsin in 1982–83, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had ever done before. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33–10–4. It marked the fourth national championship for Wisconsin since 1973. Four members of that team—Pat Flatley, Chris



Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend—also played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia before moving on to careers in the National Hockey League.

Known for their second-half peaks, Sauer's Wisconsin hockey teams have put together some impressive numbers during the January-March stretch runs. His 1982-83 team compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage after Christmas; his youthful '84-85 club ran up a 19-9 mark and a .679 winning percentage after November 30th; while his '85-86 club went 14-5-0 (.737) from December 30th to March 2nd. In 1986-87, Wisconsin fashioned an 8-1-0 tear from late December to late January, and in '87-88, Sauer's Badgers skated to an impressive 14-4-2 (.750) second-half record (Jan. 15-Mar. 27). In 1988-89, the UW went on a 17-7-1 (.700) run from December 13th to March 24th. And in last year's championship season, the boys of winter fashioned an impeccable, nearly perfect mark of 18-1-1 (.925) over the final 20 games (Jan. 20-Apr. 1).

Among Sauer's list of "notables" in the coaching profession are: head coach of Team USA at the 1990 Goodwill Games; head coach of the South team at the 1983 National Sports Festival; member of the 1984 US Olympic Hockey Committee; 1983 and 1989 Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee; coach of the 1989 USA Selects Hockey Team at the Pravda Cup; and a stint on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. Jeff also directs his own hockey school in Madison each summer and has worked with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired in Chicago.

Sauer knew he had giant shoes to fill when he left a comfortable position as head hockey coach and athletic director at Colorado College to replace the highly successful "Badger" Bob Johnson in 1982. But his character, determination to succeed and his positive rapport with student-athletes, fans, and media have proved he was the ideal choice.

At Colorado College, where he had served as the Tigers' Head Coach since 1971, Jeff won more than 180 games and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year." His first award came following his rookie season of 1971 and the second following the 1975–76 campaign when Colorado College posted a fine 23–14–0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place in the WCHA.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March of 1981 when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miraculous 11–4 upset over the Badgers in the Dane County Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals playoff victory. (Wisconsin had won the opening game 8–2.)

A 1965 graduate of Colorado College, Jeff earned a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. During his undergraduate years in Colorado Springs, he competed in both varsity hockey and baseball for the Tigers.

In 1966, Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to Bob Johnson at Colorado College. Then when Johnson took over the head coaching duties at Wisconsin, Sauer again served as his assistant coach.

Jeff and wife, Jamie, are the parents of two children—son Chip, 15, and daughter Beth, 10.





Assistant Coach MIKE KEMP

Entering his ninth year as an assistant coach with the Wisconsin Hockey program in 1990–91 is Mike Kemp.


In addition to his numerous on (he works extensively with the Badgers' penalty-killing units) and off-ice duties with the Badger Hockey team, Kemp also coordinates recruiting efforts for head coach Jeff Sauer. In the past three years, the Badgers have finished among the top two penalty-killing teams in the WCHA. In the summer months, Mike is involved with several hockey schools in the Midwest. For the past two summers, Mike has served as head coach of regional 17 and under camps, which are part of USA Hockey's Player Development Program.

From 1983–85, Mike served as administrative assistant coach to Jeff Sauer as well as executive director of the Blue Line Club. One of his chief duties in that role was producing the official game program at all Badger home games.

In 1981–82, the 36-year-old native of Duluth, Minnesota served as administrative assistant under former Badger coach Bob Johnson, but moved on to the University of Illinois-Chicago for the '82-83 season as an assistant coach for the Flames.

Mike is a 1975 graduate of Gustavus Adolphus, where he majored in both public relations and business. After a year of graduate work at the University of Nebraska-Omaha, Kemp returned to his alma mater where he was the assistant hockey coach as well as the women's golf coach.

Mike and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, four-year-old Emily and one-year-old Sarah.



Assistant Coach PETER JOHNSON

Peter Johnson begins his fourth season as a full-time assistant hockey coach at the University of Wisconsin in 1990–91. He was originally named to head coach Jeff Sauer's coaching staff in August, 1987. This past summer, Peter was an assistant coach for Team West at the 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival held in Minneapolis, MN.

A 1983 University of Wisconsin graduate with a B.S. degree in Physical Education, Peter comes from one of America's great hockey families. He is the son of legendary UW hockey coach, Pittsburgh Penguins mentor and former USA Hockey' director "Badger" Bob Johnson, and is the brother of former Badger All-American, 1980 US Olympic Gold Medal-winner, and NHL player, Mark Johnson.

Prior to returning to the Madison campus, Peter spent two seasons (1985–86 and 1986–87) as an assistant hockey coach at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. There, his duties included recruiting, assisting in practice planning, on-ice coaching, off-ice training and scheduling for junior varsity games.

Johnson has also served as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University (1984-85) and as a graduate assistant coach (1983-84) at BGSU while earning his Master of Education degree in Athletic Administration.

Peter played four years of collegiate hockey at Wisconsin under his father, Bob, and was a forward on the Badgers' 1981 NCAA Championship team. The 1981–82 Wisconsin team, which he captained, placed second in the national tournament.

During his four years at the UW, Johnson played in 153 games and scored 159 points on 82 goals and 77 assists. His point total is the 17th best all-time mark at the UW. He also earned four varsity letters, was named the team's most improved player for 1979–80, and earned the team's Ivan B. Williamson Award for scholastic achievement for 1981–82

Peter was a member of United States National Hockey Teams in 1982 and 1983, was a participant in National Sports Festivals in 1981, 1982 and 1983, and took part in the World Ice Hockey Tournament in 1982 at Helsinki, Finland.

He and his wife, Sally, have a five-year-old son, Craig, a two-year-old son, Keith, and newborn son, Eric Robert.





A key to the Badgers' continued success at the goaltending position over the years has been coach Bill Howard, who marks his 19th year overall with the University of Wisconsin hockey program in 1990–91.


During his tenure at the UW, Howard has helped develop such recent Badger goaltending standouts as Marc Behrend, Terry Kleisinger, Mike Richter, Dean Anderson, and Curtis Joseph.

Prior to his hiring at Wisconsin, the 45-year-old Howard was a successful high school hockey coach during a ten-year span at Madison Memorial. His Spartan hockey teams won two state titles and posted an impressive 136–72–1 won-loss-tie record.

During the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including an intensive goaltending school in St. Louis, Missouri. He has also served as a color commentator on University of Wisconsin Hockey broadcasts and teaches high school in Madison on a full-time basis.

Originally from Grand Forks, North Dakota, Bill and his wife, Bonnie, have two sons, Troy and Casey.



Assistant Coach SCOTT OWENS

Scott Owens is in his first year as a Badger assistant hockey coach. Scott comes to Wisconsin from the Madison Capitols Junior A hockey club of the United States Hockey League (USHL), where he served as both coach, since 1986, and general manager, since 1984. During his four year coaching career with the Capitols, he posted a record of 141–88–9, and guided his team to a 33–12–3 showing in 1988–89. The best mark in Capitol history.

Owens is no stranger to his 'new' coaching family. He was a goaltender under Jeff Sauer while attending Colorado College in 1975–79. In high school at Madison Memorial, Owens was netminder under Wisconsin goalie coach Bill Howard and also a teammate of Badger assistant Peter Johnson. He also worked closely with Mike Kemp while with the Capitol organization.

The list of accomplishments for Owens also includes being named USHL Coach of the Year in 1987–88 and USHL General Manager of the Year during the 1986–87 season. For two years, 1986 and 1987, he coached the South hockey team at the Olympic Sports Festival. His Madison Capitols represented the USHL in the National Junior "A" Tournament in 1986–87, 1987–88 and 1988–89, and hosted the tournament in 1989–90. He has been involved in numerous summer camps and hockey schools during his 25 year hockey career and coached hundreds of hockey players at all levels of the game. He has successfully promoted over 60 players to NCAA colleges, including current Badgers, Rob Andringa, Don Granato, Dennis Snedden and Joe Harwell.



1989-90 SEASON IN REVIEW

A LOOK BACK AT A CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON


WCHA regular season champions ... WCHA playoff champions ... Badger 'Showdown' Champs ... NCAA Champions ... The 1989–90 "Boys of Winter" completed a grand slam this past season as they capped off one of the most successful and memorable seasons in Badger hockey history. The Drive for Five (the catchphrase for the UW's quest for a fifth NCAA ice hockey title since 1973) was realized and along the way the cardinal and white performed with remarkable consistency, brilliant execution, incomparable teamwork and brought new meaning to the term "unselfishness."

"We weren't going to be denied," said senior winger Chris Tancill. Wisconsin has won five NCAA titles, more than any other school over the past 31 years. The 1989–90 team compiled an overall mark of 36–9–1, good for a .793 winning percentage. Those 36 victories are the second highest total in school history, just one behind the 37–7–1 mark of the 1976–77 NCAA championship team.

The Badgers fashioned a perfect 8–0–0 in postseason play, including a 4–0–0 mark in NCAA Tournament games. In NCAA play, Wisconsin defeated Maine twice, 7–3 and 4–3 in ot, beat Boston College, 2–1, in NCAA semifinal play and skated by Colgate, 7–3 to take the championship. The hockey Badgers captured the fabled MacNaughton Cup, symbolic of the WCHA regular season championship, with a regular season finish of 19–8–1 and a .696 winning percentage. It was only the second time since Wisconsin joined the WCHA that a Badger team came away with the MacNaughton Cup.

In WCHA Playoff competition, the Badgers won their second Broadmoor Trophy in three seasons. Wisconsin swept past Michigan Tech, 5–2 and 4–3 in ot, and at the finals, beat Northern Michigan 4–3 in ot, and stymied a Minnesota Gopher team, 7–1. It was the University of Wisconsin's ninth overall WCHA Playoff Championship since 1969. The Badgers had previously captured the Broadmoor Trophy in 1969–70, 1976–77, 1981–82, 1982–83, 1987–88 and 1989–90. The Badgers shared the championship in 1971–72 (with Denver), in 1972–73 (with Denver), and in 1977–78 (with Colorado College). This marked the third WCHA Playoff Championship for Coach Jeff Sauer.

The core of the 1989-90 Badgers was a valiant group of seniors. Captain STEVE ROHLIK, alternate captains JOHN BYCE, MARK OSIECKI and GARY SHUCHUK, and ROB MENDEL, TOM SAGISSOR and CHRIS TANCILL. Three of those seniors combined for 222 points. Leading the way offensively, SHU-CHUK garnered All-America First Team, WCHA 'MVP', All-WCHA First Team, WDAZ-TV All-Star, and Badger Hockey Showdown All-Tournament Team honors. He tallied 41-39-80 for the Badgers in 1989-90 and became only the fourth player in Badger history to score 40 or more goals in a single season. TAN-CILL, who was named the NCAA Tournament 'MVP' and also to the WCHA All-Academic and Badger Hockey Showdown All-Tournament teams, came through with 39-32-71. BYCE, was named to the NCAA All-Tournament Team, All-WCHA Second Team and the WDAZ-TV All-Star Team, and scored 27-44-71 last season. SAGISSOR (19-28-47) and ROHLIK

(17–23–40) surpassed career bests for goals, assists and points. OSIECKI (5–38–43) and MENDEL (1–13–14), meanwhile, were defensive anchors throughout the campaign.

Playing in the nets for the Badgers, sophomore DUANE DERKSEN finished the season as the top goaltender in the WCHA. He had a 31–8–1 record, a 3.40 GAA, and .889 SV% and two shutouts over 2.345 minutes of play.

But every member of the 1989–90 Badger Hockey team— Juniors ROB ANDRINGA (9–23–32), DENNIS SNEDDEN (10–17–27), DON GRANATO (12–11–23), JOHN PARKER (11–9–20), JOE DECKER (4–10–14), TRAY TUOMIE and RODGER SYKES, sophomores SEAN HILL (14–39–53), DOUG MACDONALD (16–35–51), BRETT KURTZ (8–12–20), JON HELGESON, CHRIS NELSON, JOE HARWELL and JASON FRANCISCO, and freshmen BARRY RICHTER (13–23–36), JON MICHELIZZI and NOEL RAHN— made key contributions.

Experience was the great intangible for the Badgers in 1989–90, as 10 players—SHUCHUK (177/UW record), TANCILL (173/2nd all-time at UW), MENDEL (170/UW record for defenseman), BYCE (169), ROHLIK (166), SAGISSOR (162), ANDRINGA (136), SNEDDEN (126), GRANATO (120), and OSIECKI (108)—all played in more than 100 games. Three

Badgers passed the 160-career point plateau in 1989–90...SHUCHUK (176), TANCILL (173) and BYCE (165). Seven other Badgers reached the 60 career point plateau . . . MACDONALD (99), ROHLIK (81), SAGISSOR (79), HILL (78), ANDRINGA (72), GRANATO (60) and SNEDDEN (60).

The 1989–90 season was definitely the 'Year of the Badger' and one that will be remembered by Wisconsin fans for a long time to come. One that won't easily be forgotten. The list of accomplishments and superlatives the '89-90 Badgers achieved is long and admirable. And taking a look back at a few of the those many memories, Wisconsin hockey fans, **WHO WILL FORGET?**

- an 18-1-1 record over the final 20 games?
- the fact that the Badgers lost two games in a row only once all season?
- the Badgers 28–1–0 record when leading after two periods of play?
- the 27–0–0 record when they held their opponents to three or fewer goals?
- the two goals by CHRIS TANCILL and GARY SHUCHUK in the last minute and three seconds in a 4–2 win at Denver on October 28th?







THE WESTERN COLLEGIATE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

The University of Wisconsin–Madison is proud to be a member of America's premier collegiate hockey league—the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

No conference can match the WCHA's outstanding reputation for producing national championship teams, All-Americans, Olympians, and subsequent stars in the National Hockey League. The quality of institutions, student-athletes, coaching, on-ice play, and level of administrative and fan support throughout the nine-team WCHA is second to none. The 1990–91 season sees the Western Collegiate Hockey Association mark its 32nd year and fifth decade of top flight competition. The league will also see the addition of St. Cloud State to its' ranks in the upcoming season.

WCHA-member teams have claimed an unprecedented 29 NCAA Ice Hockey Championships, have claimed 68% of the national titles contested over the past 30 years, and have won 12 of the last 18 tourneys, with the University of Wisconsin skating to the 1990 national championship title. Along with its 29 NCAA titles, the WCHA can also boast of 23 second place finishes and since the NCAA Tournament began in 1948, the WCHA has had at least two teams in college hockey's 'final four' 34 times and has claimed 45% of the 180 total national tournament berths available. Three member institutions,

Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota, have accounted for 11 national championships since 1973. The Badgers earned the NCAA Championship in 1973, 1977, 1981, 1983 and 1990, North Dakota took the crown in 1980, 1982 and 1987, and Minnesota captured the national title in 1974, 1976 and 1979.

Perhaps the most recent example of the WCHA's ability to draw on its great tradition was the institution of an annual WCHA Playoff Championship (i.e. 'final four') in the spring of 1988. Contested at the St. Paul (MN) Civic Center in March with the four first-round playoff winners, the WCHA Playoff Championship has quickly established itself as one of college hockey's premier showcase events. Since the inaugural event in 1988, the playoff championships have drawn a total of 149,884 fans, an average of 12,490 per game (twelve games)!

The names and faces of ex-WCHA players are legendary, and although the list is too numerous to mention them all, you can start with John Mayasich, Bill Hay, Bill Masterton, Gordon "Red" Berenson, Lou Nanne, Tony Esposito, Keith Magnuson, Wayne Thomas, Dennis Hextall, Ron Grahame, /Chico' Resch and Ed Mio. And more recently, the WCHA boasts of such alumni as current National Hockey League standouts Glenn Anderson (Denver), Ed Belfour (North Dakota), Perry Berezan (North Dakota), Mike

Blaisdell (Wisconsin), Aaron and Neal Broten (Minnesota), Chris Chelios (Wisconsin), Dave Christian (North Dakota), Kevin Dineen (Denver), Bruce Driver (Wisconsin), Patrick Flatley (Wisconsin), Curt Giles (Minnesota-Duluth), Tony Granato (Wisconsin), Tony Hrkac (North Dakota), Brett Hull (Minnesota-Duluth), Jim Johnson (Minnesota-Duluth), Mark Johnson (Wisconsin), Bob Joyce (North Dakota), Tom Kurvers (Minnesota-Duluth), Reed Larson (Minnesota), Doug Lidster (Colorado College), Craig Ludwig (North Dakota), Norm Maciver (Minnesota-Duluth), David Maley (Wisconsin), Bob Mason (Minnesota-Duluth), Scott Mellanby (Wisconsin), Brian Mullen (Wisconsin), Troy Murray (North Dakota), James Patrick (North Dakota), Mike Ramsey (Minnesota), Craig Redmond (Denver), Mike Richter (Wisconsin), Greg Smith (Colorado College), Gary Suter (Wisconsin), Dave Tippett (North Dakota), Steve Tuttle (Wisconsin), Bill Watson (Minnesota-Duluth), Tim Watters (Michigan Tech) and Rick Zombo (North Dakota). Since 1950, the WCHA has had more than 140 of its players earn All-American honors, while nearly a hundred (total does not include 1988) have played on USA Olympic Hockey Teams. Fourteen of the 21 players on the United States' 1980 gold medal team were from the WCHA.



MARCH, 1962: Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence. **DECEMBER 6, 1963:** A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate victory, a 3–2 decision over Macalester.

FEBRUARY 22, 1964: Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

DECEMBER 11, 1964: In an effort to upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately, the Badgers go on to lose all eight of those games.

FEBRUARY 22, 1966: After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5–4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scored on a break-away just two minutes into the overtime period.

APRIL 1, 1966: Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Wisconsin hockey program.

MARCH, 1968: Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21–10–0.

MARCH 30, 1969: After another successful season, including an 11–9–2 mark against WCHA teams, the Badgers are admitted to the Western Col-

legiate Hockey Association.

MARCH, 1970: Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies for the NCAA Championships, where they post a third place finish. Defensemen John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to earn All-American honors. MARCH, 1972: The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championships in three seasons, again coming away with a third place finish

MARCH 16, 1973: Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6–5, in overtime to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championships. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

MARCH 17, 1973: With a 4–2 victory over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship for the first time in the school's history.

FEBRUARY 19, 1977: The Badgers defeated Minnesota–Duluth, 6–4, to capture the MacNaughton Cup and the WCHA regular season championship for the first time in Badger hockey history.

MARCH 25, 1977: After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime, 4–3, to move the Badgers into the finals.

MARCH 26, 1977: Senior Steve Alley culminated

the Badgers' finest season with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6–5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA Championship. Wisconsin finished the season at 37–7–1, and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the All-American squad · defenseman Craig Norwich, goaltender Julian Baretta and center Mike Eaves. Coach Bob Johnson was named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, was named freshman of the year.

MARCH 25, 1978: Wisconsin fans took Providence, Rhode Island by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championships, and were resultingly proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city of Providence. Mike Eaves concluded his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earned All-American acclaim. The Badgers finished fourth in the tournament.

MARCH, 1979: Record crowds saw the Badgers (25–13–3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sellouts and the average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum was just eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson closed out his Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in Wisconsin history. He was named to the All-American team for the second time and was collegiate player of the year.

MARCH 27, 1981: Wisconsin returned to the NCAA Championships for the sixth time since 1970 after defeating the best team in the east, Clarkson, 9–8,

in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5–1 win over Northern Michigan in the semi-finals, the Badgers advanced to the finals for the third time.

MARCH 28, 1981: The Badgers gained the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6–3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota); goaltender Marc Behrend was named NCAA tourney "MVP." The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out and joined the CCHA to cut expenses.

MARCH 27, 1982: Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA Championship appearance but finishes second to North Dakota. The Badgers compiled the second best record in school history at 35–11–1. Center John Newberry and defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American honors.

JUNE 1, 1982: Coach Bob Johnson resigns after 15 great years at Wisconsin. He had guided the Badgers to three NCAA Championships, seven national tournament appearances, a record of 367–175–23, and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

JULY 8, 1982: Jeff Sauer, previously head coach at Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named the school's fourth coach.

MARCH 5, 1983: Sophomore defenseman Chris Chelios and sophomore winger Paul Houck score the tieing and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota, 6–5, in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff Championships in Minneapolis. It is the longest game in school history.

MARCH 24–26, 1983: After sweeping past Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year coach Jeff Sauer's Badgers swept St. Lawrence, 6–2 and 7–1, in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the NCAA Championships for the third straight year and eighth time overall since 1970. In Grand Forks, North Dakota, the Badgers claimed their fourth national championship since 1973 with a 2–0 win over Providence in the semi-finals and a 6–2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the NCAA tournament most valuable player for the second time in his career.

JANUARY 7, 1984: Wisconsin becomes the first and only American college team to defeat the 1984 US Olympic Hockey Team when the Badgers stun USA, 4–2, before 8,732 at the Dane County Coliseum.

NOVEMBER 23, 1985: The University of Wisconsin records its 500th victory since reviving hockey in 1963 with a 6–2 victory over WCHA-rival North Dakota in the Coliseum


DECEMBER 30, 1987: Wisconsin beats CCHAmembers Michigan, 6–0, and Michigan State, 4–3, to win the 23rd Annual Great Lakes Invitational Tournament before 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, MI. Goaltender Dean Anderson, defenseman Paul Stanton and forwards Paul Ranheim and Steve Tuttle are named to the all-tournament team, and Anderson also receives the tourney "MVP" award.

MARCH 6-7, 1988: Wisconsin defeats North Dakota, 2-1, and Minnesota, 3-2, to claim the first WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship before nearly 14,000 at the St. Paul Civic Center. Anderson, Stanton, Ranheim and Tuttle are voted to the all-tournament team while Anderson is tourney "MVP." Later that month, Ranheim and Stanton are named first team All-Americans, while Anderson and Tuttle are second team All-Americans. The Badgers finish at 30-13-2—the school's fourth 30-victory campaign.

DECEMBER 28–29, 1989: Wisconsin hosts the first Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown at Milwaukee's spectacular Bradley Center. The Badgers defeat Notre Dame 9–3 and Boston College 6–5 to capture the Petitt Cup. More than 30,000 fans attend the highly successful first 'Showdown'.

FEBRUARY 16, 1990: The University of Wisconsin marks it's 1000th game since 1963 with a 6–3 victory over Minnesota at Minneapolis.

FEBRUARY 24, 1990: Wisconsin defeats North Dakota 5-4 in ot on Chris Tancill's goal to clinch the


1990 WCHA Championship and MacNaughton Cup before a sellout crowd of 8,644 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. The Badgers' league title is the school's second since 1977.

MARCH 12, 1990: Wisconsin defeats Minnesota 7–1 at the St. Paul Civic Center to claim the 1990 WCHA Playoff Championship. It is the UW's ninth WCHA Playoff title and second in the past three years under Jeff Sauer.

MARCH 24, 1990: Wisconsin completes an NCAA Quarterfinal sweep of Maine with a 4–3 ot win on Tom Sagissor's goal. The win sends the Badgers onto Detroit and a berth in the 1990 NCAA Championships at Joe Louis Arena. Wisconsin's 'Drive for Five' is just two wins away.

MARCH 30, 1990: The Badgers down Boston College, 2-1, in an NCAA semi-final game in Detroit as right wing Chris Tancill scores both goals on assists from freshman Barry Richter. In goal, Duane Derksen stops 27 of 28 shots as Wisconsin advances to the championship game. More than 8,000 Badger faithful have made their presence felt in the Motor City. APRIL 1, 1990: No fooling. Coach Jeff Sauer's Wisconsin Badgers whip Colgate, 7-3, to claim the school's fifth NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Championship before 15,034 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit. Senior center John Byce records the hat trick, including one short-hander while junior defenseman Rob Andringa nets the game-winner. More than 8,000 Wisconsin fans storm Detroit for the title game. The Badgers finish with a 36-9-1 record, the second most wins in school history. Center Gary Shuchuk, who scored 41 goals and 80 points on the season, is named a first team All-American. Chris Tancill is the NCAA Tournament "MVP."

APRIL 2, 1990: More than 5,000 enthusiastic Wisconsin hockey fans turn out at the UW Fieldhouse for a pep rally to honor the 1989–90 NCAA champions.

WISCONSIN CHAMPIONSHIP TEAMS AND RESULTS

1973 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

March 17, 1973 Boston, Massachusetts (Boston Garden) Attendance: 8,055

The Wisconsin Badgers are the National Champions of collegiate hockey. Wisconsin won the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship last weekend by beating Cornell 6–5, in overtime and then disposing of Denver 4–2 in the title game to become the first Wisconsin team to win an NCAA title since the Badger boxing team did in 1956.

The Badgers came within five seconds of never having a shot at the title at all. That's how much time was left on the Boston Garden clock when Wisconsin tied Cornell 5–5 to send the game into sudden-death overtime. Wisconsin after making an incredible comeback, scored the gamewinner with :33 seconds left in the overtime period. Olmstead centered the puck to freshman Steve Alley. Alley's shot was blocked, but the rebound came to Talafous who scored the winner.

Wisconsin then moved into the championship game with Denver, who had ousted Boston College 10–4 in the tournament's first game on Thursday night. Wisconsin freshman Dave Pay opened the scoring in the first period but Denver tied it at 1–1. The Pioneers took a 2–1 lead early in the second period but from that point on it was all Wisconsin as the Badgers showed no after-effects of the exhausting game against Cornell the night before and completely outplayed Denver. Denver was the Western Collegiate Hockey Association Champion and had been ranked the number one team in the nation coming into the NCAA tourney.

Captain Tim Dool tied the game at 2–2 and then that man Talafous again scored the goal that proved to be the winner putting Wisconsin ahead 3–2. Senior Jim Johnston added an insurance goal in the third period and Junior Jim Makey was superb in the nets kicking out 32 Denver shots. But somehow, even the national championship game paled in comparison with the Badger team heroics against Cornell.

No NCAA tournament team was named, but Talafous was named Most Valuable Player in the tournament. Wisconsin became the first team since 1965 to win both Friday and Saturday night games in the national tournament.

The Badgers thus finished the season with a school record for wins in a single season 29-9-2. Coach Bob Johnson finished his seventh year at Wisconsin with a record of

158-73-6 and the Wisconsin seniors, Bentley, Dool, Cherrey, Johnston and Doug Kelso, who participated in three NCAA tournaments in their four years, finished with 99 wins, 43 losses and 4 ties in their careers.



March 26, 1977 Detroit, Michigan (Olympia Stadium) Attendance: 14,437

Steve Alley slammed in a rebound of Tom Ulseth's shot 23 seconds into the overtime Saturday night to give the weary Badgers a 6–5 victory over Michigan and the 1977 NCAA hockey championship.

Wisconsin, visibly dragging after a tough overtime victory over New Hampshire Friday night, saw a three-goal lead vanish in the face of some blistering shooting by the Wolverines in the final 20 minutes of regulation.

If Wisconsin was off balance in Friday's overtime victory over New Hampshire, the Badgers came out clicking against the Wolverines on Saturday night. They passed crisply and confidently and played strong defense, with the forwards coming back to backcheck consistently. Baretta played confidently and positively in the net, even coming 30 feet out of his goal in the first period to knock away a loose puck and stop a potential Michigan breakaway.

Wisconsin jumped to a 3-0 lead on goals by Alley, Herbst and Mark Johnson. Alley scored on a power play 2 minutes, 29 seconds into the game when he fought off a man in the slot and deflected a Craig Norwich slapshot from the center blue line past goalie Palmer.

Herbst scored on a breakout off a beautiful pass from Norwich at 9:27. The two badgers steamed down the slot, Norwich on the left side and Herbst slightly ahead of him on the right. Norwich slid a pss through traffic to Herbst at the goal mouth and Herbst flicked the pass in.

Mark Johnson scored on a rebound of an Alley shot on a power play at 15:12. Norwich, at the blue line, passed to Eaves in the left circle and Eaves got it to Alley, who got off a shot in the slot. The rebound hopped out to Palmer's left and lay there until Johnson could roar in from the right circle and flip it over Palmer.

Mike Meeker scored for Wisconsin in the second period, giving the Badgers a 4–2 lead a minute after Michigan had narrowed it to 3–2. Meeker carried the puck down the right wing boards, stopped and deked around a defender at about the top of the circle then skated a stride and floated a backhander which hit the bottom of Palmer's glove and skittered down into the net at 2:15.

Mark Johnson scored his second goal of the night at 1:10 of the third period.

Twenty-six seconds later Michigan started its comeback and the game culminated in Alley's goal.

"Mike (Eaves) won the faceoff and Al forechecked it away from a guy," Ulseth said. "I took it behind the cage and came around and tried to stuff it."

Alley said he got the rebound after Eaves had had a second shot "and I just shoveled it into the open net."

Sophomore goaltender, Julian Baretta, was named the Most Valuable Player in the 1977 NCAA Hockey Tournament. Baretta, along with Badger defenseman Craig Norwich and John Taft were members of the NCAA All-Tournament Team. Wisconsin became the first team ever to win the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season.

March 28, 1981 Duluth, Minnesota (Duluth Arena) Attendance: 5.681

The Wisconsin Hockey team took full advantage of its at-large berth in the NCAA Hockey Championship and captured the NCAA Title for the 3rd time under Head Coach Bob Johnson. The Badgers downed the CCHA Champion Northern Michigan in the semi-final game, 5–1 and then took on the top ranked team in the country and WCHA title winner Minnesota. Wisconsin beat Minnesota by a 6–3 count behind the steady goaltending of sophomore Marc Behrend and a total team effort that the Gophers could not match. Behrend, who was also in the nets against Northern Michigan was selected as the tournament's Most Valuable Player and along with freshman center John Newberry was placed on the All-Tournament team. Behrend had a total of 55 saves in the net, 25 against Northern and 30 against the Gophers. Newberry led the Badgers in scoring with two goals and four assists and tied with Aaron Broten of Minnesota for the scoring leader in the Duluth final four meet.

Wisconsin playing on an emotional high, never let the Gophers get into their style of play and 1st period goals by senior Dan Gorowsky, Newberry and Lebler gave the Badgers the confidence they needed. Wisconsin jumped out to a 4–0 margin midway through the 2nd period on a goal by freshman Ted Pearson. Minnesota cut the advantage to 4–1, but Newberry gave the Badgers its four point lead back with a power-play goal. Minnesota scored a power-play goal just :10 seconds into the final period to get new life. Another power-play goal at the 16:09 mark cut Wisconsin's margin to two goals. Minnesota pulled it's goaltender with 1:25 remaining in the game and Lebler hit the open net from just outside his own blueline to ice the victory for the Badgers.

On its way to the 1981 NCAA crown, the Badgers defeated the conference champs of all three Division I leagues. In the NCAA quarterfinals, Wisconsin beat Clarkson 9–8, in a total goals series, Clarkson was the ECAC title holder. Northern Michigan had captured the CCHA title and Minnesota finished 1st in the WCHA.

The Badgers finished their season with an overall record of 27-14-1, 2nd in the WCHA, tied with Michigan Tech and winners of the 34th NCAA Hockey Championship.

Scott Lecy led the team in scoring with 75 points (26G, 49A), while Peter Johnson and John Newberry were the top goal scorers with 30 apiece.



March 26, 1983 Grand Forks, North Dakota (Winter Sports Center) Attendance: 6,000

In what was to be a transition year, first year Head Coach Jeff Sauer guided the Badger Hockey team to its 4th NCAA Championship, their second in the last three years. Sauer molded the Badger squad slowly but surely and over the final two months of the season it became the best college hockey team in the country, suffering only one loss in the last 15 games. By downing the powers of the East, Wisconsin proved to the hockey world that without a doubt they are number ONE.

Wisconsin met Providence in the semi-finals of the NCAA meet and with Marc Behrend in the nets shut-out the Friars 2–0. There was no scoring in the opening period, but a carry over power play helped Wisconsin get the winning goal :37 seconds into the 2nd period. Bruce Driver and John Johannson combined to set-up Paul Houck for his seventh power-play goal of the year and his 14th winning goal. Behrend was tested only 17 times while recording his first shut-out of the season, and Wisconsin's second in NCAA Tournament action; Terry Kleisinger had one against New Hampshire in 1982. Jim Johannson tallied an open net goal with :47 seconds remaining for the final 2–0 tally. The Providence goalie was called upon to make 29 saves.

Wisconsin faced Harvard in the Championship game. Harvard advanced to the final game by beating Minnesota 5–3. The Badgers jumped out to a 3–0 lead with a goal in each of the first two periods and another goal early in the final stanza. Pat Flatley, who along with Paul Houck were named to the All-Tournament team, scored Wisconsin's first goal on a power-play midway into the 1st period. Houck and captain Bruce Driver assisted on the play. Flatley picked up his second goal of the game late in the 2nd period. Paul Houston made it 3–0 early in the 3rd, Harvard then scored two goals with Driver getting one sandwiched in between. The Badgers pulled away late in the game with Houston scoring his second at the 18:39 mark and John Johannson tallying a short-handed, empty net goal at the 19:21 mark to make it 6–2. Behrend made 24 saves in the game and for his efforts was honored as the tournament's Most Valuable Player, it was the second time he received the award having captured it in the 1981 meet. Badger defenseman Chris Chelios was the fourth Badger named to the All-Tournament team.

This marked the fourth title in eight appearances in the Final Four and their third appearance in the championship game in three years.



Colgate's game plan was wrecked in the first 3:23 by Wisconsin star John Byce. His two early goals put the Red Raiders behind the eight ball, and left them in a precarious position which they were not able to escape. The Badgers held off 'Gate 7-3, and claimed the NCAA title.

Everybody agreed that the first few minutes set the tone of the game for several reasons. Wisconsin found out that Gagnon was quite mortal in the biggest game of his collegiate career, and the Cardinal and White knew their offensive guns were clicking, unlike the previous game when the UW just escaped a very tenacious Boston College team 2-1.

Wisconsin capitalized on their first opportunity as Red Raider Steve Poapst was whistled for high sticking just :37 seconds into the game. When Byce tipped in Sean Hill's blast from the left point, it put the Badgers ahead to stay. But the telling play occurred less than two minutes later. With Colgate on the power play, Rob Mendel stole the pucked and banked it off the boards and up to Byce who was breaking ahead of the pack. He deked Gagnon and neatly deposited the puck through the netminder's pads. At 2-0, Wisconsin killed Colgate's confidence and inspired the Badger fans to raise the roof at Joe Louis Arena.

Byce described the shorthanded marker as the play developed.

"On the second goal, we were shorthanded and (Mendel) made a really nice play along the boards and tipped it past their defenseman. The other one took a spill so I was in all alone. When you get Gagnon moving, I think he opens up some space, especially between his legs. When I cut across, I had a lot of room in the five hole and that's where

Two goals by Byce and singles by Tournament MVP Chris Tancill and Rob Andringa gave Wisconsin a big 4-1 first period lead. However, with 40 minutes to play their was still plenty of time for Colgate to put together a comeback. But Dennis Snedden struck a wooden stake right through the Red Raiders' hearts with a great goal early in the second period. Snedden took a pass from Brett Kurtz, skated right around a Colgate defender and blasted the puck past netminder Dave Gagnon. At 5-1, the Badgers could taste victory and the fans could sense it as well.

Though Colgate pulled to within 6-3 midway through the third, Sauer knew that victory was there. All facets of their game were clicking, as the Badgers scored on tip-ins. perfect passing, and booming slapshots while receiving Stanley Cup style goaltending

from Duane Derksen at the other end. All this meant that the UW now stands at the top of the college hockey world.

Along with MVP honoree Chris Tancill, center John Byce, goaltender Duane Derksen, and defensemen Mark Osiecki and Rob Andringa were all selected to the 1990 NCAA All-Tournament Team

A World-Class University

he University of Wisconsin–Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW-Madison ranks as the nation's fourth largest university with 43,695 students, 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees, 5 million volumes in 44 libraries, and a \$1 billion budget. The university's national ranking of third in research and development expenditures supports its reputation as a world-class research institution.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. In what may be the most extensive survey ever done on graduate level education—the five-volume Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States—Wisconsin finished eighth in the nation, tied with Michigan and UCLA.


More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered at the UW. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's and professional degree programs.

Some of the UW's departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in recent years include Sociology, Mathematics, Chemical Engineering, Economics, Political Science, Zoology, Geography, Statistics, History, Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology, Biochemistry, Spanish and German.

Much of the university's international academic reputation stems from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 11 Nobel Prizes, with Professor Howard Temin receiving the most recent prize in 1975 for his study of retroviruses.


The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, research and public service, and education of physicians and other health professionals. It includes the professional schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy; UW Hospital and Clinics; the State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the university's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C. to the present, and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.



A Scenic Campus







The city was designed so the university and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.


Two major films, including the 1986 summer hit *Back To School* starring Rodney Dangerfield, have been shot on the picturesque UW campus.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statute of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the university's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise (the UW's tallest building at 19 stories), Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain, and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

One of the favorite areas for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside Terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and cool breezes from Lake Mendota.







The Student Body

ver 43,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 9,500 graduate students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the university still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 125 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks fifth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students. In 1989, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for 6.53 percent of the student body, an increase from 4.67 percent ten years ago.

The university's diversity also shows in the more than 500 student groups. Organizations ranging from political action groups and student newspapers to recreational clubs, fraternities and sororities allow students to extend their collegiate life beyond the classroom. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.



The Chancellor



r. Donna E. Shalala is the first woman to ever lead the UW-Madison. She assumed her position as Chancellor and Professor of Political Science and Educational Policy Studies in January, 1988.

One of Shalala's major goals has been rededicating the institution to the "Wisconsin Idea"—confirming a commitment to public service and social welfare, as well as an awareness that the borders of the university extend to the borders of the state and beyond.

Dedication to public service has been a trademark of Shalala's career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps, teaching English and working in community development. While a professor at Columbia University, Shalala served as a Director and Treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation for the City of New York, the agency set up to help solve New York City's fiscal crisis.

Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio, in 1962 and her doctoral degree from Syracuse University in 1970. She has received 14 honorary degrees, and has been elected to the National Academy of Education and National Academy of Public Administration.






Athletic Director Pat Richter

Where Wisconsin Ranks

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW-Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked third for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

In data taken from the 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States, Wisconsin tied for eighth in reputation for scholarly quality and second on the basis of faculty publications.

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality of the University of Wisconsin-Madison:

Funding

- Federal Grants: The UW ranked eighth nationally in 1987, receiving 1.8 percent of the \$8.6 billion federal budget for university research.
- Research and Development Funds: The UW ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1988, with almost \$286 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- Tuition: Over the last ten years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- Voluntary Support: The UW ranked tenth in the nation, and second among public institutions, in 1987–88 by receiving \$89 million in private support.
- Wisconsin Money Appropriated for Higher Education: Wisconsin ranked 21st in 1988–89 in the amount of state tax support appropriated for higher education per state resident.

Research and Programs

- Research Activity Index: In 1986, the UW-Madison ranked second, behind Harvard, in a new multidimensional study that ranked research activity at U.S. universities.
- **Doctoral Degrees:** Between the school's founding and 1989, the University of Wisconsin–Madison awarded 26,928 Ph.D.'s—a number few institutions in the world can match.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- **Broadcast Research:** Broadcast faculty at the UW-Madison rank second nationally in research productivity. Radio station WHA is the oldest radio station in the country. A cooperative program with UW-Extension and the Wisconsin Educational Communications Board, it has broadcast continuously since its founding in 1917.
- Business: The School of Business ranks fifth in the nation in research productivity. The faculty's scholarly output ranks first among business schools at public institutions.
- Forestry: In 1986, the UW's forestry department was named top research department in the country by the USDA.



- Journalism and Mass Communication: The faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication was rated first in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by Journalism Quarterly.
- Plant Pathology: In 1986, the UW's Plant Pathology department tied for a first place ranking with the University of California-Davis.
- **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with 5 million books in 44 locations across campus.
- **Graduates**: According to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey, the UW produced the third highest percentage of CEO's at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies.

with the oldest Scandanavian studies (1875), Psychology (1888), Agricultural Economics (1909) and Genetics (1910) departments in the United States \square as the discover of Vitamins A and B



UW Traditions



Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the UW-Madison mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as "Bucky" was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a pep rally contest was held to determine the best name for Madison's mascot. The name Buckingham U. Badger arose at the drawing and credit was given to a randomly selected sorority. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW football team to "buck right through that line."

Band Caps

When one of the Badger teams wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to UW Band Director Michael Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.

Graduating Law Students

At Homecoming, graduating law students march down the football field and throw their white canes over the cross bar of the goal post. If they catch the cane when it comes down on the other side, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW–Madison in 1910.

Halloween

In 1979, the Wisconsin Student Association began sponsoring what for years had been a spontaneous event—the annual Halloween State Street costume party. The party grew in size and fame each year as costumed revelers filled the eight blocks between the Capitol and the Mall. In 1988, WSA sponsored its first non-alcoholic indoor party at the fieldhouse.

"On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the UW–Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On Wisconsin" is currently owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music a few years ago from former Beatle Paul McCartney.


"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He came up with the idea after witnessing University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.


Abraham Lincoln Statue

Unveiled in 1909 as a gift of the sculptor Adolph Weinman, the statue is the only replica of a statue he had previously erected in Hodgenville, Kentucky—Lincoln's birthplace. However, the inscription attributes the gift to Madisonian Thomas Brittingham, who had paid for the casting of the statue and the pedestal on which it was placed.

Lincoln is considered a patron of the university because he signed the Morrill Act in 1862 that provided federal aid to land-grant colleges such as UW-Madison. Tradition holds that Lincoln stands up when a virtuous coed passes by.



Historic Buildings at the UW



Bascom Hall

Bascom Hall was constructed in stages to become the large building it is today. Bascom was originally called University Hall and later Main Hall. In 1920 it was renamed for John Bascom, president from 1874 to 1887. The architecture is of the classic Italian High Renaissance (Federal classic), Wren-modified. The building's original ornate dome was destroyed by fire in 1916. Bascom Hall houses the UW–Madison's main administrative offices including the Chancellor's office, Dean of Students office and Graduate School. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Bascom Hill Historic District.

Camp Randall

During the Civil War, Camp Randall was used as both a training ground, the state's largest Army staging point, and a hospital and stockade for confederate prisoners. Today it is owned by the university and is the home of intercollegiate athletic and recreational facilities, a small park, and the Memorial Arch, completed in 1912.

Memorial Library

Dedicated to those who died in our nation's wars, Memorial Library is the main research library. Along with the catalog for the holdings for campus libraries, Memorial houses the Mills Music Library, the official archives of the university, and an extensive rare books collection.

Memorial Union


Memorial Union has been called the "living room of the campus." With additions added steadily over the last half century, the Union now includes several dining rooms, theaters, study halls and game rooms, as well as the lakeside Terrace. In 1933, Memorial Union became the first public university union in the country to sell beer.

North and South Halls

North Hall was the first building erected by the university (1851), serving as a dormitory for male students. Later it was converted into a classroom and office space. In 1966, North Hall became a National Historic Landmark.

South Hall has had a wide variety of uses, including housing the old Department of Agriculture and the Hygenic Laboratory. Now it houses the dean and administrative staff of the College of Letters and Science.








The Community

adison is the home of both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital, in addition to being one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities.

With a diverse population of 180,000, the Madison community offers an endearing quality of life, both for its full-time residents and students. It offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town atmosphere. It is a family-, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on such factors as quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.



Red Gym

Built in the Norman style in 1894, with Romanesque arches and heavy turrets, the Red Gym was originally intended as an armory and a gymnasium for men's physical education. A fire during the Vietnam protest era closed the gym for a few months in 1970. The building was included in the Bascom Hill Historic District in 1974. The report of a campus committee studying renovation in 1989 called the gym "a gateway building to the campus because of its central location and its historic architecture—a friendly and welcoming place for visitors, prospective students and their parents, and primarily undergraduates from all our academic schools and colleges."

Van Hise Hall

Built in 1967, at 19 stories, Van Hise is the tallest building on campus. The 17th floor houses the administration of the University of Wisconsin System. Van Hise Hall is to the UW System what Bascom Hall is to UW-Madison. Several foreign language departments make their homes here, and classrooms are located in the lower five floors.





University Athletic Officials

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR Pat Richter

P at Richter ushered in a new era in University of Wisconsin athletics when he accepted the position of athletic director on December 15, 1989.

"This has been the only university in my life," he said at his initital press conference. "Good things happened to me here. Now I hope I can make it happen for others."


One of the most distinguished athletes in UW history, Richter is committed to a proud University of Wisconsin athletic tradition—one that calls for excellence both in the classroom and on the playing field.

"That commitment is to provide the student-athletes with a very rewarding experience," Richter explained. "You don't want them to leave here and say it's been four years and now I'm gone. When I left here 26 years ago, this was something that went with me for the rest of my life.

"This is a tremendous opportunity for me," he added. "It's exciting to be a part of a program that is going in the right direction. We intend to build the University of Wisconsin athletic program to the level of excellence of the rest of the university."

"Pat Richter is one of Wisconsin's greatest sports heroes, a UW Law School graduate, a successful businessman with strong leadership quali-





ties and a man of complete integrity," commented UW-Madison Chancellor Donna E. Shalala. "He is a wonderful role model for all of our student-athletes."

A 48-year-old native of Madison, Richter has been on a cross-country whirlwind of speaking engagements, promotional events, booster outings, appearances at civic functions, and administrative meetings during his first year at the helm. He is in constant demand, and is a shining symbol of the renewed enthusiasm surrounding UW Athletics.

One of Richter's first assignments as athletic director was to hire the best football coach he could find. He accomplished that impressively with the naming of highly touted Barry Alvarez in January, 1990.


His first year at the helm of the UW athletic program has also witnessed an NCAA ice hockey championship, the running exploits of all-America and NCAA champion Suzy Favor, and a trip to London, England, and the Henley Regatta for the Badgers' national championship varsity crew team.


Clearly, University of Wisconsin Athletics are on the upswing. And with Pat Richter at the controls, the decade of the 1990s promises great things for Badger sports fans everywhere.

An Athletic, Academic and Professional Success Story

As a 6–6, 230-pound student-athlete at the University of Wisconsin, Richter excelled in football, basketball and baseball. He earned three varsity letters in each, and still stands as the school's last nine-time letterwinner. He achieved all-America (1961, 1962), academic all-America (1962), and all-







Big Ten (1961, 1962) honors in football as an end, helping the Badgers to the 1962 Big Ten championship and a berth in the memorable 1963 Rose Bowl game vs USC—a game in which he set the current Rose Bowl record of 11 pass receptions for 163 yards. Richter led the Big Ten in pass receiving in both 1961 and 1962 and ranks third on the school's career receiving list with 110 catches for 1,710 yards and 14 touchdowns. After his senior football season, he was the recipient of the UW's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (for proficiency in scholarship and athletics), received the Knute Rockne Memorial Award as the country's top lineman from the Washington Touchdown Club, and was selected to play in both the *Chicago Tribune* All-Star and Hula Bowl post-season games.

As an outfielder for the Wisconsin baseball team, he earned first team all–Big Ten honors in 1963, owned a career batting average of .353, and led the Badgers in hits, home runs and RBI's three straight years. In one game during the 1962 season, he hit two home runs vs eventual NCAA champion Michigan, including a two-run blast with two out in the final inning. Richter, in fact, once said that he thought baseball might have been his best sport. And somewhat ironically, he originally went to the UW on a basketball scholarship.

Richter earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Landscape Architecture from the UW in 1964 and was interested in designing golf courses and swimming pools.

Following his collegiate career, he was a first round draft choice of the National Football League's Washington Redskins and played as both an end and a punter for the 'Skins from 1963–71. He caught three touchdown

passes from QB Sonny Jurgensen for the Redskins in their 1968 season opener against the Chicago Bears in the Windy City. In 1969, he played under legendary coach Vince Lombardi, later recalling it as "perhaps my greatest learning experience in terms of how to look at life in general."

After retiring from pro football, he returned to earn his law degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1971.

Richter spent the next six months with a Madison law firm, then went to work with Oscar Mayer Foods Corporation until returning to the UW campus as athletic director last December. With Oscar Mayer, he held several titles in corporate offices in Madison, Nashville, and Rye Brook and White Plains, New York. Most recently, he served as Vice-President of Personnel at the company's head office in Madison.

In January of 1988, he was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for his post-college achievements and was inducted into the Wisconsin State Athletic Hall of Fame in November, 1988. He is also a member of the American Bar Association, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the Madison Sports Hall of Fame. He assists in fundraising for local children's charities and the UW Children's Hospital, and works with the Four Lakes Boy Scouts.

Among Richter's favorites pastimes are playing squash, racquetball and golf. He and his lovely wife, Renee, have four children—Scott, 26, Brad, 24, Barry, 20, and Tim, 15. His son, Barry, is a standout winger with the national champion University of Wisconsin hockey team.

HOME OF THE BADGERS

THE DANE COUNTY MEMORIAL COLISEUM



Home ice for the University of Wisconsin Hockey Team is the impressive Dane County Memorial Coliseum, one of college hockey's finest all-around facilities and home to the NCAA Division I attendance leader for 21 consecutive seasons.

With theater-style seating for 8,644, the Dane County Coliseum is the second largest collegiate ice facility in the nation. The ice surface is an impressive 200' by 85', making for fast-paced, free-wheeling action.

Inside the Coliseum, the hockey Badgers make use of dressing room facilities as fine as any in the country. Each player is assigned a comfortable, spacious dressing stall (3 1/2×6) for practice and game equipment as well as personal belongings. Located just adjacent to the University of Wisconsin dressing room is a modern training room which includes a whirlpool and all the various modalities and exercise equipment for treatment of rehabilitation of injuries.

The Badgers also have at their disposal a newly-renovated and fully-equipped weight room located inside the Coliseum.

Recognized as the home of some of the nation's best collegiate hockey fans, the Dane County Coliseum and the University of Wisconsin hockey team have

attracted the nation's largest crowds every year since the Badgers initially joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for the 1969–70 season.

The University of Wisconsin has led the nation in college hockey attendance for 21 consecutive seasons dating back to 1970! Some 4,042,843 Badger fans have watched UW hockey teams in the Coliseum since 1967. And since 1969, the UW has drawn 3,660,848 for 440 home dates (not counting exhibitions)—an average of 8,320 per game!

In the 1981–82 season, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set the all-time NCAA season record, while the 1978–79 average attendance of 8,654 is still an NCAA and UW record.

Along with some of the country's best fans, the Badgers can lay claim to one of the college game's best home ice records. University of Wisconsin hockey teams have a won-loss-tie record of 404–147–20 over 571 games since 1963 (through '89-90) for a winning percentage of .725!

As you might guess, witnessing a University of Wisconsin game in the jampacked Dane County Coliseum is truly one of the great thrills in collegiate sports.





1990 BANK ONE BADGER HOCKEY SHOWDOWN

The University of Wisconsin, the Bradley Center and Banc One Wisconsin Corporation are pleased to bring to Wisconsin hockey fans the second annual 'Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown', an annual Christmas holiday college hockey tournament held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The inaugural 'showdown' was a tremendous success, as the tournament drew over 30,000 fans to the two-day event.

During the Christmas holiday period each year, the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown is contested at the state-of-the-art, 18,000 seat Bradley Center sports facility. The Bradley Center, which is considered by most to be the finest hockey arena in the United States, is located in the heart of beautiful downtown Milwaukee. In addition, the Bradley Center has also been awarded the 1993 NCAA Ice Hockey Championships.

This year's matchups find North Dakota facing off against Bowling Green at 5:00 pm CST and Wisconsin playing St. Lawrence at 8:00 pm CST on Friday, December 28. Saturday's schedule will feature the third place game (loser of game one vs loser of game two) at 6:00 pm CST with the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown championship game set for 9:00 pm CST.

In last year's first-ever 'showdown', the host Wisconsin Badgers came away with the Pettit Cup, beating the Eagles of Boston College 6–3 in the championship game in front of 16,674 enthusiastic hockey fans. Wisconsin advanced to the championship game with a 9–3 win over Notre Dame on Thursday, while Boston College came away 3–2 victors over Minnesota–Duluth to advance to the main event. In Friday's third place game, Duluth had no trouble with the Fighting Irish, beating Notre Dame 9–1.

Tickets for the 1990 Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown are available at the Bradley Center box office, corner of Fourth and State Streets in Milwaukee, or any Ticketron outlet.

The Bradley Center, located on the corner of Fourth and State Streets, covers more than a city block and is within walking distance of such luxury hotels as the Hyatt Regency, Marc Plaza, and the new Wyndham Hotel. Tournament headquarters will be at the Hyatt Regency.

The Bradley Center features the integration of classical architectural elements with state-of-the-art engineering and technology. There are four dramatic entryways leading into the facility, one on each corner of the building. Each entryway is reached through a a progression of visually exciting spaces: a tree-lined plaza, leading through an exterior portico into a 28-foot high, glass-enclosed vestibule, which

opens onto a stunning 60-foot high, 17,500 squarefoot lobby, also totally glass enclosed. Inside each lobby, double rows of concrete columns with flametreated granite bases rise almost 70 feet to support a spectacular skylight system. Each atrium is further enhanced by special lighting.


Two elevators, 16 escalators and various stairways take spectators to the seating area. Seating is comfortably arranged in an oblong octogon that provides spectators with an unrestricted view of the playing surface and the centrally located, four-sided video scoreboard.

The first level accommodates approximately 8,000 spectators. The second level features private suites that encircle the arena and provide seating for nine to 12 people per suite. The third level seats approximately 10,000 spectators in 21 rows of seats.

The Bradley Center has a total of 12 concession stands; eight of which sell traditional concession food and refreshments. The other four sell special deli-style sandwiches, pizza, pasta, chili, soups and other foods. Each stand is equipped with two to six closed circuit TV monitors.



Bradley Center patrons won't miss a moment of action with the center's use of state-of-the-art video technology. The centerpiece of this system is a four-sided Fair-Play video scoreboard, each face consists of a 9x12-foot video screen. Four GE Talaria Multiple Light Valve color video projectors are mounted inside the scoreboard. By using two light valves and two lamps in one projector, the system can project images of maximum brightness, depth and clarity. There are over 200 video monitors located throughout the center.








