College Hockey's Top Facility: The Kohl Center

On Oct. 3, 1998, the UW hockey team opened play in its new home – the 15,237-seat Kohl Center. The second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country marks its seventh year as home of Wisconsin hockey.

The facility is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single-largest private donation in UW history.

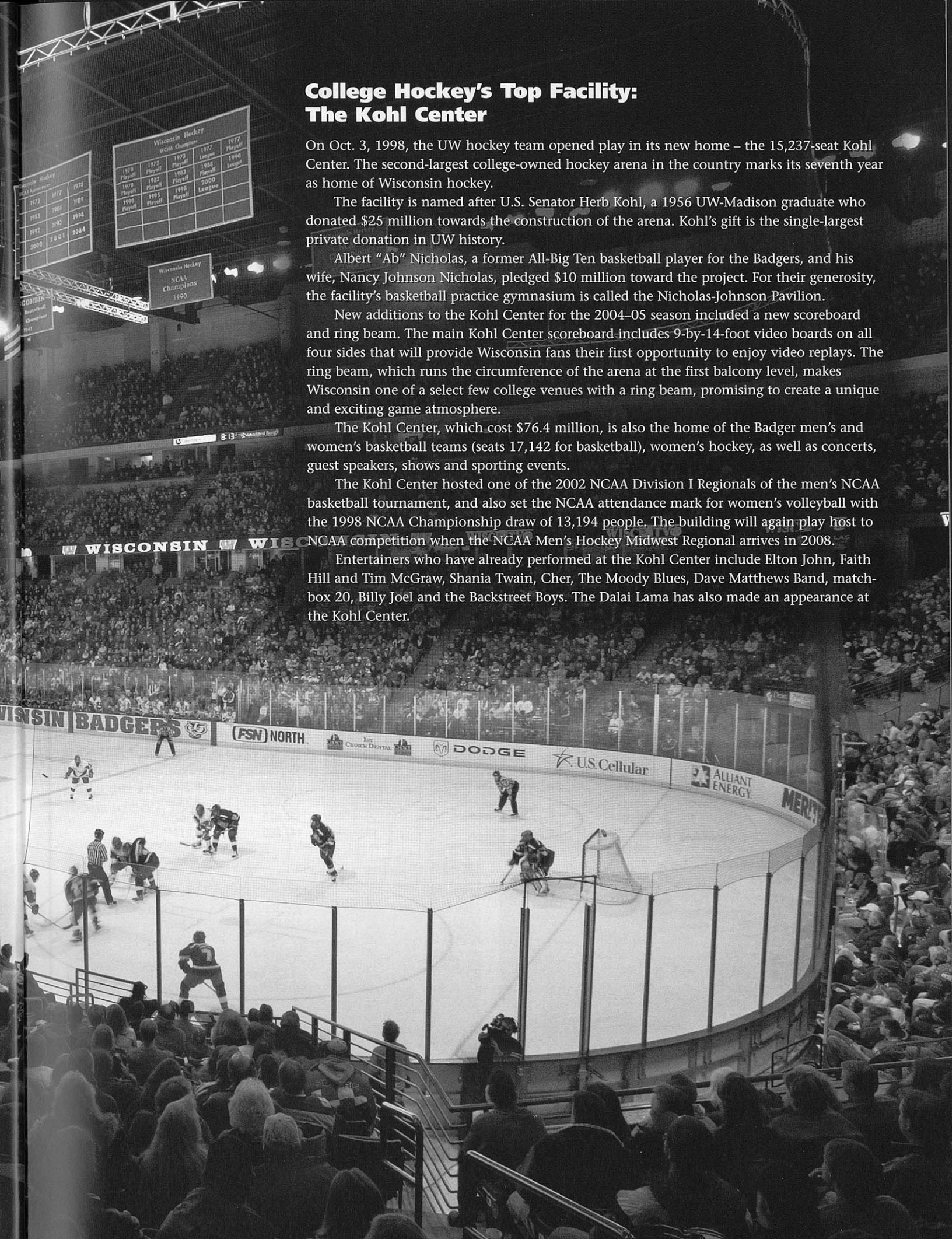
Albert "Ab" Nicholas, a former All-Big Ten basketball player for the Badgers, and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's basketball practice gymnasium is called the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.

New additions to the Kohl Center for the 2004–05 season included a new scoreboard and ring beam. The main Kohl Center scoreboard includes 9-by-14-foot video boards on all four sides that will provide Wisconsin fans their first opportunity to enjoy video replays. The ring beam, which runs the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level, makes Wisconsin one of a select few college venues with a ring beam, promising to create a unique and exciting game atmosphere.

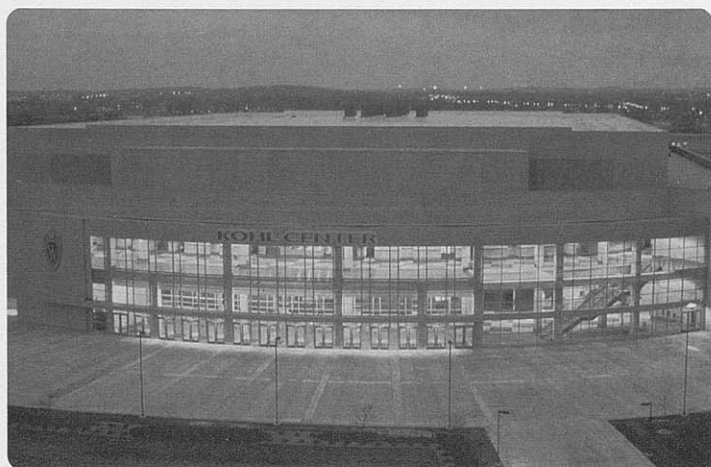
The Kohl Center, which cost \$76.4 million, is also the home of the Badger men's and women's basketball teams (seats 17,142 for basketball), women's hockey, as well as concerts, guest speakers, shows and sporting events.

The Kohl Center hosted one of the 2002 NCAA Division I Regionals of the men's NCAA basketball tournament, and also set the NCAA attendance mark for women's volleyball with the 1998 NCAA Championship draw of 13,194 people. The building will again play host to NCAA competition when the NCAA Men's Hockey Midwest Regional arrives in 2008.

Entertainers who have already performed at the Kohl Center include Elton John, Faith Hill and Tim McGraw, Shania Twain, Cher, The Moody Blues, Dave Matthews Band, match-box 20, Billy Joel and the Backstreet Boys. The Dalai Lama has also made an appearance at the Kohl Center.

NCAA Attendance Leaders

Wisconsin has led the nation in attendance for the past seven seasons and 31 times since 1969-70. The Badgers set the NCAA record when an average of 12,153 attended UW hockey games in 1998-99, and have since come close to surpassing that mark.

The Badgers sold out the 15,237-seat Kohl Center five times in 2004-05 and totaled 274,979 in 23 home dates to set the NCAA record for season attendance, set the year prior by the UW.

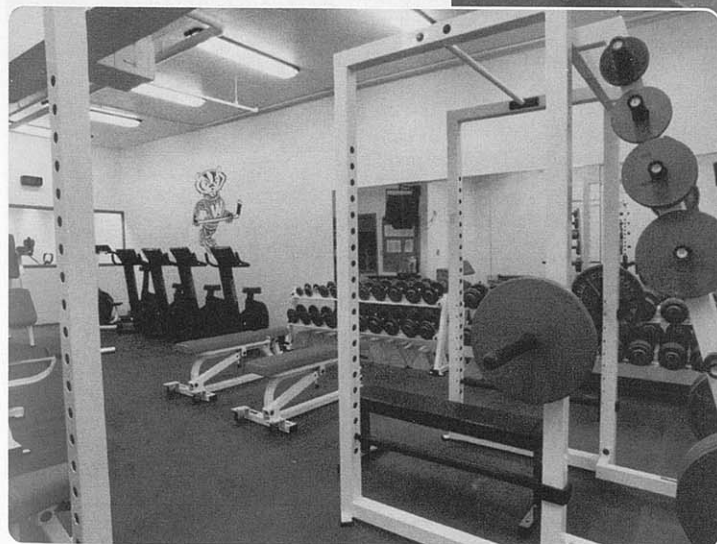
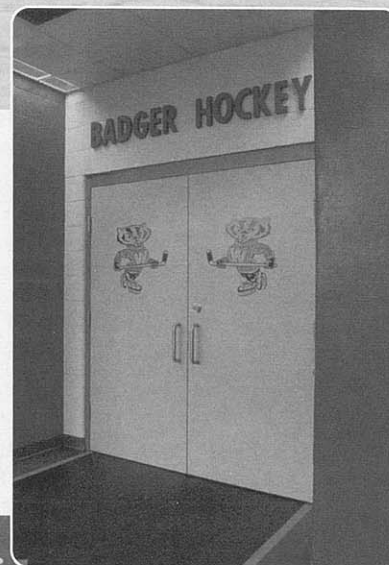
The Bob Johnson Hockey Facility is one of the premier hockey training facilities in the nation.

The facility is named after legendary Wisconsin head coach Bob Johnson, who directed the Badgers to three NCAA

championships during his tenure from 1966-82. Johnson also coached the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team, as well as the NHL's Calgary Flames and Pittsburgh Penguins. He led the Penguins to their first Stanley Cup title during the 1990-91 season.

The complex, featuring state-of-the-art amenities for Badger hockey players, includes weight room and training room areas directly accessible from the main locker room area. Players have a private changing area equipped with personal lockers, and both the coaches and players have their own lounges.

The Bob Johnson Hockey Facility is conveniently located between the Alliant Energy Center's Veterans Memorial Coliseum and the Arena for easy access to both ice sheets.

- Wisconsin's schedule is filled with special events as the Badgers compete in the annual College Hockey Showcase against Michigan State and Michigan in November, play host to USA Hockey's U-18 Team and the 17th annual Badger Hockey Showdown in December and compete in the Frozen Tundra Classic at Lambeau Field against Ohio State in February. The contest will also serve as the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game.

- Wisconsin is the host school for the 2006 NCAA Men's Frozen Four, April 6 and 8 at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee.

- Head coach Mike Eaves begins his fourth season behind the UW bench. In 57 years of varsity ice hockey at Wisconsin, he is now the fourth most senior hockey coach in school history

behind Jeff Sauer (20 years), Bob Johnson (15) and Art Thomsen (five).

- A pair of Badgers can become the first players since Dany Heatley in 2000-01 to reach 100 career points. Senior Ryan MacMurchy begins the season with 85 points, while junior Robbie Earl boasts 71 career points. A handful of additional skaters including juniors Andrew Joudrey (46 points), Ross Carlson (46 points), Jake Dowell (45 points) and sophomore Joe Pavelski (45 points) appear poised to challenge the mark in coming years.

- New personnel joins the UW coaching staff as Kevin Patrick enters the fold. Patrick spent the previous three seasons as an assistant at Bowling Green State. He also spent time as an assistant coach at Union College.

- For the first time in four seasons, Bernd Brückler will not man the UW goal. Instead, junior Brian Elliott takes over the lead role. Elliott boasts gaudy numbers through limited action in two seasons, including a 9-3-1 record, 1.57 goals-against average and .930 save percentage.

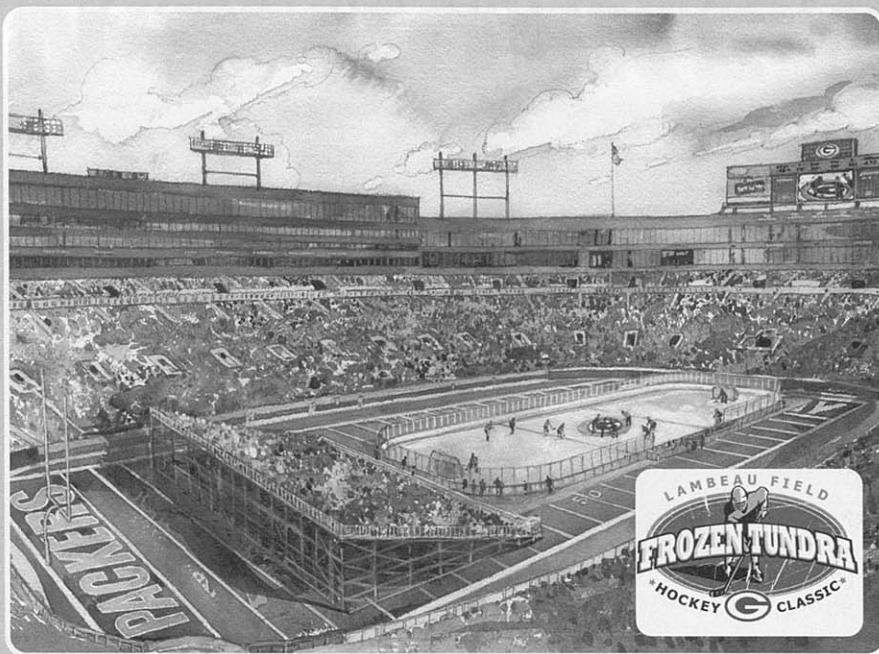
- Senior Adam Burish will serve his second season as team captain, marking the eighth time in school history a captain repeated duties and the fifth time one

repeated in the capacity as the team's lone captain.

- Wisconsin returns nearly all its scoring from 2004-05 as players accounting for 333 of 341 points (97.7 percent) and 124 of 127 goals (97.6 percent) will skate for the 2005-06 Badgers.
- Twelve Badgers have been drafted by NHL teams for the second-straight season. Freshman Jack Skille was the lone UW skater drafted in 2005. He was taken seventh overall by the Chicago Blackhawks. Other draft choices include the Chicago Blackhawks' Adam Burish, Matthew Ford and Jake Dowell, the Anaheim Mighty Ducks' Matt Auffrey and Kyle Klubertanz, the Edmonton Oilers' Tom Gilbert, the St. Louis Blues' Ryan MacMurchy, the Ottawa Senators' Brian Elliott, the Toronto Maple Leafs' Robbie Earl, the Washington Capitals' Andrew Joudrey and the San Jose Sharks' Joe Pavelski.
- For the second-straight season, 13 Badgers hail from the State of Wisconsin.
- There is one number change for the 2005-06 campaign as rearguard Kyle Klubertanz goes from No. 2 to No. 20.
- Wisconsin continues its unrivaled fan support as it broke its own NCAA total attendance record in 2004-05. The UW attracted 274,979 fans to 23 home dates, surpassing its 23-game mark of 269,123 set in 2003-04. An average of 11,956 people watched Badger home games, the best in the nation and the second-highest average in NCAA history behind the UW's 1998-99 average of 12,153. The average gave UW its seventh-consecutive NCAA attendance title and 31st overall.
- Wisconsin can post three consecutive 20-win campaigns for the first time since skating 14 seasons from 1980-81 through 1995-96 with at least 20 wins. It would also mark the 31st time the team posted 20 wins in school history.
- The Kohl Center will play host to UW men's hockey home playoff games for the foreseeable future as the Wisconsin State High School Girls' Basketball Tournament moved to Madison's Veteran's Memorial Coliseum.
- The University of Wisconsin was awarded the 2008 NCAA Midwest Regional in men's hockey. The Kohl Center will play host to the event between March 28-30, 2008. The Pepsi Center in Denver will serve as the home of the 2008 NCAA Men's Frozen Four.



FROZEN TUNDRA HOCKEY CLASSIC

Known throughout the world as the Frozen Tundra, Lambeau Field's nickname will take on a whole new meaning when the Green Bay Packers host a college hockey game at the historic stadium. Lambeau Field will be converted into an outdoor ice hockey stadium for the Frozen Tundra Hockey Classic on February 11, 2006, featuring the Wisconsin Badgers skating against the Ohio State Buckeyes.

"The Packers organization is honored to join two outstanding collegiate hockey programs in creating a new chapter in the history of Lambeau Field," said John Jones, Packers Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer. "Wisconsin and Ohio State have produced many great football players for the Packers and the NFL. Now the Badger and Buckeye hockey players get a chance to compete on Lambeau Field."

The Badgers and the Buckeyes will face off at 3 p.m., Saturday, Feb. 11.

"I am very pleased and excited that our men's hockey team will have the opportunity to take part in this historic event," said UW Athletics Director Barry Alvarez. "I know Coach Eaves, his staff and players are looking forward to it. It's going to be a great event for players and fans alike."

The portable rink will be set up on the north half of Lambeau Field. Total seating of 38,000-40,000 is expected for the game, including indoor club seats and private boxes. Portable bleachers will be placed on the field at the south end of the rink.

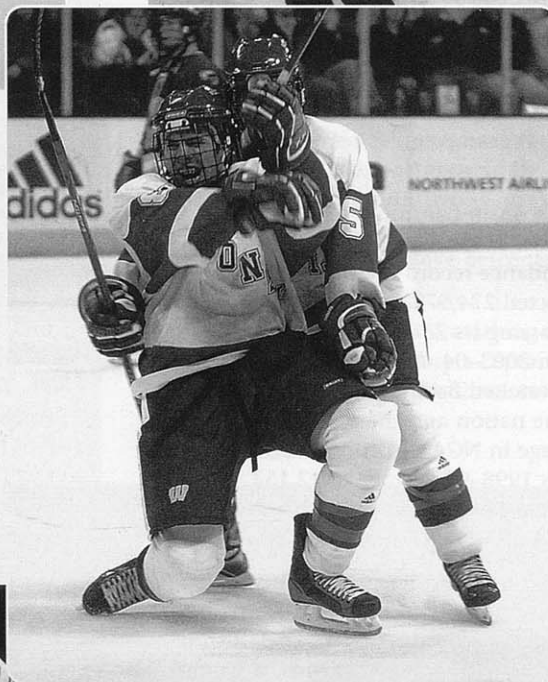
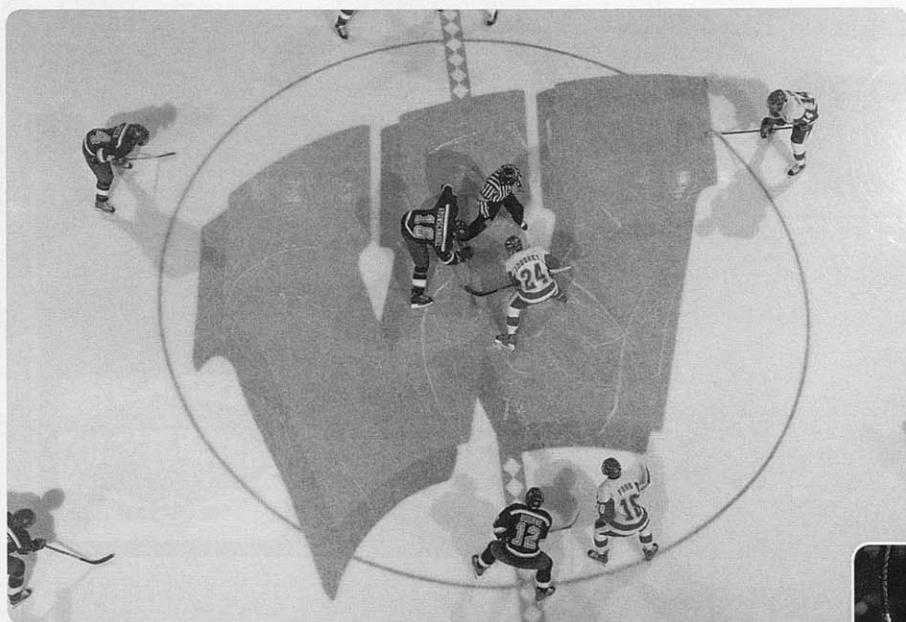
"This is going to be an event, not just a hockey game," said UW Hockey Coach Mike Eaves. "It will be something that the players, coaching staff and everyone involved will remember for a lifetime. It will be something for these young men to share with their kids, that they played in a football stadium in the middle of February in Green Bay."

Ohio State hockey coach John Markell said it's an honor to be part of the Frozen Tundra Hockey Classic. "This game will bring a lot of recognition to college hockey. Only six teams in North America have had the opportunity to play in an outdoor game in a large stadium and we're privileged to be one of them," Markell said. "Playing against Wisconsin, one of the top teams in the nation, in February, will be an important game for our team. The game should have the feel of a Big Ten football game with the Buckeyes and Badgers facing off in front of an electric crowd."

Tickets for the Frozen Tundra Hockey Classic will be \$24 for adults, \$16 for UW students, \$14 for children and \$45 for indoor club seats. Details on when and how tickets will be available will be announced later.

Ryan MacMurchy powers past a Ferris State defenseman at last year's Badger Hockey Showdown.

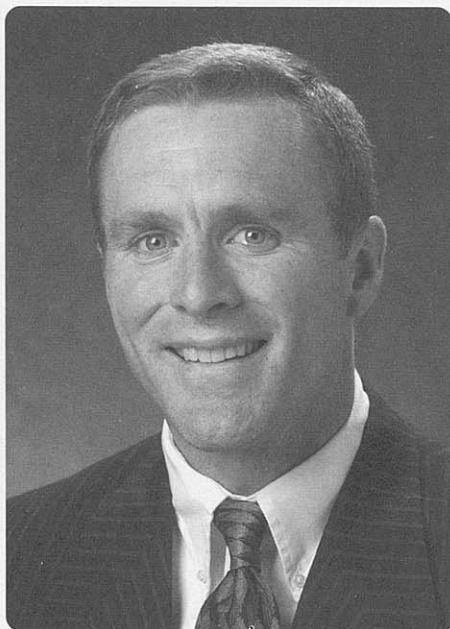

Head Coach Mike Eaves



After a playing career that ended with the most prolific scoring numbers in Wisconsin hockey history and an NCAA title, Mike Eaves returned to his alma mater for the 2002-03 season as the fifth coach in the modern era of Badger hockey. Eaves enters his fourth season directing the program and continues adding to his Badger legacy with each passing year.

In just his second season behind the bench, Eaves led his charges to one of the largest improvements in college hockey and to within one goal of an NCAA Frozen Four appearance. Included in the run was a national-best 15-game unbeaten streak, a third-place finish in the WCHA standings and national rankings as high as No. 3.

The Badgers continued their improvement in 2004-05 by qualifying for their first WCHA Final Five under Eaves, spending a league-best 10 weeks in first place in the WCHA standings and leading the conference in defense and penalty killing, while upping their goal average by a half goal per game.

He returned to the UW after spending two seasons as the head coach of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program (NTDP). A program designed to accelerate the development of elite under-20 American hockey players, Eaves led the group to a gold medal at the 2002 IIHF World Under-18 Championship in Piestany, Slovakia, the first-ever gold medal for the United States at the event. Eaves and his team clinched the gold with a 3-1 victory over Russia to end the tourney with a 7-1-0 record. Excluding the Olympics, it was the first gold medal won by a U.S. national team at an IIHF World Championship since 1933.

Eaves' encore performance came when he directed the U.S. National Junior Team at the 2004 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship to the country's first gold medal in that tournament.

Eaves' coaching days began in 1985 with the Calgary Flames (assistant) and since then he has held assistant coaching positions with the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins and Philadelphia Flyers, and head coaching posts with the Helsinki Finnish Elite League, Shattuck (Minn.) St. Mary's High School and the Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League (AHL). He also spent one season at St. Cloud State (assistant coach) and one season at UW-Eau Claire (head coach).

Eaves has represented the U.S. in international competition both as a player and coach. He skated as a forward for Team USA at both the 1981 and 1984 Canada Cup tournaments and was a member of the 1976 and 1978 U.S. National Teams at the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) World Championships. As a coach, Eaves served as an assistant under Bob Johnson for Team USA at the 1991 Canada Cup and was also an assistant coach for the 1991 U.S. National Team at the IIHF World Championship in Finland.

Eaves was recruited to play at Wisconsin by the legendary "Badger Bob"

Johnson. He became both a standout student-athlete and one of the greatest players in Badger hockey history (1974-78). A first-team All-American as a junior and senior, Eaves is the UW's career scoring leader with 267 points (94-173) in 160 games. He helped lead the Badgers to the 1977 NCAA title by scoring 28 goals and 53 assists for 81 points during that championship season. He assisted on three goals in the championship game, including the game winner just 23 seconds into overtime, a 6-5 win over Michigan.

Hockey and coaching were two things Eaves grew up around. His father, Cecil, won an NCAA title at the University of Denver (1956-57) and is also credited with helping to start the hockey program at Ohio State. He was the head coach at the University of Windsor (Ontario) and is a past director of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA).

His brother Murray lettered two years at Michigan (1978-80) before playing for the Winnipeg Jets (1980-86) and the Detroit Red Wings (1987-88). He currently is the head coach at Shattuck St. Mary's High School.

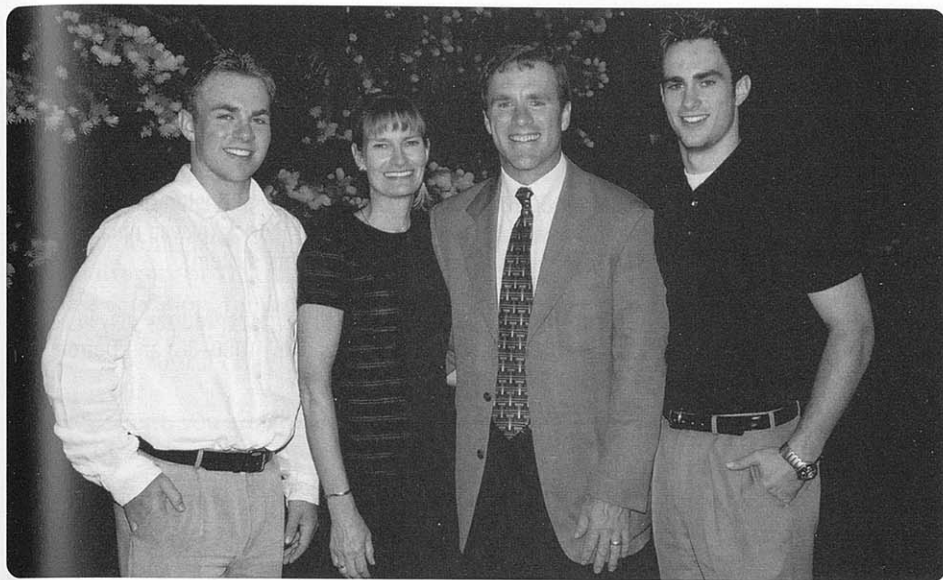
A native of Denver, Colo., Mike and his wife, Beth, are the parents of two sons—Ben and Patrick—who both boast college hockey ties to Boston College. Ben captained the BC hockey team in 2003-04, while Patrick spent three years with the Eagles before signing with the Ottawa Senators this past summer.

Ben became the third member of the Eaves family to win a national title when Boston College won the 2001 NCAA Championship.

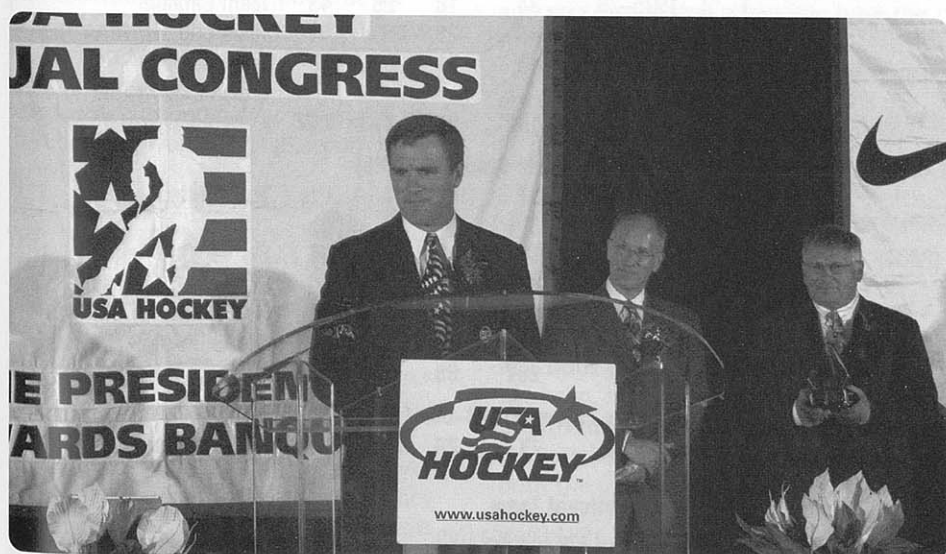

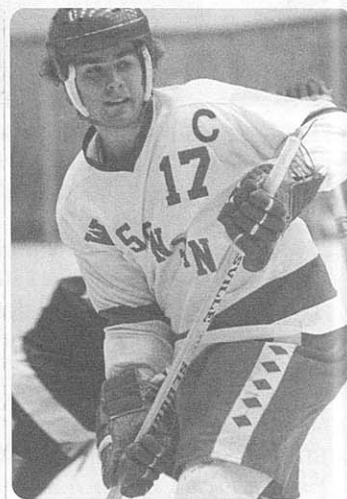
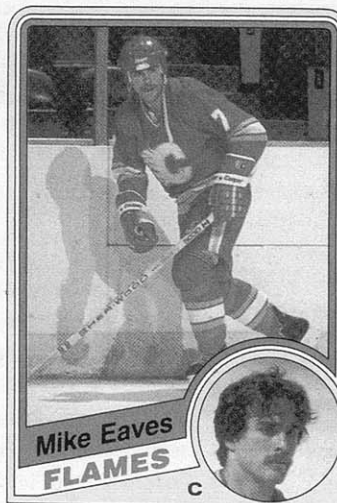

Q&A with Coach Eaves

Why should a student-athlete come to the UW?

Everything a student-athlete would want out of their collegiate experience is here at the University of Wisconsin. From the first-class education, the faculty and staff, the incredible social experiences, top-rate facilities, a beautiful campus—this university has it all.

As a student, you are attending one of the finest institutions around. As a student-athlete, the UW is one of the top athletic programs in the nation. The campus also has so much to offer with the lakes and its natural beauty. These things are why I decided many years ago to attend Wisconsin.

Did you ever think you would someday be the head coach at your alma mater?

Not right away. When I graduated from the UW, my next step was the NHL and trying to make a living playing professional hockey, so coaching wasn't something I was thinking about at that point in my life. Once you establish yourself as a pro athlete, you want to know how good you can be and how long you can play at that level. I was able to play at that level for eight years.

But then having to retire early from playing, my education then afforded me options that I would not have had otherwise. Instead of being limited because of not having an education, I had several options. My education allowed me to get into coaching and at one point in the early 90s, I did think it would be nice to get back to Madison and coach. After a few years of coaching at various levels, you are able to understand the scope of the coaching world and what path is best for you.

With the way things unfolded the opportunity arose again, so I decided to put my name in the hat to see what happened.

What is your coaching philosophy?

That's a tough question to answer concisely. Over time, I've come to realize that your coaching philosophy can come down to how other teams talk about you. 'Man they are hard to play against. They play hard and compete. They play smart and don't hurt themselves. They play as a team.' When teams talk about you in these terms with those comments then you have something that can become a

great foundation for a successful program. That is what our philosophy is. We want to play hard, play smart and play as a team.

What are some of the characteristics you want to see out of your players?

Playing hard and having good work habits is at the base of what we want established here and what we will do right away with our young players. Once we've got that in place, we teach them what our definition of playing smart is. We put them in game situations and give each player feedback on playing smart in key situations and creating opportunities we can take advantage of.

If you have a group of players that aren't necessarily the most talented but they play as a team, you are going to be successful. If you can forecheck as a unit of five, if you can forecheck in the neutral zone as a unit of five, if you can play defensive hockey as a unit of five, you are collectively better than if you had five superstars on the ice.

What are the strengths of this staff?

Where Mark and I have been able to be, and where Kevin is coming from, lends itself to having experience as a strength for the coaching staff.

Another strength is our ability to be teachers. That is all our educational backgrounds, which lends itself to working with student-athletes at this level. You have to help them get to a higher level and you can do that when you have the mindset of a teacher.

Mark brings a vast amount of experience to his coaching expertise. He's played minor league hockey all the way to the NHL and so he's got a wide range of experiences to share. He has lots of experience and contacts in the recruiting world, as well.

Kevin already had deep roots established with recruiting contacts and understands how to work within the functions of a university. Wherever he has been, his teams have made notable improvements within three years.

Both Mark and Kevin will work on both the offensive and defensive side of the puck.

With Bill Howard, everybody sees his work with our goaltenders, which speaks for itself. But Howie has been around the game a long time and is able to give tips

to our players in all areas of the game. He has been around the WCHA for such a long time and has almost become our consultant in terms of the game.

The one guy that doesn't get enough recognition is Mike Potenza. We put such an emphasis on strength and conditioning and people don't see all the work he does, not only during the season, but in the offseason in helping our guys. Part of our protocol is to have our guys play hard. In order to play hard, you have to be in great condition. In order to play effectively hard, you have to win the one-on-one battles and he gives us the best chance of being successful in those two areas because what he does off the ice. He does a great job for us.

What's it feel like to succeed 'Badger' Bob Johnson and Jeff Sauer?

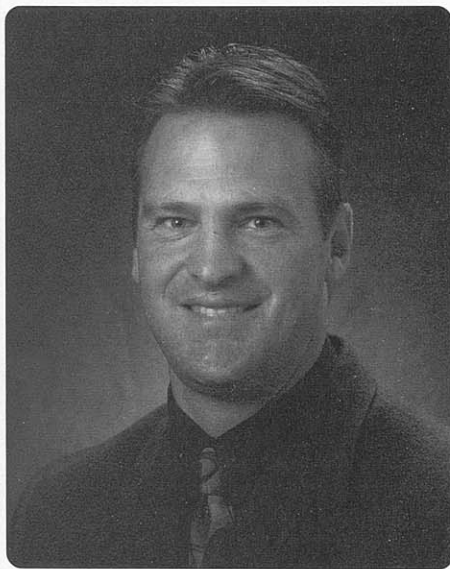
First of all, it's an honor. These gentlemen have come in and created a rich tradition of coaching here. They were here a long time and were very successful. The tradition that has been created here is something you can draw on for strength and inspiration. But after that, it goes back to day-to-day functions and what we can control day in and day out. If we are successful in our day-to-day activities, we give ourselves the best chance of doing what these gentlemen did and have a long prosperous career and be successful.

What is your greatest moment or experience as a coach?

The under-20 world championship—any time you become a world champion, that is a special moment. We went undefeated and played six world-class games in 11 days. Whenever you win something hard, you're not going to back into it. You have to defeat good teams to get it done. We had to beat the Russians, we had to beat the Fins in the semifinal, 2-1, and then we had to defeat Canada in a gold medal game that saw us down 3-1 going into the third period. Nothing was given to us. We earned it.

It was special from two standpoints. No. 1 because almost 70 percent of the team played together on the under-18 world champions so we knew each other very well. No. 2, we had three Badgers on that team and so it was an experience we could share among ourselves and bring back to help us be better here.

Assistant Coach Mark Osiecki



Former Badger defensemen Mark Osiecki looks to continue his impact in his second season as a Badger assistant coach. Osiecki has already proven himself an asset with his tireless recruiting efforts and coaching expertise.

Osiecki joined Wisconsin from the Green Bay Gamblers of the United States Hockey League (USHL), where he served as general manager and head coach for seven seasons. Compiling a 209-154-6-38 (won-loss-tie-overtime loss) mark during his career with the Gamblers, Osiecki became known for player development, as more than 65 of his players moved on to NCAA Division I hockey playing careers and 17 were drafted by NHL teams. Included among that collegiate group are current Badgers Adam Burish, A.J. Degenhardt, Kyle Klubertanz and Josh Engel, as well as former Badgers John Eichelberger and Dan Boeser. USHL Coach of the Year in 1999, Osiecki's Gambler squads won four-straight USHL Eastern Division crowns from 1999 to 2002, captured the 2000 Clark Cup as the USHL playoff champion and finished as U.S. junior A 2000 runner-up.

His Gambler squads set various team and league records during his tenure. The four-straight division championships set the league standard, while the 1999 team set the league mark for shutouts and road wins in a season. His teams in 1998 and 1999 set the team record for fewest goals against in a season.

Osiecki returned to his college coaching roots in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association where he began his

career as an assistant coach with the University of North Dakota. During the 1996-97 season with North Dakota, he helped direct UND to WCHA regular-season and playoff titles and the NCAA championship.

Osiecki also boasts international coaching experience, capturing silver medals as head coach for the United States Under-18 Team at the 1999 World Championships in Slovakia and as an assistant coach for the U.S. Under-18 Team at the 2000 World Championships in the Czech Republic. Beyond that, he led the United States Junior Select team to a gold medal at the 1999 Freedom Challenge in Lake Placid, N.Y.

The former Badger defenseman skated for Wisconsin from 1987-90, earning three letters and serving as one of the assistant captains for the 1990 NCAA Championship team. During the national championship season, he collected career-highs with 38 assists and 43 points, while earning selection to the Frozen Four all-tournament team.

A Burnsville, Minn., native, Osiecki was selected in the 1987 National Hockey League Entry Draft by the Calgary Flames. He enjoyed a six-year playing career, including stints with the Flames, Ottawa Senators, Winnipeg Jets and Minnesota North Stars, before a wrist injury cut his career short. He also represented his country as a player, competing for the United States at the 1992 World Championships in Prague, Czech Republic.

A 1994 graduate of Wisconsin with a bachelor of arts degree in history, the 35-year-old Osiecki was born July 7, 1968. Married to wife Robin, the couple have a daughter, Emily and a son, Jake.

One of the rising stars in hockey coaching circles, Wisconsin assistant coach Kevin Patrick looks to make an impact on the Badgers in his first year with the program.

Patrick joins the Badgers from Bowling Green State, where he has served as an assistant coach since 2002. While with the Falcons, he oversaw the team's defense, evaluated game tapes, monitored the team's academic progress, scouted and recruited potential student-athletes throughout North America and worked with alumni and the community. His accomplishments at BGSU include helping the Falcons improve steadily, going from eight wins his first year, to 16 victories last season; recruiting members of the 2005 CCHA All-Rookie Team; and helping the team earn its first league winning mark in nine years and its first home ice for the CCHA playoffs in 10 seasons.

Prior to his time with the Falcons, Patrick spent four seasons at Union College as an assistant coach. He began his time at Union working with the team's forwards and defensemen, while coordinating the team's strength and conditioning program and ordering the team's equipment. Over his final three years, he became the team's recruiting coordinator. Throughout his time with the Flying Dutchmen, he watched the team go from three wins during his first season to 13 in his last season. During his tenure, his recruits were chosen to the 2002 and 2003 ECAC All-Rookie Teams.

Patrick is familiar with part of the UW coaching staff, having served the 1997-98 season as assistant head coach and assistant general manager under current UW assistant coach Mark Osiecki while with the Green Bay Gamblers of the USHL.

He got his start in coaching from 1993-97 during a four-year stint as assistant coach at Deerfield Academy in Deerfield, Mass. The team went 63-21-4 during his stay, qualifying for the New England tournament in 1994, 1995 and 1996. While at Deerfield, he served three years as assistant athletic director and two years as a science teacher.

Patrick graduated from the University of Notre Dame in 1992 with a bachelor's of science degree in pre-professional studies. He was a four-year defenseman for the Fighting Irish hockey team, captaining the program during his final two seasons. He also played lacrosse for two seasons, helping Notre Dame qualify for the 1990 NCAA Division I Lacrosse Tournament. He resumed his education and earned a master's degree in sport management from Massachusetts in 1998.

Following his graduation from Notre Dame, Patrick played one season of professional hockey, suiting up for the New Haven Senators of the AHL, the St. Thomas Wildcats of the CoHL and the Green Bay Ice of the AHA. He was selected to the 1993 American Hockey Association All-Star Team.

Bill Howard returns to the UW hockey staff for his 35th season as a volunteer assistant coach in 2005-06. He is a veteran of all five Wisconsin NCAA championship teams and continues to be the man behind the goaltending success of Badger teams. He also assists head coach Mike Eaves with the team's power play.

During the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including 10 intensive goaltending schools in five Midwest states.

Recently produced and developed two comprehensive goalie instructional videos that are being used by over 500 programs, goaltenders and coaches throughout the U.S. He has also written a

72-page goalie manual that coincides with the two videos, and has developed a five-part "Sequential System" for playing the position of goalie based on his videos and manual. He has formed his own goalie consulting business and runs nine-hour clinics and seminars for youth programs, goalies, parents and coaches.

After 34 years of teaching business law at Madison Memorial High School, Howard retired in the spring of 2001 from teaching.

In addition, Howard has also served as color commentator, both on radio and television, for Badger hockey, including eight games last season.

During his tenure at the UW, Howard has helped develop seven All-Americans: Julian Baretta (1977), Roy Schultz (1980), Dean Anderson (1988), Curtis Joseph (1989), Duane Derksen (1992), Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) and Bernd Brückler (2004), plus eventual NHL standouts Mike Richter (New York Rangers) and Jim Carey (Boston Bruins). Joseph went on to star in the NHL and currently plays for the Phoenix Coyotes.

Before joining the UW staff full-time, Howard started the high school hockey program at Madison Memorial and was the Spartans' head coach for 10 years (1967-77). His teams won two state titles and posted a 136-72-1 (.653) record, including a perfect 44-0-0 mark from 1975-77.

Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado College as a goaltender, where he played for Bob Johnson. He lettered two years for the Tigers after

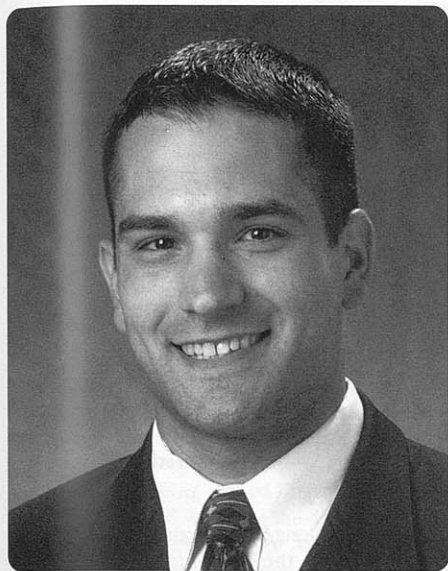

Mike Potenza returns for his third year serving as the strength and conditioning coach for the Badger men's hockey team.

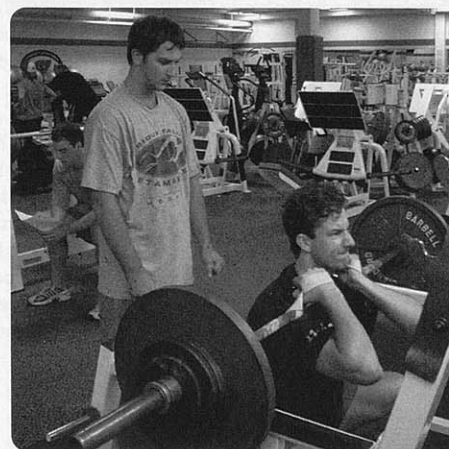
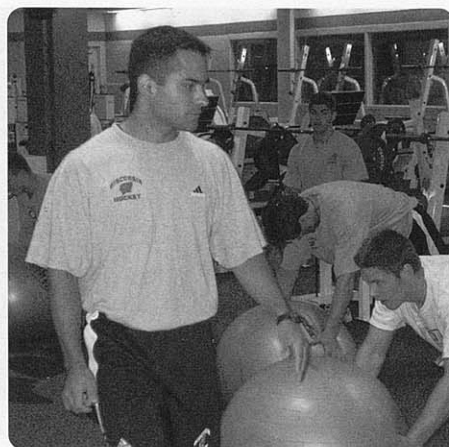

He resides in Madison with wife Bonnie.



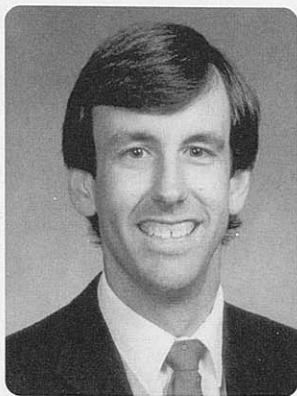

Andy Hrodey is in his seventh season handling athletic training duties for the UW hockey team after being hired as a full-time staff member for the Badger athletic training staff in 1999-2000.

He returned to Wisconsin from the United States Military Academy where he served as a full-time athletic trainer for both the hockey and football teams.

Previously at the UW, Hrodey was a graduate assistant during the 1996-97 and 1997-98 seasons, working as a team trainer for both the UW football and wrestling programs.

A 2003 graduate of Wisconsin with a bachelor of arts degree in marketing, management and human resources, Remiker spent five years working for the athletic department in the mail room. He also worked four years on weekend security at Camp Randall Stadium and three years in concessions for hockey and basketball at the Kohl Center.

The 26-year-old's duties include creating highlight films, taping games, assisting coaches with film breakdowns, creating teaching tapes and helping with media video requests, among other responsibilities.

The Two Rivers, Wis., native lives in Madison.

Doug Beard begins his fourth year on the UW senior-level administrative team as associate athletic director for administration. Beard supervises the men's and women's hockey, event operations, food and beverage service, business and finance, human resources, compliance and sports medicine units.

Beard joined the UW staff in 2001 as assistant AD for event management as well as helping administer the departments internal operations. He was promoted to associate AD in 2002. Before coming to Wisconsin, Beard worked at UW-Milwaukee from 1989-2001 and UW-Stout from 1987-89.

Beard, originally from Kennebunkport, Maine, has a B.S. degree in business administration from New Hampshire (1985) and an M.A. degree in athletic administration from Kent State (1987).

Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director

Jamie Pollard was named Deputy Athletic Director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and in that role serves as the No. 2 administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate



Athletics. He is responsible for the overall administration of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$72 million athletic department. In addition, he represents Barry Alvarez at all national, conference and university meetings when necessary.

Prior to being named Deputy Athletic Director, Pollard served as the division's Chief Financial Officer and Senior Associate Athletic Director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$109 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program that is generating

more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is one of the largest collegiate contracts in the country.

Pollard has also been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02. During that time the men's basketball program won back-to-back Big Ten championships, the 2004 Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the 2005 Elite Eight. He also served as the Tournament Manager when the university hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first intercollegiate sports administrator ever honored by the magazine. Pollard has served as the President for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.

He was appointed by UW-Madison Chancellor John D. Wiley to serve as the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign

that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. Pollard led the 2004 campaign for the University, which resulted in 4,500 employees donating \$1.46 million. Both the number of donors and donation levels were records for the institution.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as Associate AD for Administration at Maryland (1994-98) and Associate AD for Internal Operations at St. Louis (1989-94). In both roles, he assisted with balancing budgets and creating reserves while helping implement gender equity plans.

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provided strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators, university presidents and conference commissioners.

Pollard, who was the 1987 NCAA Division III national champion in the 5,000-meter run and a two time Division III All-American, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). He is in that school's athletic hall of fame. Pollard and his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas, Annie, Maggie and James).

John Chadima Operations

John Chadima began serving as the department's associate AD for operations in 2003. He is in charge of managing capital projects, including the renovation of Camp Randall Stadium, and



supervising the facilities, maintenance, equipment and strength and conditioning staffs. He also is the department liaison with University Ridge Golf Course and has administrative oversight of the football, men's and women's golf and rowing programs.

Chadima was previously the director of football operations (1990-1997 and 2000-03) where he was responsible for coordinating team travel, scheduling, preseason training camp, the summer jobs program and maintaining the sports multi-million dollar budget. He was the schools director of facilities and events (1997-2000) in between assignments with the football team.

Chadima has a B.S. degree (1988) in physical education with an emphasis in athletic administration from Iowa. He also studied in the masters programs (for athletic administration) at both Iowa and Wisconsin.

Steve Malchow Communications

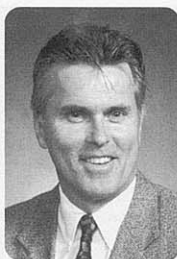
Steve Malchow was named to the department's senior staff as associate athletic director for communications in 2003. He oversees the athletic communications,

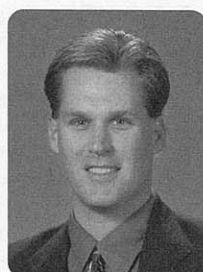

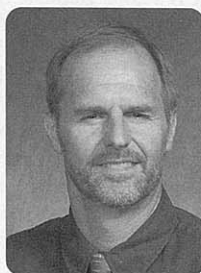

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association

This is the WCHA

With a noteworthy past that spans six decades and marks its 54th season overall in 2005-06, three characteristics that continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association are history, tradition and success.

From the founding days as the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) from 1951-53, to the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) from 1953-58, and ultimately on to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in 1959, this prestigious athletic conference has developed and maintained a tradition of excellence that truly is second to none.

In fact, no collegiate conference – in any sport – can top the impressive list of national scale accomplishments of the WCHA and its member teams. Since 1951, teams representing the men's WCHA have earned a record 35 NCAA (national) championships, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship round – the NCAA Men's Frozen Four – in 50 of 53 seasons overall. And since its founding in 1999-2000, teams representing the women's WCHA have now captured six consecutive national championships in 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2005.

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds upon hundreds of its alumni moving on to successful professional and Olympic playing careers. On top of the more than 100 league alumni who have Olympic experience playing for the likes of the U.S., Canada, Italy, Norway, Austria and France, conference-member teams and players have also received additional international exposure on a regular basis since 1951. The WCHA has hosted touring teams from the USSR, Canada, Sweden, Czechoslovakia, Latvia, Germany, Italy, Finland, Norway, Switzerland, England and France. The league has also sent men's WCHA All-Star Teams to Europe in both 1998 (Switzerland) and 2000 (Norway) and is currently making plans for another international trip for an all-star team next year, while the women's WCHA has also regularly put together all-star teams, with the 2005-06 season bringing WCHA All-Star Team games against the U.S. National Team at both Xcel Energy Center and the Duluth Entertainment & Convention Center. In 2004-05, a total of 16 conference players participated in the annual women's IIHF World Championship in Sweden, including five on the gold medal-winning U.S. Team.

Just a few of the more than 330 past and present National Hockey League's who have roots in the WCHA include the likes of legendary goaltenders Tony Esposito, Eddio Mio and Glenn 'Chico' Resch, defensemen Keith Magnuson, Lou Nanne and Curt Giles, and forwards Lou Angotti, Bill Masterton, Bill 'Red' Hay, Red Berenson, Glenn Anderson and Mark Johnson. The current crop of WCHA stars playing in the NHL include the likes of Chris Chelios, Brett Hull, Dany Heatley, Mark Parrish, Jordan Leopold, Curtis Joseph, Greg Johnson, Sean Hill, Antti Laaksonen, Jason Blake, Tyler Arnason, Andy Sutton and Bret Hedican.

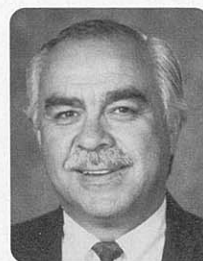
The WCHA also continues to lead the way in college hockey attendance - for both men and women – as member teams, who regularly play in some of the sport's finest facilities, regularly top the Div. I ranks in average home attendance. In 2004-05, the men's conference drew a total of 1,508,427, the second consecutive season in excess of 1.5 million fans and the 12th consecutive season in excess of one million while the women's WCHA marked its sixth-straight season at the top of the national rankings.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has been able to showcase its exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks to such impressive new facilities as the Kohl Center in Madison, Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, Colorado Springs World Arena, Magness Arena in Denver, Mariucci Arena and Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, the National Hockey Center in St. Cloud, and Midwest Wireless Civic Center in Mankato.

The conference's two annual playoff championships, known as the WCHA Final Five (men's) and the WCHA Playoff Championship (women's), continue to be among the most successful collegiate tournaments of their kind. Held at Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, the WCHA Final Five has drawn in excess of 1,000,000 fans since its inception in 1987 – including 77,746 in 2005. The WCHA Playoff Championship, currently held at Ridder Arena, continues to grow both in exposure and attendance.

More than 210 WCHA men's games were televised in 2004-05, including all five first round WCHA playoff series, all five WCHA Final Five games, all nine NCAA regional games, and all three Frozen Four games. On the women's side, CSTV televised the Ohio State at Wisconsin game live, a record number of regular season games were telecast throughout the league, the WCHA webcast the WCHA Playoff Championship live via wcha.com and CSTV also televised the 2005 NCAA Women's Frozen Four.

Wcha.com, the league's official Web site, continues to grow and expand, with more than 1,600,000 visitors this past season and a record number of releases and features being posted on both the men's and women's sides. The league will be launching a completely revamped wcha.com in the upcoming 2005-06 season.

COLLEGE HOCKEY SHOWCASE

The first annual College Hockey Showcase took place at The Palace of Auburn Hills, Mich., on Nov. 26-27, 1993. The tournament was created by the schools of the Big Ten Conference — Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Wisconsin — to showcase some of the nation's best talent over the Thanksgiving weekend.

CCHA schools (Michigan, Michigan State) play WCHA schools (Minnesota, Wisconsin) in a round-robin format.

The Showcase was not designed to determine an individual champion, but to give fans a chance to witness some of the most competitive teams and individual talent in college hockey, while preserving Big Ten rivalries.

The first four years of the Showcase were played at neutral sites — The Palace, The Target Center, The Bradley Center, Joe Louis Arena — with each school getting a chance to host the event. After the 1996 showcase, the event was moved to campus sites, rotating among the four Showcase schools.

DID YOU KNOW ...

- that Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota and Wisconsin have combined to win 21 of the 57 NCAA championships?

- before Michigan State and Michigan joined the CCHA, these four teams played for the Big Ten Championship between 1959 and 1981? Minnesota won 10 titles, while Michigan, Michigan State and Wisconsin each won that league title five times.

- since the inaugural event (1993), 48 members of these four teams have earned 58 All-America honors — Michigan (10 first-team, eight second-team), Michigan State (7,10), Minnesota (4, 4) Wisconsin (5,2)? Forty-three players from these teams currently play in the NHL.

- the four teams have combined school records of 4,950-3,195-459? That is a .602 win percentage over 8,604 games.

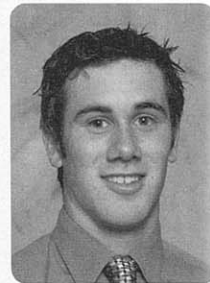

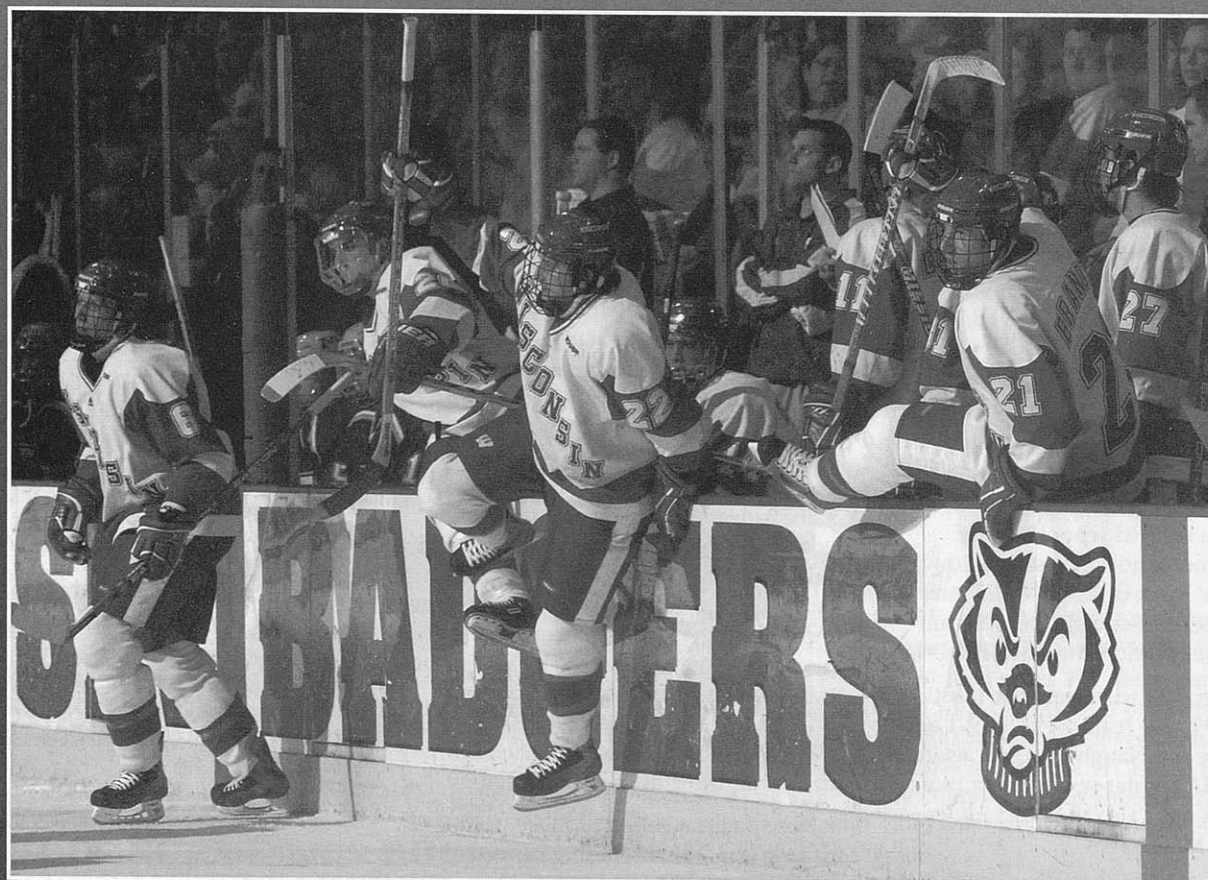

NCAA Bound

Wisconsin completed its second-straight season with a trip to the NCAA tournament. The Badgers, a No. 3 seed, faced Michigan in Grand Rapids, Mich., falling to the Wolverines, 4-1, in the NCAA Midwest Regional semifinal. The appearance was the 21st in school history.

Of Wins and Losses

For the 30th time in school history, Wisconsin men's hockey reached 20 wins. The Badgers' mark of 23-14-4 also gave them their second-straight 20-win campaign for the second time since 1994-95.

- The Badgers' 23 wins were the most since the 1999-00 team went 31-9-1 and captured the MacNaughton Cup, awarded to the WCHA regular-season champion. The 23 wins were also the most under head coach Mike Eaves.

- The Badgers finished third in the WCHA with 35 points for the second-straight season. The last time the UW finished in at least third place for consecutive seasons was in 1993-94 (3rd) and 1994-95 (T-2nd), capping 11-straight years in the WCHA's top three.

- Wisconsin posted 16 WCHA victories, the most since the 1999-00 team collected 23, and the third-highest total since the 1994-95 season.

- The Badgers finished five points out of first after finishing eight points behind the league leader in 2003-04.

- Wisconsin was one of just two league schools to earn wins against all other WCHA teams. Denver was the other.

Tasting Success

Wisconsin spent 10 weeks in first place in the WCHA standings from when the league schedule started on Oct. 15 until the season ended on March 5, the most of any school. The league schedule spanned 21 weekends.

He Shoots, He Scores!

- Six Badgers scored double figures in goals (Robbie Earl - 20, Joe Pavelski - 16, Adam Burish - 13, Ross Carlson, Jake Dowell - 12, Ryan MacMurchy - 11), the most since the 2001-02 team had six players in double figures. The UW record is 11 players, which has been accomplished three times (1976-77, 1982-83, 1989-90). The Badgers won the NCAA title in all three of those years.

- Nine Badgers collected more points than last season, including sophomore Earl (44 vs. 27), MacMurchy (33 vs. 28), Carlson (29 vs. 17), Dowell (26 vs. 19), Andrew Joudrey (24 vs. 22), Burish (20 vs. 19), Nick Licari (17 vs. 9), John Funk (5 vs. 4) and Matt Olinger (4 vs. 0).

- Three Badgers eclipsed the 30-point barrier in 2004-05, while only one Badger did so in 2003-04. Pavelski (45), Earl (44 points), and MacMurchy (33) all surpassed 30 points. Only Rene Bourque (36) broke 30 points the previous year.

- Wisconsin had two 40-point scorers (Pavelski - 45; Earl - 44) in a season for the first time since the 1999-00 season when Steve Reinprecht (26-40=66); Dany Heatley (28-28=56); and David Hukalo (15-25=40) all collected 40 points.

Season Highlights

Oct. 16 and 23 - Sophomore goaltender Brian Elliott makes 18 saves against Mercyhurst and 13 against Michigan Tech to open his season with consecutive shutout victories – the first of his career.

Oct. 29 - Wisconsin defeated defending and eventual two-time NCAA champion Denver 5-3, improving to 5-0-0 to start the season.

Nov. 19 - Robbie Earl scored his second career hat trick in Wisconsin's 4-1 win at Alaska Anchorage.

Nov. 27 - Despite both teams losing the night before, No. 2 Wisconsin defeats No. 1 Michigan in the College Hockey Showcase with a 3-1 victory at the Kohl Center.

Dec. 31 - With the game tied at one through overtime, and both Wisconsin and Yale scoring twice during the ensuing shootout, Andrew Joudrey scores in the second round of a sudden death shootout to send the Badgers to the Badger Hockey Showdown championship game.

Jan. 8 - Junior Ryan MacMurchy records all four UW goals in a Badger 4-2 win at St. Cloud State. His performance marks the 30th time a Badger has scored at least four goals in a game and the first since 1993.

Jan. 21-22 - Wisconsin earns back-to-back shutouts over Notre Dame, winning both games by identical 2-0 counts. The series blanking marks the first time since the Badgers defeated Pennsylvania by 7-0 and 11-0 scores on Nov. 15-16 to open the 1968-69 campaign.

Feb. 4 - The first Friday night sell out in Kohl Center history results in a 3-1 Badger victory over Border Battle rival Minnesota.

Feb. 12 - Wisconsin scores twice in the final eight minutes of the third period to overcome a two-goal deficit en route to a 3-3 tie at Denver. Robbie Earl scores the game-tying goal at 14:08 of the third with a quick wrist shot off an Adam Burish faceoff win.

Feb. 18 - Playing in front of their fourth of five-consecutive sold out Kohl Center contests, the Badgers score four third-period tallies to knock off WCHA-leading Colorado College with a 5-1 victory.

March 11-13 - Skating at Veterans Memorial Coliseum, the Badgers earn a 2-1 WCHA playoff series victory over Alaska Anchorage to advance to Mike Eaves' first WCHA Final Five. Wisconsin takes game one, 5-4, scoring the last three goals of the contest in a wild evening. After falling 2-1 the next night, Wisconsin wraps up its Final Five bid by overcoming a 1-0 deficit with two goals during a four-minute span of the second period for a 2-1 success.

Individual Efforts

• Freshman Joe Pavelski's 45 points (16-29=45) tied with WCHA Rookie of the Year Paul Stastny for the league lead, while his 1.10 points-per-game average led the league. His point total tied for the national freshman lead with Bill Thomas of Nebraska-Omaha, Tom Fritsche of Ohio State and Denver's Stastny.

The last Wisconsin rookie to lead the WCHA in freshman scoring was Dany Heatley (1999-00), who collected 28-28=56 in 38 games overall, and 19-17=36 in WCHA games. He also led the nation's rookies that season.

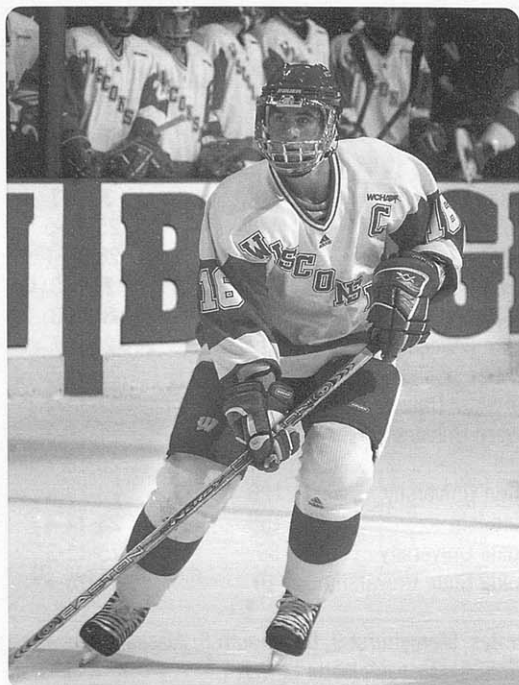
• Pavelski also lead the Badgers with 45 points. Since the UW joined the WCHA for the 1969-70 season, only two other Badger rookies have led the team in scoring – Dennis Olmstead (55 points in 1972-73) and Mike Eaves (54 points in 1974-75).

• Of junior captain Adam Burish's 13 goals during the season, nine were either game-winners, short-handed, on the power play or a combination of the three.

His four short-handed goals tied for the national lead in the category. Six of his 19 career goals have come shorthanded.

He also shared the team lead with Robbie Earl with five game-winning goals, which also tied for second in the WCHA in all games. Joe Pavelski and Ryan MacMurchy each scored three game-winning goals in league games to tie for the WCHA lead.

• Badger sophomores Jake Dowell and Jeff Likens played at the 2005 World Junior Championships for Team USA, as did former Badger Ryan Suter. After winning gold last year, the squad picked up fourth place.



Captain Adam Burish shared the national lead with four short-handed goals during the 2004-05 season.

• Both Wisconsin goaltenders, senior Bernd Brückler and sophomore Brian Elliott, had three shutouts on the season. For Elliott, he had three in just nine games played. The UW single-season record of four is held by Brückler (2003-04), Graham Melanson (1999-00) and Terry Kleisinger (1981-82).

Polling Station

Wisconsin finished the season ranked No. 13 in both the USCHO.com and *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* Poll, and finished ranked for the second-straight year.

The Badgers reached as high as No. 2 in both polls, spending the weeks of Nov. 22 and Dec. 6, in the USCHO.com poll, and Nov. 22 and 29, in the *USA Today* rankings, at No. 2.

Overall, Wisconsin has earned a spot in USCHO.com Poll for 40-straight weeks, a school record. The previous UW high in the USCHO.com poll, which started in October 1997, is 26-straight polls, from Nov. 8, 1999 to Nov. 20, 2000.

Badger Fanatics

Make it seven-straight years and 31 times since 1969 that the Badgers have led the college men's hockey world in attendance. The Badgers attracted a national-best 11,955 fans over 23 home dates, the second-highest mark in NCAA history behind the UW's 12,153 set in 1998-99. Wisconsin also set the total attendance record when 274,979 people came to watch UW home games in 2004-05. The mark eclipsed the previous record of 269,123 the UW set in 2003-04.

Wisconsin sold out its last five regular-season home games beginning with their Jan. 15 contest against Alaska Anchorage. It followed that with the first Friday night sell out of the Kohl Center against Minnesota on Feb. 4, before packing the Kohl Center the next night against the Gophers and on Feb. 18 and 19 against Colorado College.

Senior Salute

Bernd Brückler ended his UW tenure as the career leader with a 2.48 goals-against average, second with a .916 save percentage, third with eight career shutouts, fourth with 114 games and 6,630 minutes played, tied for fifth with 51 career victories and fifth with 2,981 saves. He is also the school record holder with a 15-game unbeaten streak, 2.09 single-season goals-against average, .924 single-season save percentage, and shares the single-season mark with four shutouts.

He finished his career as the active league leader with 10 WCHA weekly awards. He had three WCHA Defensive Player of the Week awards in 2004-05 and nine for his career. He won a WCHA Rookie of the Week award as a freshman.

A 2003-04 All-American and First-Team All-WCHA pick, he was named 2005 Second-Team All-WCHA after earning preseason WCHA Player of the Year.

John Funk, a walk-on, finished his career with 11 goals, 11 assists and 22 points in 95 games during three seasons. He recorded the first two-goal game of his career at St. Cloud State on Jan. 7 and was a spark plug for the Badgers throughout his career. In 2003-04, Funk was voted the Santulli Seventh Man Award by the fans.

Luke Kohtala was a three-year walk-on goaltender and saw action in one regular-season contest, while becoming a dean's list student as a mechanical engineer. He was also Academic All-Big Ten, WCHA All-Academic and the team's Athletic Board Scholar.

Pete Talafous, an Alaska Anchorage transfer, skated in three games his senior season, including at UAA. He completed his UW career with three goals and 17 assists in 52 games played.

He also switched to jersey No. 17 for his senior season, in honor of his father, former Badger Dean Talafous.

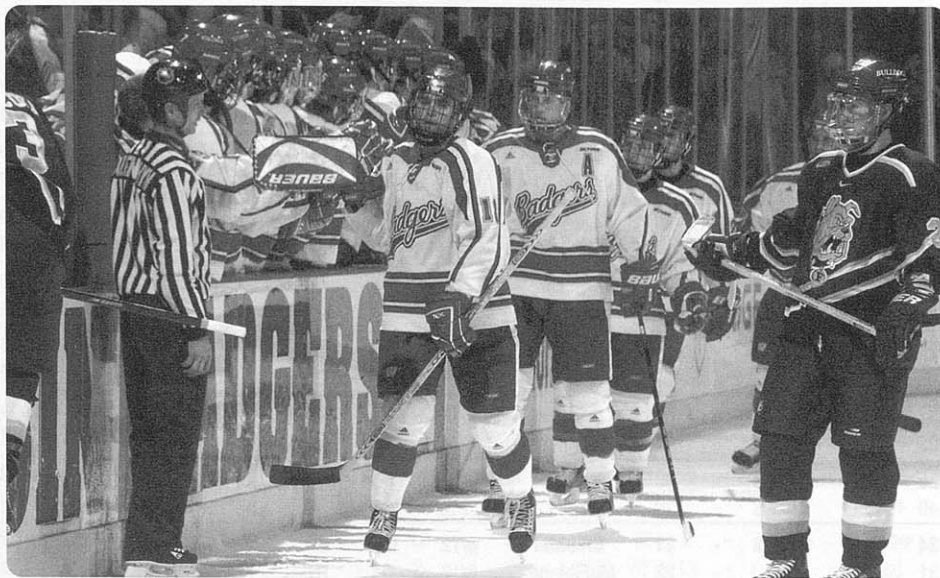

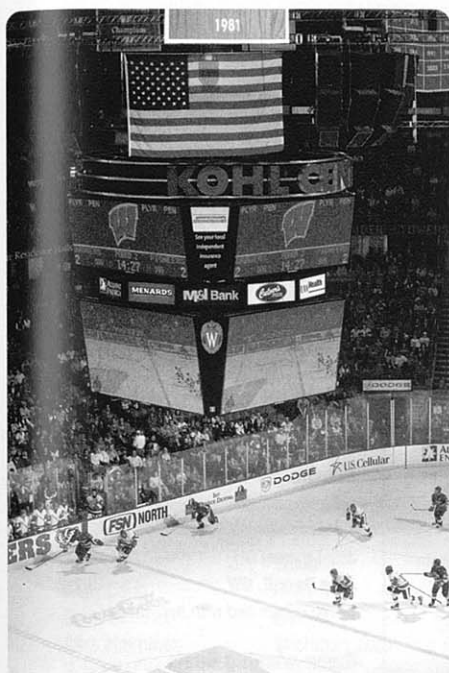

When the UW athletic counsel voted to officially recognize ice hockey as a varsity sport (1921-22), Dr. A.C. Viner was named the UW's first varsity ice hockey coach. But hockey at the UW was organized at the club level as far back as 1892. In the years leading up to that first season, Joe Steinauer coached Badger club teams from 1916-19. His name is the earliest mention of a UW hockey coach, club or varsity level.

The Decade of the 60s



The first UW hockey team (1963-64) went 8-5-3 in its first season, with wins over Macalester, Illinois Club, Lake Forest, Carleton and Hamline that year. John Riley (below) was one of the main forces behind the return of hockey to Wisconsin.

In March of 1962 at an athletic board meeting, then-Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson reinstated ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport at the University of Wisconsin. A year and a half later, behind co-coaches Art Thomsen and John Riley, Badger hockey made its 'second debut'.

On November 29, 1963, seven days after the tragic death of President Kennedy, the Badgers faced off against St. Mary's College of Winona, Minn. That game signaled the return of hockey to Wisconsin after a 28-year absence.

The first Badger team of the modern era was formed by posting flyers around the campus during the Fall of 1962. The flyers asked any university students wishing to play ice hockey to report to an initial organizational meeting in Agricultural Hall. Only about 15-20 students showed up and because there were no scholarships, the team was molded from kids who did not receive offers from any other schools and a lot of local kids who just wanted to play the game.

So, from those humble beginnings, co-coaches Riley and Thomsen laid the foundation for what would become one of college hockey's winningest programs.

During the first full season (1963-64), a TOTAL of 8,937 fans watched 15 games at Kelsey's Hartmeyer Ice Arena. That number tripled just one year later as in the Badgers' second season, nearly 28,000 people came out to watch the 17-game home slate.

Said Riley, "We had great enthusiasm from those who came out to see what was going on. Although small in number, they were very dedicated, very loyal, very excitable and very vocal." These were the first of the now famous Wisconsin hockey fans.

From the start, the Badgers boasted strong goaltenders producing such names as Jim Duffy, Gary Johnson, Bob Vroman and Wayne Thomas between the pipes in the 60s. The first 20-goal scorer (season) was Ray Clegg, who led the team in scoring during the 1964-65 campaign with 27-22=49. Bert Dehate was the decade's most prolific scorer with 108 goals, 80 assists for 188 points from 1966-70. He left with UW records for career goals and points, and season goals and points, to name a

few. On defense, John Jagger became the school's first All-American when he was named to the first team following the 1969-70 season. Don Addison paced the team in defensive scoring three straight seasons (1964-67) and led the team in scoring with 12-28=40 in 1966-67.



THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 1962 – Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson announces the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after the sport was dropped in 1935.

November 29, 1963 – In the first game of the modern era, the Badgers lose a 13-6 shootout to St. Mary's (Winona, Minn.). The game was played in front of 695 fans at Hartmeyer Ice Arena.

The first modern-era goal came off the stick of Tom French (Ann Arbor, Mich.) on a penalty shot.

December 6, 1963 – A rebound goal by Chan Young (Madison, Wis.) gives the UW its first win in the modern era. In overtime, the Badgers defeated Macalester, 3-2.

December 11, 1964 – The UW takes a major step in the future of the program, scheduling eight games against teams from the WCHA, but the Badgers lose all eight.

February 22, 1966 – The UW breaks a 13-game winless streak versus WCHA teams, when it posts a 5-4 overtime win over the Minnesota Gophers.

April 1, 1966 – Following the retirement of John Riley, the UW hires Bob Johnson as its ninth coach in the history of the program.

March 1968 – Sophomore center Bert DeHate (St. Paul, Minn.) became the first Badger to win the national scoring title. He tallied 47-30=77, including a school-record seven hat tricks.

March 30, 1969 – Wisconsin joins the WCHA, becoming the ninth member of the most prestigious league in Division I college hockey.

November 14-15, 1969 – The first-ever WCHA series was played against the Fighting Sioux of North Dakota. The Badgers upset UND, sweeping the series 8-4 and 7-4.

March 1970 – Wisconsin makes its first NCAA tournament appearance, finishing third. Defenseman John Jagger (Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario) is the first UW All-American.

The Decade of the 70s



The 1972-73 hockey team poses on the ice after winning the school's first NCAA championship. For head coach Bob Johnson, it was his first national title and one of three he would win at Wisconsin. (Johnson is also pictured below.)

The decade of the 70s established the University of Wisconsin hockey program as one of the nation's elite. After winning the WCHA playoff championship in its first season as a WCHA member (1969-70) and also making its first NCAA tourney appearance that year, Wisconsin entered the next decade with confidence and determination to take the program to the next level.

It didn't take long for the Badgers to make that step and return to the NCAA championship. In March of 1972, the UW lost to Boston University, but defeated Denver to place third at the NCAA tournament. It was the second championship appearance in three years for a Badger team. Then came the 1972-73 campaign—the 10th anniversary of the UW hockey program in the modern era. That year proved to be the best yet for a Wisconsin squad as the Badgers finished 29-9-2 and gave themselves the best anniversary present available in the college hockey world—an NCAA championship. It would be the first of three for Bob Johnson as the UW's mentor.

Just four years later, arguably the best college hockey team assembled, notched the first 30-win season in the school's existence ending the year 37-7-1. That team produced four first-team All-Americans in forwards Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson, defenseman Craig Norwich and goaltender Julian Baretta and Wisconsin's second NCAA title. The Badgers came from behind in both semi-final games to defeat New Hampshire and Michigan in overtime in two of the greatest comebacks in UW history. Both games were tied late in regulation by the UW and then won in overtime.

Wisconsin made another NCAA championship appearance in '77-78 (the fourth of the decade), finishing fourth after losing to Boston University and Bowling Green.

The UW watched two of its team members take part in the 'Miracle on Ice' during the 1980 Lake Placid Olympics. Mark Johnson and Bob Suter were both members of the United States' goal-medal winning team. Johnson led the team in scoring with 5-6=11.

The Badger hockey program had earned the respect of the college hockey world with the accomplishments and success during the 70s.

Wisconsin made four NCAA appearances, won two NCAA championships, four WCHA playoff titles and one WCHA regular-season crown. Six 20-plus win seasons, including a 30-win campaign, were recorded. Individually, six players earned nine first-team All-America honors, while five players (and one coach) were Olympians during the decade of the 70s. Steve Alley, Bob Lundeen, John Taft and head coach Bob Johnson were members of the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, while Johnson and Suter played on the 1980 U.S. team.



THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 1972 – The Badgers make a second appearance in three years at the NCAA championships, finishing third.

March 16, 1973 – Dean Talafofus scores with five seconds left in regulation to tie the game, then scores the game-winning goal with 33 seconds in left overtime to cap a stunning comeback 6-5 victory over Cornell. The win advances the Badgers to the finals, where they defeat defending NCAA champion Denver for their first NCAA title.

February 19, 1977 – Wisconsin captures its first-ever MacNaughton Cup with a 6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth at the Dane County Coliseum.

March 25, 1977 – The Badgers make it to college hockey's final four for the third time in school history. In semi-final action, Les Grauer ties the game and Mike Eaves get the game-winner to give the UW a 4-3 overtime win over New Hampshire.

March 26, 1977 – The best season in UW history is culminated when Steve Alley's goal at 0:23 into overtime gives Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA title in five seasons.

The Badgers finish the season at 37-7-1, becoming the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, is named the freshman of the year.

March 25, 1978 – Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans," by the city.

Mike Eaves ends his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earn first-team All-America honors.

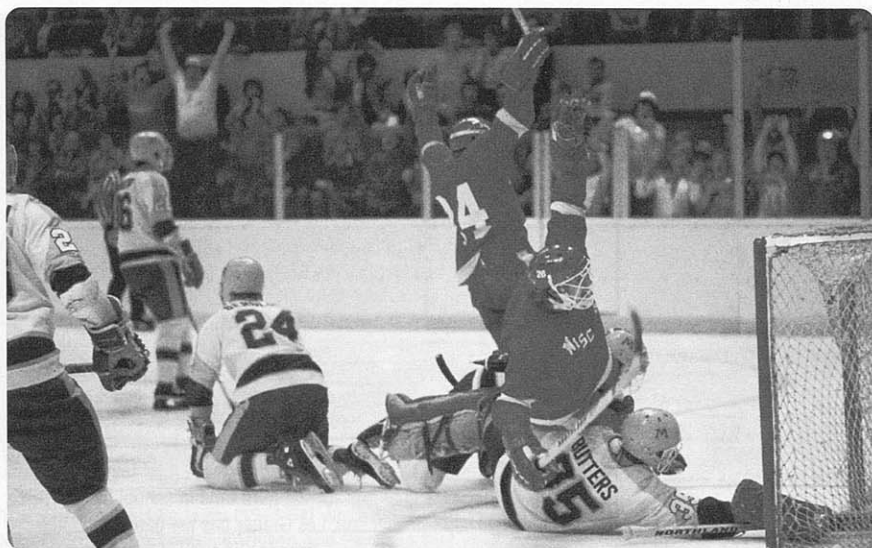
March 1979 – The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds, averaging 8,654 (just eight short of a sellout) fans a game at the Dane County Coliseum.

Mark Johnson, the collegiate player of the year, closes out his UW career as the top goal scorer (125) in school history.

The Decade of the 80s



Ted Pearson (#24) gives the Badgers a 4-0 lead over the Minnesota Gophers at the 9:23 mark of the second period. That goal proved to be the game-winner as the UW went on to a 6-3 win and the 1981 NCAA title.

Wisconsin opened the 80s with three straight NCAA championship appearances (1980-81, 1981-82 and 1982-83) and two national titles (1981 and 1983). With three NCAA championships in seven years, Badger hockey had become the most successful collegiate hockey program in the nation.

Those three teams produced some of the best athletes to play the game. Consider that five members of those teams went on to distinguished NHL careers, including Bruce Driver (15 seasons/1,030 games), Pat Flatley (14/850), Brian Mullen (11/1,205), Dave Maley (9/512) and Chris Chelios, who marked his 20th season in the NHL in 2001-02 as a member of the Stanley Cup-winning Detroit Red Wings. Chelios, who has been named the NHL's best defenseman on three separate occasions, has played in 1,617 career NHL games.

In addition, four players – Flatley, Driver, John Newberry and Theran Welsh – were named first-team All-Americans. Welsh remains the Badgers' all-time leading defensive scorer (24-194=228) and is one of only four players in school history to reach the 200-point plateau.

Wisconsin won 20-or-more games every season in the decade of the 80s, including two 30-win campaigns. And, just as the UW entered the 80s, winning a national title, that is how it ended the 80s. The 1989-90 squad won the school's fifth NCAA title and posted the second-best record in school history (36-9-1).

The list of players that came out of the Badger hockey program during this decade is second to none. John Byce, Tony Granato, Sean Hill, Curtis Joseph, Scott Mellanby, Paul Ranheim, Barry Richter, Mike Richter, Gary Shuchuk, Gary Suter and Chris Tancill are just a few of the top players that came out of the 80s.

The Badgers became just the fourth school to win three or more titles in the same decade. Denver (60s) and Boston University (70s) won three and Michigan five (50s) championships in its respective decade.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 27, 1981 – For the sixth time in school history, the Badgers return to the NCAA tournament. After advancing past Clarkson in quarterfinal action a week earlier, the Badgers defeat Northern Michigan to earn the right to play for the national title.

March 28, 1981 – With a 6-3 win over arch-rival Minnesota, the Badgers grab the school's third NCAA title. The UW defeats the No. 1 teams in ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota) in its championship run.

March 27, 1982 – The Badgers make a second consecutive appearance in the NCAA title game, but lose to North Dakota, finishing second.

June 1, 1982 – Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He led the program to three national titles, seven NCAA appearances and the highest attendance in the country.

July 8, 1982 – Jeff Sauer becomes the fourth coach (10th all time) in the modern era of Badger hockey.

March 5, 1983 – Wisconsin defeats North Dakota, 6-5 in triple overtime, to advance to the WCHA playoff championship. Chris Chelios ties the game with just 12 seconds left in regulation and Paul Houck wins it with a shorthanded goal in the third overtime. To date, it was the longest game in school history.

March 12-13, 1983 – With a sweep of the Gophers at Williams Arena, the Badgers earn the league playoff championship and the No. 1 seed in the West.

March 26, 1983 – For the third straight year, Wisconsin plays for the national title and wins the championship with a 6-2 victory over Harvard.

January 7, 1984 – Wisconsin becomes the only American collegiate team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic squad (4-2) on its preparation tour.

November 23, 1985 – Wisconsin records the program's 500th modern-era victory with a 6-2 win over North Dakota at the Coliseum.

December 30, 1987 – The Badgers claim the Great Lakes Invitational tournament with wins over Michigan and Michigan State in front of 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena.

March 6-7, 1988 – A win over North Dakota (2-1) and Minnesota (3-2) at the St. Paul Civic Center nets the first-ever WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship.

December 28-29, 1989 – Wisconsin hosts its inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee, Wis. The UW defeats Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.

February 16, 1990 – The Badgers play their 1,000th game since the resumption of the program in 1963. A 6-3 victory over Minnesota.

March 24, 1990 – The UW completes its sweep of Maine in the NCAA quarterfinals at the Dane County Coliseum. The Badgers advance to Detroit with a 4-3 overtime win.

March 30, 1990 – In front of 8,000 Badger fans in Joe Louis Arena, the Cardinal and White defeat Boston College 2-1 to advance to the 1990 NCAA Championship game.

April 1, 1990 – Head coach Jeff Sauer guides his Badger team to a second NCAA title, with a 7-3 victory over Colgate. It is the school's fifth national title as the UW's 36-9-1 mark is the second-best in UW history.

The Decade of the 90s

The Badgers entered the 1990s as the defending NCAA champions, coming off a decade which saw a Wisconsin team play for the national title four times. Trying to match that feat would be a challenge.

The 1991-92 team did its part, becoming the lowest seeded team (sixth) in NCAA playoff history to advance to the championship game (The Badgers lost to Lake Superior State, 5-3).

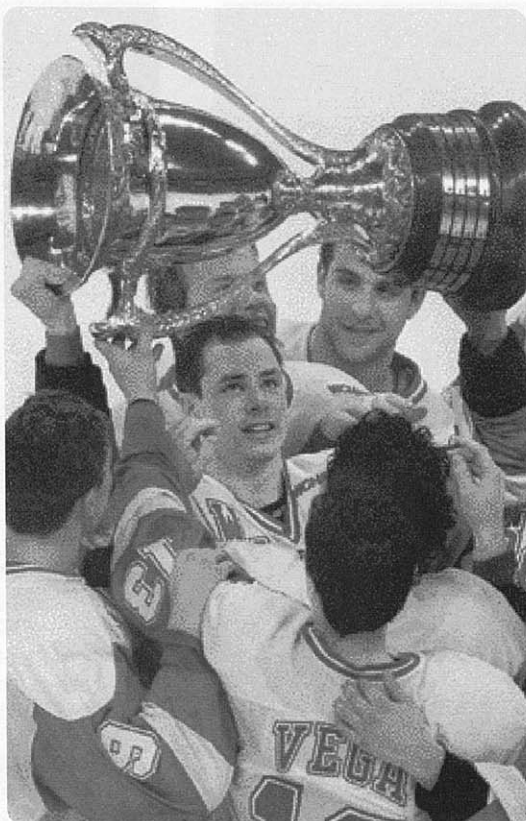
The following year, the 1992-93 squad came within inches of making it to Milwaukee and the 1993 NCAA Championships, but dropped a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Michigan in overtime. Wisconsin managed NCAA berths in the next two years, but did not earn a trip to the NCAA's Frozen Four, despite additional NCAA bids in 1997-98 and 1999-2000.

The 1999-2000 squad boasted two of the most talented forwards that have played for the Badgers in Steve Reinprecht and Dany Heatley. Both helped lead the UW to the 2000 WCHA regular-season Championship and the MacNaughton Cup. It was the third time in school history a UW team had won the league title and the first since 1990.

Reinprecht earned first-team All-America honors, the first Badger forward since Gary Shuchuk (1990) to receive that distinction. He also finished his senior season as the runner-up (the highest finish ever for a Badger) for the Hobey Baker award, given to the nation's top player. Heatley, a second-team All-American as a freshman, was named a first-team All-American (2001), giving Wisconsin its first back-to-back All-America first teamers since Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson (1978 and 1979).

Three UW defensemen were named All-Americans – Barry Richter (1993), Brian Rafalski (1995) and Jeff Dessner (2000). In goal, Duane Derksen (1992) and Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) were second-team All-Americans.

Wisconsin made the 12-team NCAA tourney seven of 10 years in the 90s, averaging over 23 wins a season. The decade ended with the '99-00 team posting the third-best mark in school history, 31-9-1.



THE HIGHLIGHTS

April 2-4, 1992 – Wisconsin defeats Michigan, 4-2, to move into the national championship game against Lake Superior State. The Badgers lose 5-3, but become the lowest-seeded team to ever advance to a national title contest.

March 26-27, 1993 – The Badgers receive a sixth consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament. After a 3-1 win over Miami University, the UW drops a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Michigan in overtime, missing the chance to appear in its third Frozen Four in four seasons.

March 25-26, 1994 – In its seventh straight NCAA appearance, the Badgers handle Western Michigan (6-3), but lose to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

March 17-18, 1995 – Wisconsin recorded wins over Denver and league champion Colorado College to claim the 1995 WCHA Playoff Championship, the school's 10th playoff title. The championship earns the Badgers an automatic NCAA berth, the eighth straight for the UW.

March 8, 1997 – Wisconsin and Colorado College make college hockey history playing in the longest game on record – 5 hours and 24 minutes. The first-round WCHA playoff game lasts until the 9:30 mark of the fourth overtime as the Tigers win the game, 1-0.

Badger netminder Kirk Daubenspeck sets a league and school record with 75 saves.

January 4, 1998 – Head coach Jeff Sauer becomes the WCHA's winningest coach when the UW defeats Denver 7-3. The victory is Sauer's 556th as a league coach and surpasses the legendary John MacInnes.

March 14, 1998 – With a 6-2 win over Alaska-Anchorage, the Badgers play their last regular-season game in the Dane County Coliseum. It had served as the home to Badger hockey for over 30 years.

March 20-21, 1998 – The Badgers take the 1998 WCHA Playoff Championship, with 5-2 and 3-2 wins over Colorado College and North Dakota, respectively. The win also gives Bucky an automatic spot in the 12-team NCAA tourney.

October 3, 1998 – Wisconsin opens the Kohl Center in the College Hockey Hall of Fame game vs. Notre Dame. Despite a 3-2 loss to the Irish, a record 13,398 fans turn out to see the Badgers' debut in their new home.

February 25, 2000 – For only the third time in school history, a Badger team wins the coveted MacNaughton Cup. The WCHA regular-season league championship is clinched with a 4-2 win over the Minnesota Golden Gophers at Mariucci Arena.

A New Century Begins – 2000

Wisconsin hockey began the 21st century as it had its previous three decades—with a 20-win season and a berth in the NCAA tournament. It was the 16th 20- or 30-win campaign for head coach Jeff Sauer and the 12th NCAA appearance for the Badgers under Sauer.

The Badger fans were also treated to a second year of watching Dany Heatley play as he opted to return for a second season (2000-01) with the Badgers instead of turning pro. Heatley, one of the most talented and gifted players to ever wear the Cardinal and White, was named the NHL's Rookie of the Year following the 2001-02 season. Drafted No. 2 overall in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft by the Atlanta Thrashers, he led all league rookies in scoring in 2001-02 before picking up NHL All-Star Game MVP honors in 2002-03.

Two seasons into the fifth decade of Badger hockey, the program said goodbye to the Jeff Sauer era as former Badger Mike Eaves became the fourth coach in the modern era of UW hockey. Sauer announced his retirement from coaching on January 9, 2002, after 31 years coaching in the WCHA and 20 seasons behind the Badger bench. He is the winningest coach in league and school history and the fourth-winningest coach all time.

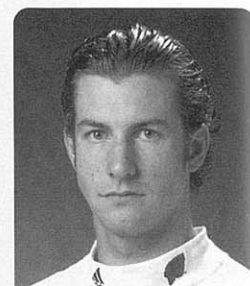
The Eaves Era began on March 19, 2002, when he was hired to replace Sauer. After 26 years, Eaves still remains the school's all-time scoring leader with 94-173=267 in 160 games during his four-year career as a Badger. He led the team in scoring during his freshman, sophomore and senior seasons and in his junior year, was the top-scoring Badger forward (28-53=81) on the 1977 NCAA Championship squad.

By Eaves' second season, he already made a mark, leading his team to a record-setting campaign that culminated in the squad reaching the 2004 NCAA East Regional Final. The team advanced to its second-straight NCAA tournament in 2005.

Goaltender Bernd Brückler posted one of the greatest seasons in UW history and became the first goalie since Roy Schultz in 1980 to be named a first-team All-American with the completion of the 2003-04 season. He set numerous single-season and a handful of career records in the process.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

June 24, 2000 – Dany Heatley, taken second overall in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft, becomes the highest player to be drafted in Badger history.

January 9, 2002 – Jeff Sauer announces he is retiring as the head coach of the Badgers after 20 years behind the UW bench and 31 years as a head coach in the WCHA.

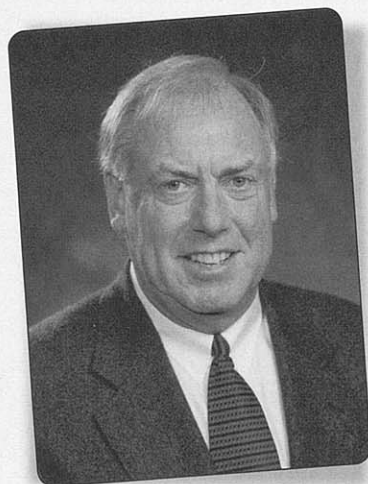
March 19, 2002 – Mike Eaves is announced as the Badgers' fifth head coach in the modern era at a news conference in the Kohl Center.

October 19, 2002 – The Badger hockey program sees its 1,000,000th hockey fan come through the turnstiles at the Kohl Center when the Badgers defeat Alabama-Huntsville. After five years calling the Kohl Center home, Wisconsin has drawn a total of 1,192,099 fans for an average of 11,687 per game (102 home dates).

March 26, 2004 – Making their first NCAA appearance in three seasons, the third-seeded Badgers earn a 1-0 overtime victory over second-seeded Ohio State to advance to the Midwest Regional Final, before falling 2-1 in overtime to Maine.

Backdoor Badgers Exit Out Front!

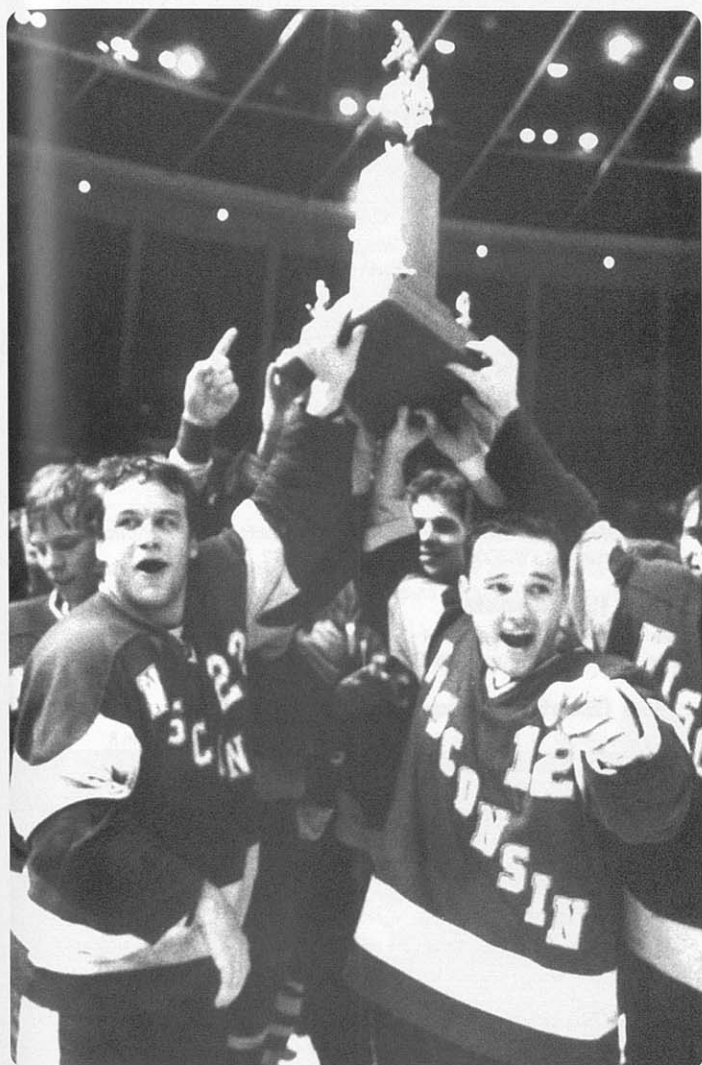

THE BROADMOOR TROPHY

Since 1985, teams winning the WCHA playoff championship have been awarded the Broadmoor Trophy, which was first presented to the conference in 1981 by the world-renowned Broadmoor Hotel and Resort in Colorado Springs, Colo. The Broadmoor hosted the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship 11 times between 1948 and 1969.

For the first three seasons (1981-84) of its partnership with the WCHA (due to the departure of league member and MacNaughton Cup custodian Michigan Tech to the CCHA), the trophy was presented to the Association's regular-season champion. When the Huskies returned to the WCHA for the 1984-85 season, the Broadmoor Trophy became and has since been the symbol of the league's post-season tournament championship.

Seventeen Years For The Showdown

The 2006 Badger Hockey Showdown, now in its 17th year overall and third at the Kohl Center, welcomes a trio of teams from the State of Michigan for the weekend tournament. Through the first 14 years, the tournament took place at the site of the 2006 NCAA Men's Frozen Four, the Bradley Center in Milwaukee. Begun in December of 1989, this year's Showdown continues one of the longest holiday traditions in college hockey in the top college sports town in America.

The brainchild of former Badger head coach Jeff Sauer, the Showdown has featured defending NCAA champions, Hobey Baker winners and finalists and numerous future NHL stars. Praised by coaches, players and fans as one of the best showcases of college hockey talent in the nation, the tourney has become one of the most successful in college hockey history.

Since 1989, over 400,000 fans have witnessed the December spectacle in Milwaukee and Madison, averaging over 26,000 fans per year and over 13,000 spectators a day.

Wisconsin has enjoyed much success at the Showdown, winning eight of the 16 championships. The Badgers have defeated hockey powers Boston College (1989), North Dakota (1990), Maine (1991), Northern Michigan (1993, 1997 and 2002), Bowling Green State (1994) and Boston University (2000) to win titles. Hockey East members Boston University (1992 and 1995) and New Hampshire (1996 and 2001) have each won the Showdown twice, while Bowling Green State was the first CCHA team to win the Showdown in 1998. At the 1999 event, North Dakota became the first WCHA team other than the Badgers to win the Pettit Cup. Wisconsin enters the 2005 event looking to recapture the title after falling to Ferris State in the final of the last two Showdowns.

Showdown 2005

The Badger Hockey Showdown makes its third appearance in Madison after 14 years at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee. For the third year in Madison, tournament veteran Northern Michigan joins newcomers Western Michigan and Wayne State to the fray.

Northern Michigan last took part in the 2002 event, falling 3-1 to the Badgers in the final Showdown contest in Milwaukee's Bradley Center. Wisconsin also knocked off the Wildcats for the 1997 title in a 4-3 contest. The Badgers and Wildcats are familiar historic foes with NMU a former member of the WCHA.

Meeting NMU in the first round is Wayne State. The Warriors mark the first time a team from College Hockey America will participate in the Badger Hockey Showdown.

Wisconsin's first round opponent is Western Michigan. The ninth member of the CCHA to take part in the tournament, the Badgers look forward to their first meeting with the Broncos since the 1994 NCAA Tournament. The Badgers defeated the Broncos with a 6-3 victory in Albany, N.Y., before getting ousted by Boston University.

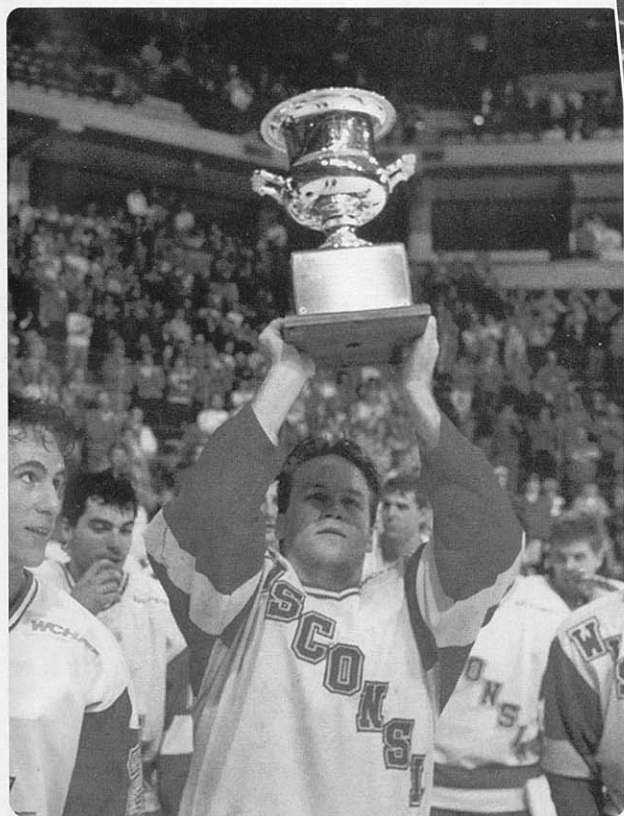

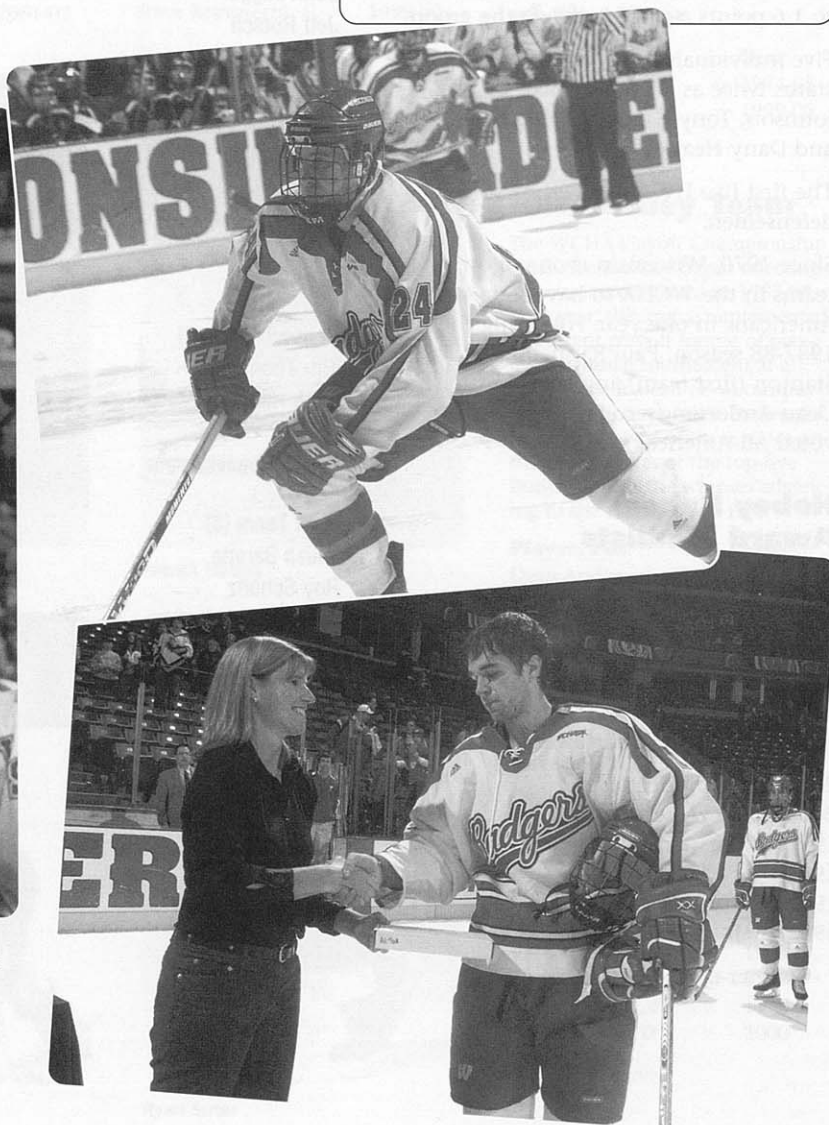

All-Americans

Did You Know?

Of the eight forwards who have earned first-team All-America accolades at Wisconsin, only two — Mark Johnson and Paul Ranheim — were born in the United States. Mike Eaves, John Newberry, Patrick Flatley, Gary Shuchuk, Steve Reinprecht and Dany Heatley all hail from Canada.

Bernd Brückler (2004) became the first Badger goaltending All-American since Roy Schultz (1980). Prior to Brückler, other potential Badger All-Americans left school early to sign NHL contracts — Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (Detroit Red Wings) and Jim Carey (Washington Capitals).

The eight first-team All-America forwards scored 626-758=1,384 in their Badger careers in 854 games. That averages out to 1.6 points a game between the group.

Five individuals have earned All-America status twice as a Badger: Mike Eaves, Mark Johnson, Tony Granato, Craig Norwich and Dany Heatley.

The first five UW All-Americans were defensemen.

Since 1970, Wisconsin is one of only two teams in the WCHA to have four All-Americans in one year. Following the 1987-88 season, Paul Ranheim and Paul Stanton (first team) and Steve Tuttle and Dean Anderson (second team) were all voted All-America.

Hobey Baker Award Finalists

Begun in 1981, the Hobey Baker Memorial Award was established to recognize college hockey's premier individual player. Ten players are selected each year as finalists for the award. Wisconsin has had six finalists for the award.

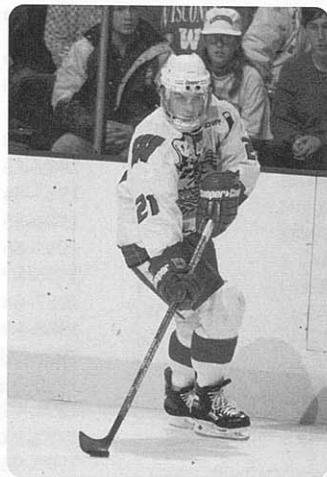

Final Five All-Tourney Team

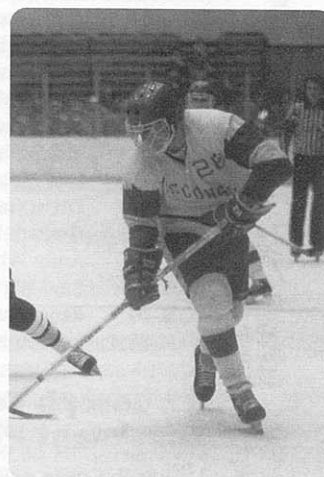

Ottawa Senators

Chosen No. 2 overall in the 2000 NHL Draft by the Atlanta Thrashers, Dany Heatley has become one of the young stars in the world's most talented hockey league.

Beginning his career in style by winning the 2001-02 Calder Trophy awarded to the league's top rookie, Heatley was also named to the 2001-02 NHL All-Rookie Team. He led all league rookies with 41 assists, 67 points and 202 shots and ranked second in the league with 26 goals during his first season.

Heatley avoided a sophomore slump by setting a franchise record with 89 points to rank ninth in the NHL, while his franchise-record 41 goals ranked sixth in the league. Named to the 2003 NHL All-Star Game, Heatley posted the fifth four-goal performance in all-star game history and added a fifth goal in the shootout to earn MVP honors.

Through 190 games played entering 2005-06, Heatley boasts career totals of 80 goals, 101 assists, 181 points, 31 power-play goals and 13 game-winning tallies.

Before the start of the 2005-06 campaign, Heatley was traded from the Atlanta Thrashers to the Ottawa Senators for Marian Hossa and Greg de Vries.



Chris Chelios

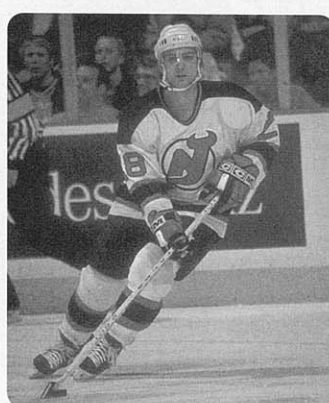
Detroit Red Wings

Sure-fire Hall of Fame defenseman Chris Chelios has enjoyed a 21-year NHL career that has included two Stanley Cups, three Norris Trophies, 11 NHL All-Star Game appearances and stints with three teams. His first Stanley Cup came with the Montreal Canadiens in 1985-86, while his most recent with the Detroit Red Wings in 2001-02. He won his first Norris Trophy in 1988-89 with the Canadiens, before winning the hardware in 1992-93 and 1995-96 with the Chicago Blackhawks.

A three-time U.S. Olympian, Chelios is a two-time captain of the team, including for the American's silver medal run in 2002. Captain in 1998 games, he also represented the United States at the 1984 games.

He has skated in over 1,600 NHL games including both regular season and playoffs, and has accumulated 208 goals and 1,051 points over his career.

In two seasons at Wisconsin, Chelios skated in 88 games and collected 97 points. He was also a part of Wisconsin's 1983 NCAA title-winning team as a member of the all-tournament team.



Brian Rafalski

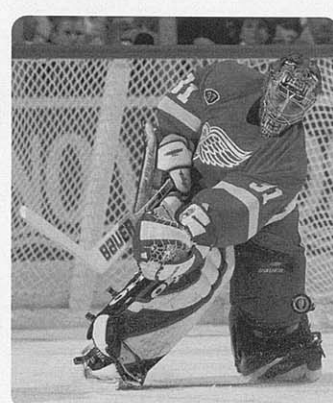
New Jersey Devils

A two-time Stanley Cup champion, Brian Rafalski joined the New Jersey Devils following a Badger career and four years of skating in Scandinavia.

Following a disappointing playoff performance by the Devils in 1998-99, one in which they failed to advance past the first round, general manager Lou Lamourillo went out and found a skilled defenseman. That man, Brian Rafalski, helped the Devils win the Stanley Cup the following season. Rafalski and his teammates won again in 2002-03, a year after the defenseman helped the United States win a silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Utah.

Rafalski skated in the 2004 NHL All-Star Game as a replacement for injured defensive partner Scott Stevens. He was also selected to play in the 2002 NHL All-Star Game, but missed it due to his own injury.

Over 459 career NHL games, including both regular season and playoff contests spanning five years, Rafalski has 44 goals and 139 points. In three of his seasons, he has led Devils' defensemen in scoring.



Curtis Joseph

Phoenix Coyotes

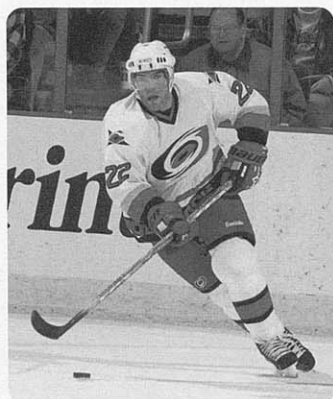
One of the NHL's most outstanding goaltenders through the 1990s, Joseph continues his excellence as a goaltender with the Phoenix Coyotes. Winner of the 2000 King Clancy Memorial Award for his humanitarian service, Joseph was runner-up for the Vezina Trophy as the NHL's top goaltender in 1998-99.

Joseph began his career with the St. Louis Blues during the 1989-90 season, and has since suited up for Edmonton, Toronto, Detroit and now Phoenix.

A two-time participant in the NHL All-Star Game (1994, 2000), Joseph boasts a career mark of 458-355-90 in 929 career games, including both regular season and playoff action. "Cujo" as he is known in NHL circles, also has 59 career shutouts to his credit.

Joseph represented his native Canada twice in Olympic competition, playing in 1998 and winning gold in 2002.

Despite playing just one season for Wisconsin, he was named the 1989 WCHA Player of the Year after 21-11-5 mark with a 2.49 goals-against average and .919 save percentage. He was also WCHA Rookie of the Year, a first-team all-WCHA pick and a second-team All-American.

Hill, who has 11 years in the NHL was a Stanley Cup champion in 1992-93 with the Montreal Canadiens. A veteran of six NHL teams, Hill also skated in the 2002 Stanley Cup Finals with the Carolina Panthers.

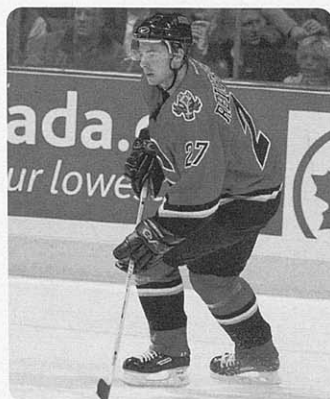
Beginning his career in Montreal after he was drafted by the Canadiens in 1988, he has also played for the Anaheim Mighty Ducks, Ottawa Senators, St. Louis Blues, while he signed with the Florida Panthers in the summer of 2004.

Hill was picked up by Anaheim in the 1993 expansion draft and recorded the franchise's first goal when the 1993-94 season began.

A 1992 U.S. Olympian, Hill helped the Americans to a fourth-place finish at the Games in Albertville, France.

In 728 career NHL games, including both regular season and playoff action, Hill has 62 goals, 192 assists, 254 points, 28 power-play tallies and 10 game-winning goals.

During a Wisconsin career that spanned 1988-91, Hill skated in 124 contests, collecting 35 goals and 129 points from the blue line. A second-team All-American in 1991, he played on the Badgers' most recent NCAA title, won during the 1989-90 campaign.



Steve Reinprecht

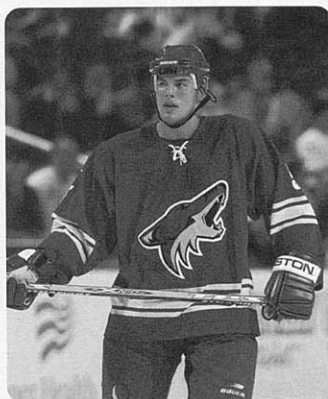
Calgary Flames

Winning the Stanley Cup during his first full season in the NHL, Reinprecht joined nine other Badgers who boast championship rings.

The NCAA leading scorer during his senior season of 1999-00, Reinprecht signed a free agent contract with Los Angeles Kings and skated in one game before the end of the season. He played the first 59 games of the next season with the Kings, before the Colorado Avalanche traded for his services for their Stanley Cup championship run.

Following two more seasons with the Avalanche, Reinprecht was acquired by the Calgary Flames, via the Buffalo Sabres, for the start of 2003-04. Injuries limited him to just 44 games played, and forced him to miss the Flames' trip to the 2004 Stanley Cup Finals.

As a Badger, Reinprecht was a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award as college hockey's top player. A First-Team All-American, he was also the WCHA Player of the Year in 1999-00. He completed his four-year UW career with 72 goals and 162 points in 154 games played. His totals included a senior season, during which he led the nation with 66 points in 37 games.



David Tanabe

Phoenix Coyotes

A five-year veteran of the NHL, Tanabe was drafted 16th overall by the Carolina Hurricanes in the 1999 NHL Draft.

After playing one season with the Badgers, a season he earned 1998-99 WCHA All-Rookie Team honors, Tanabe turned professional. During his only season at Wisconsin, he posted 10 goals and 22 points in 35 games played.

Professionally, Tanabe began his career splitting time between Carolina and Cincinnati of the IHL. The following season, he stuck with the Hurricanes and played in the 2002 Young Stars Game at the 2002 NHL All-Star Weekend.

That season, Carolina advanced to the Stanley Cup finals, though an injury allowed Tanabe to skate in just one playoff game.

Following one more season in Carolina, Tanabe was traded to the Phoenix Coyotes, the team he played for during the 2003-04 campaign.

Over his five-year career, the rearguard has skated in 303 games during the regular and postseason, collecting 22 goals and 77 points, while chipping in 14 power-play tallies and three game-winning scores.



Scott Mellanby

Atlanta Thrashers

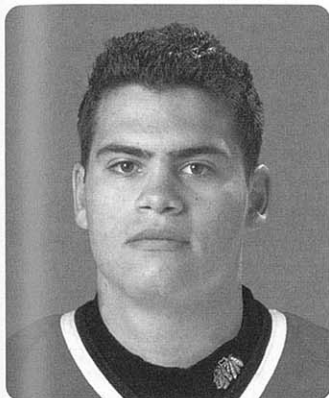
Selected 27th overall in the 1984 NHL Draft by the Philadelphia Flyers, Mellanby has reached the 20-goal plateau eight times and scored at least 30 goals twice, during his 20 seasons in the professional ranks.

Following six years with the Flyers, Mellanby was dealt to the Edmonton Oilers. Two seasons with the Oilers ended when he was chosen in the 1993 expansion draft by the Florida Panthers. He skated eight-plus seasons with the Panthers, helping the team set an expansion team record for points. He also led the team to the 1996 Stanley Cup Finals, inspiring Panther fans to throw toy rats on the ice during the season after killing a rat in the locker room.

He went on to play for the St. Louis Blues following a midseason trade in 2000-01, and now belongs to the Atlanta Thrashers after signing with the team during the summer of 2004.

An NHL All-Star Game participant in 1996, Mellanby boasts 1,423 games in the NHL. During his career, he has amassed 454 goals, 459 assists and 823 goals to go along with 141 power-play scores and 54 game-winning goals.

At Wisconsin, Mellanby skated from 1984-86, posting 35 goals and 82 points in 72 games played.

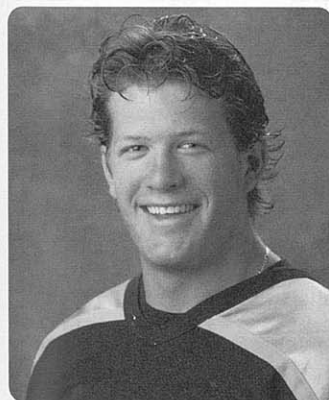


Rene Bourque

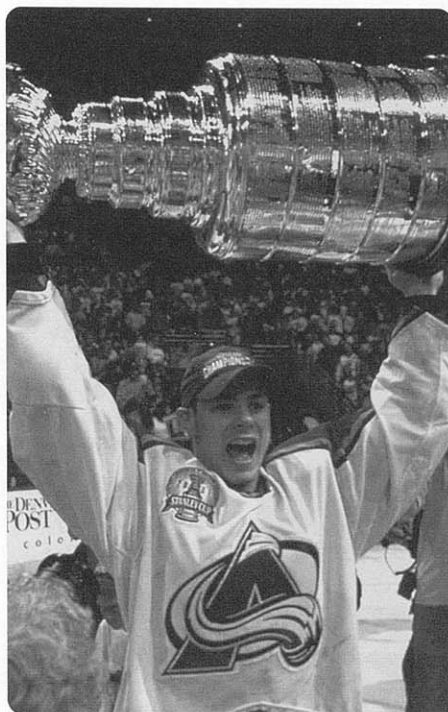

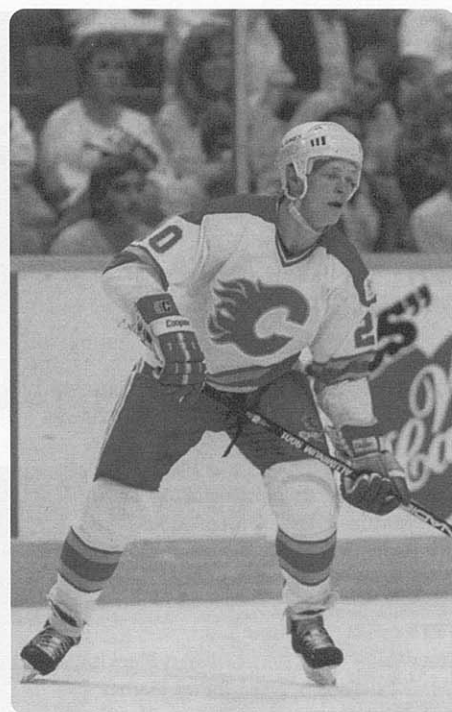
Nashville Predators

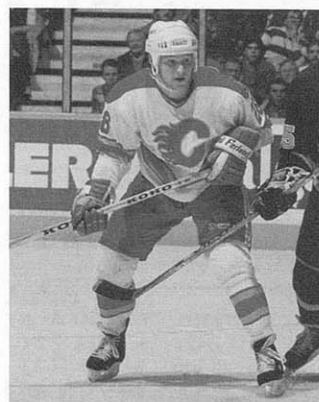

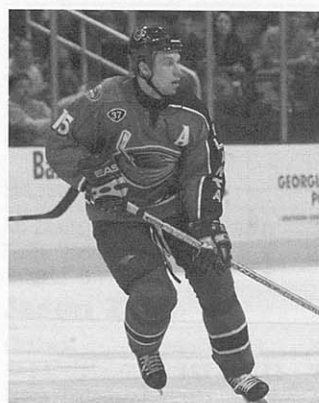

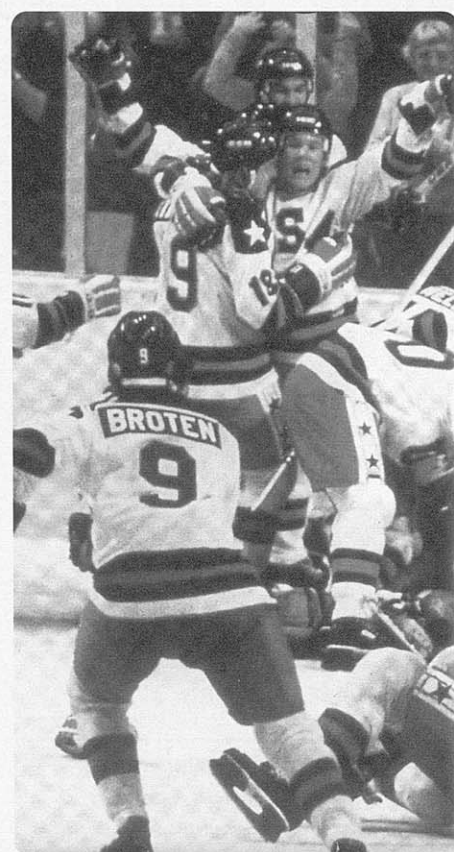

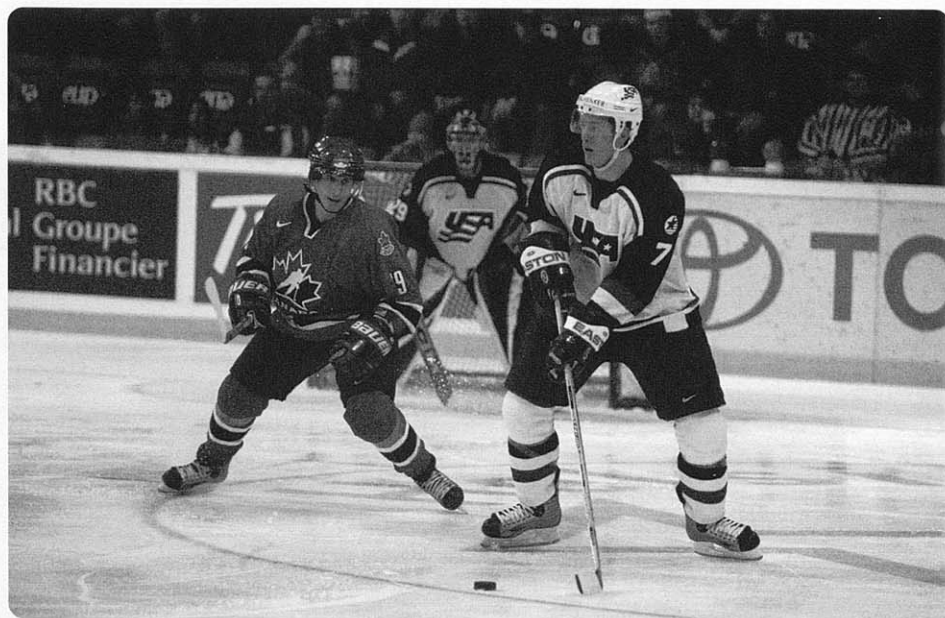

The Hat Trick

There have been 185 hat tricks in UW history, including 155 three-goal, 27 four-goal and three five-goal 'tricks'. Listed below are the most recent players to record a three-, four- or five-goal game.

Three goals

Robbie Earl scored the most recent Badger hat trick at Alaska Anchorage on Nov. 19, 2004.

Four goals

Ryan MacMurchy was the last player to score four goals in a game. On Jan. 8, 2005, MacMurchy scored all four Wisconsin goals in a 4-2 victory at St. Cloud State.

Five goals

Badger women's hockey coach Mark Johnson is one of only three players in UW history to score five goals in one game. On Jan. 27, 1978, Johnson hit the back of the net five times in a 10-2 win over Michigan Tech in Madison. (Bert DeHate, 2/24/67 and Mike Meeker, 10/29/77 previously accomplished the feat.)

Natural hat trick

Only seven players have notched a natural hat trick by recording three consecutive goals in a game. The most-recent Badger to accomplish a natural hat trick was Dany Heatley at Alaska Anchorage on Feb. 19, 2000. He scored the first three goals in a 5-0 win by the Badgers.

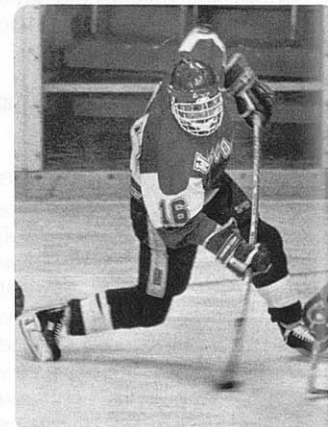

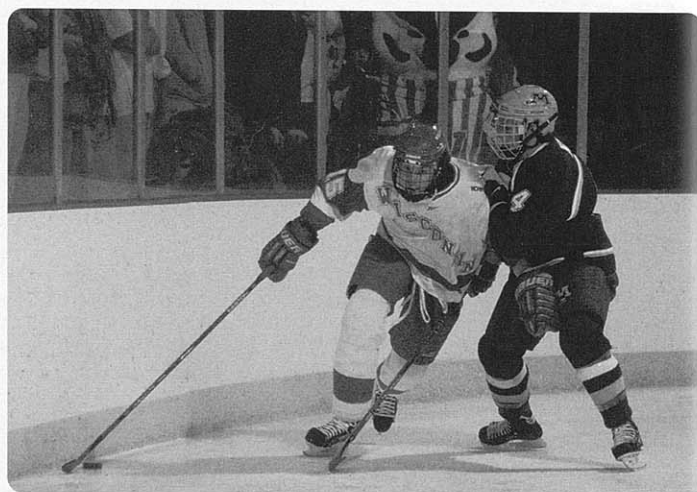

Covering The Badgers

Credentials

Requests for credentials must be placed with the UW Athletic Communications Office via email at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Requests should be made by the media agency's sports editor or director and addressed to Paul Capobianco, Assistant Director of Athletic Communications, at phc@athletics.wisc.edu. Requests are acceptable via mail at 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. If faxing your credential request, the fax number is (608) 262-8184. Media covering the Badger beat may request credentials for road games through Capobianco.

Credentials are issued according to the following guidelines:

1. National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication.
2. All newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director.
3. Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast.
4. Television and radio stations covering for nightly news.
5. All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin hockey.

Note: Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

Photographers

Requests should be submitted via email to the UW Athletic Communications Office and are granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis. Photographers are free to shoot from most locations in the Kohl Center but are reminded to be considerate of patrons. Credentials must be prominently displayed at all times.

Strobes are available for use by photographers and will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis. Cost per event is \$200.

Radio Originations

Radio stations wishing to broadcast Badger hockey games should contact the UW Athletic Communications Office at least one week in advance to place their credential requests. Radio talent work from the top row of the press area in section 208 of the Kohl Center.

Credential Pick Up

Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed, made available at the Athletic Communications Office or left with the parking attendant at the entrance to Lot 91 off of Bedford Street on gamedays. A map showing parking locations is on page 170.

Video Services

Television stations desiring highlights of Badger players should contact Zach Remiker of the UW Video Department in Camp Randall Stadium. Phone: (608) 265-6146.

Phone Lines

All requests for installation of phone lines should be made to Jamie Buchanan at (608) 265-8546 or JB2@athletics.wisc.edu. There is a cost associated with line installation. Broadcast locations are assigned by UW Athletic Communications based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. If you are not part of the WCHA co-op agreement, you must make your phone line requests (especially if you need ISDN lines) at least one week in advance of the game(s).

There are two standard phone lines as well as ISDN lines for visiting radios which are part of the co-op line arrangement. Numbers for those lines are (608) 257-3416/4824 (standard lines) and (608) 250-2552/2634 (ISDN).

There are also courtesy phones made available by the UW Athletic Communications Office in the press area and in the media room located on the ice level of the Kohl Center.

Media Workroom

The Kohl Center features a large media workroom that contains the following:

- post-game interview area
- numerous working locations from which media can file stories
- platform for video cameras
- copy machine
- pre-game dining area
- photo darkroom
- men's and women's restrooms

Game programs, line charts, game notes and media guides are available in the workroom.

Media may store personal belongings in the workroom from the time they arrive at the Kohl Center until after the game.

The workroom is located at the northeast corner of the arena at ice level. To access the workroom from outside the arena, enter through the media gate and proceed down the stairs on your right.

Practice

The Wisconsin hockey team has two main practice locations — the Kohl Center and the Alliant Energy Center Arena. Please call the UW Athletic Communications Office for site and specific times of practices.

Many times the Badgers conduct split practices and most players only participate in one of those sessions. If you need to interview a specific player, please call ahead to make sure he will be available.

Typical practice times are from 3:00-5:15, Monday-Wednesday. Thursday practices (during weeks of home games) normally run from 3:15-5:00. Practice times are subject to change.

Media attending practices should be aware that the Badger locker room and lounge area is closed.

Scouting Tickets

Per the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's policy, professional hockey scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office at 1-800-GO-BADGERS or (608) 262-1440.

Interviewing Coach Eaves

Head coach Mike Eaves will be available for interviews after practice sessions, Monday-Thursday.

Eaves also holds a weekly media conference throughout the season. These sessions begin at 1 p.m. and will be held in the media room in the Kohl Center. Those not able to attend may watch the news conference live at uwbadgers.com.

On the road, Eaves is available at the Badgers' hotel or following practice sessions.

Those media wishing to conduct a phone interview with Coach Eaves should call the hockey office directly at (608) 262-3932. It is easiest to reach Eaves by phone in the mornings, Mondays through Wednesdays.

Player Interviews

Badger players are available for interviews AFTER practices (except on game days). Practices are generally held between 3-6 p.m. regardless of the site.

From the Dane County Airport

Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue – Johnson Street – Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

From West I-90 / 94 (from Minneapolis)

Take I-90 / 94 to Highway 151 South (East Washington Avenue). Continue on East Washington Avenue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right onto Butler Street, proceed to Gorham Street and turn left. Continue on Gorham Street, which becomes University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

From South and I-90 (from Chicago)

Take I-90 to the Madison beltline (Highway 12/18). West on the beltline to Park Street (Hwy. 151). Exit right (north). Take Park Street to Dayton Street. Turn right onto Dayton Street, then approximately three blocks to the Kohl Center, which will be on the right.

From East and I-94 (from Milwaukee)

Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers/ Pennsylvania Avenue. Continue on Packers/Pennsylvania Avenue, which changes to Johnson Street – Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

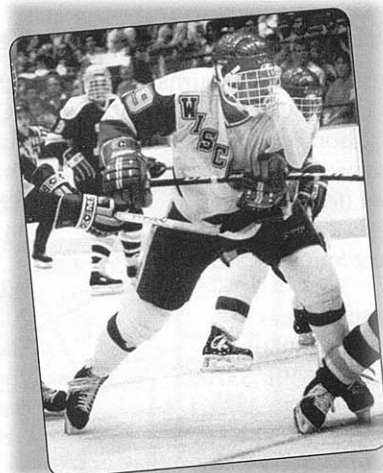

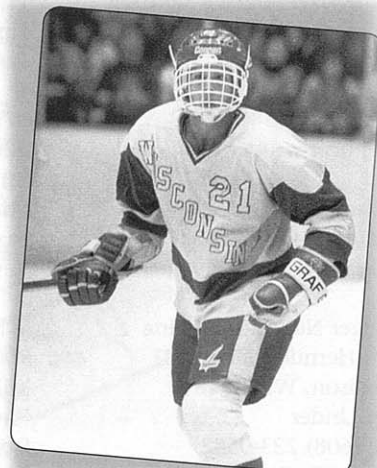

The Madison sports veteran also called Badger hockey games on WHA-TV's delayed hockey broadcasts for two years prior to his current broadcasting duties with WIBA.

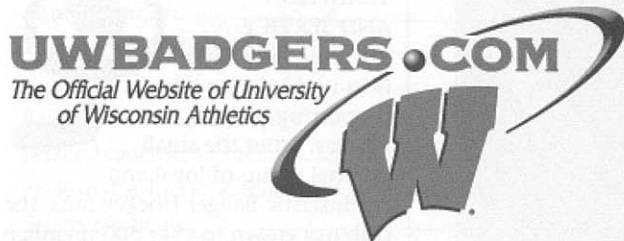

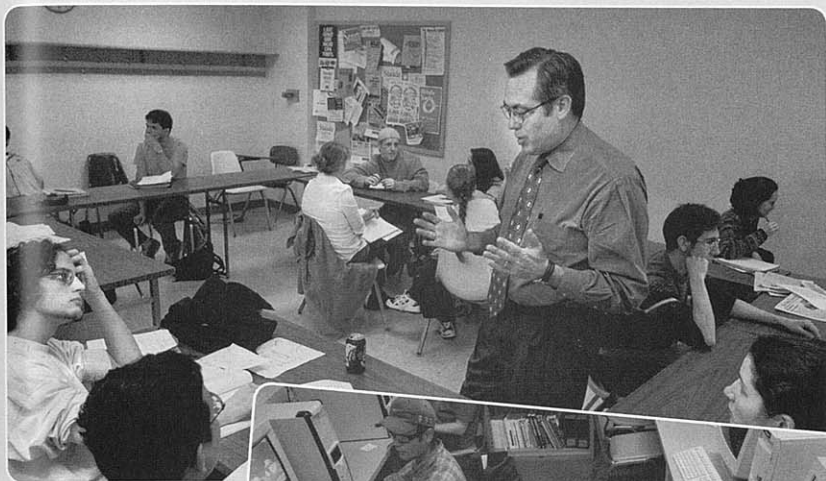

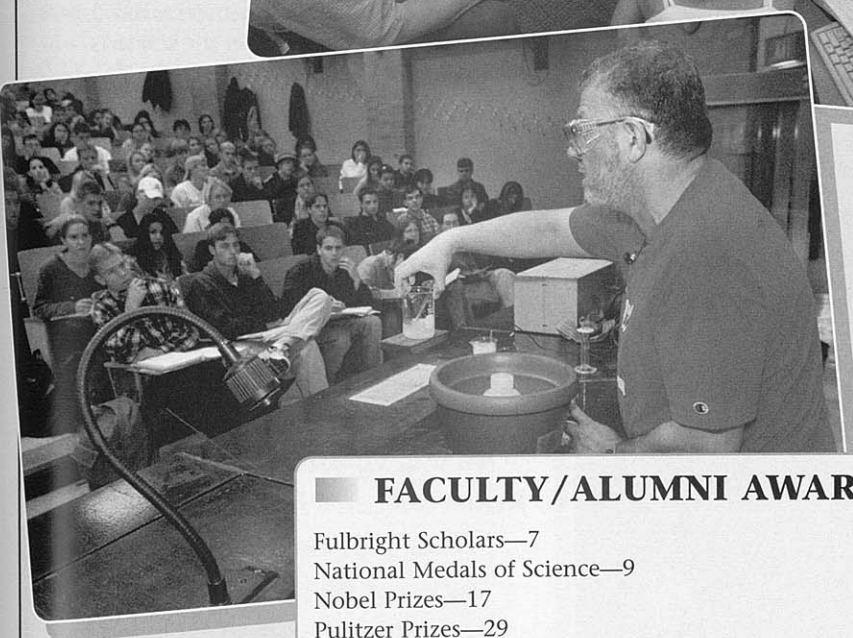

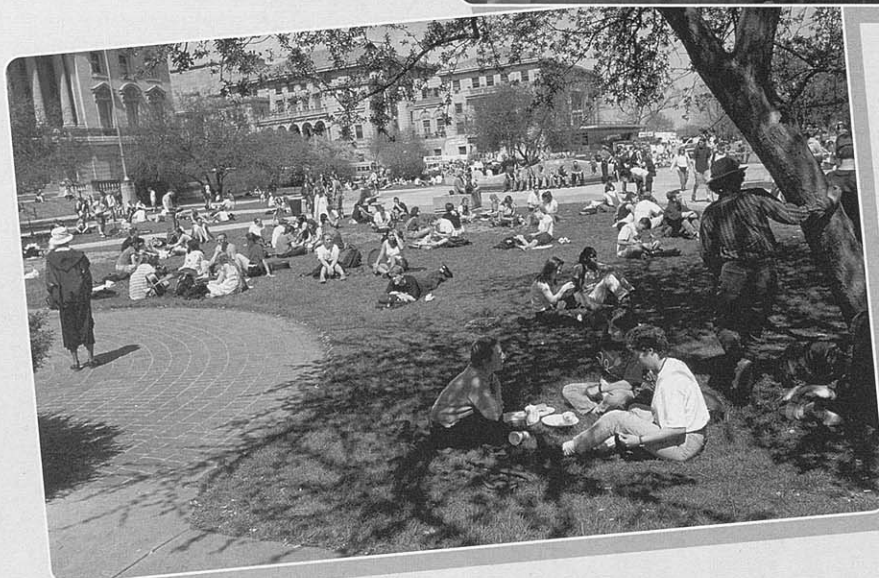

Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.

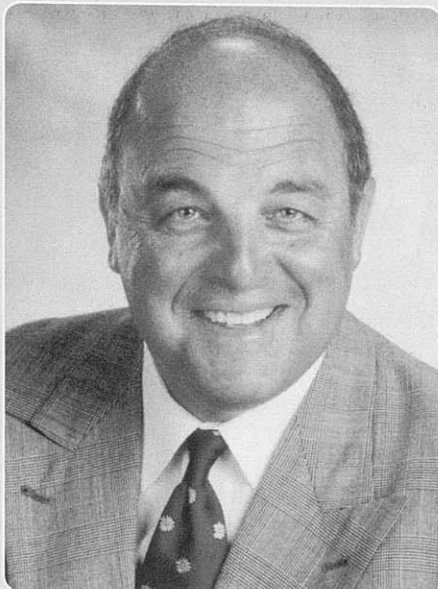
Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

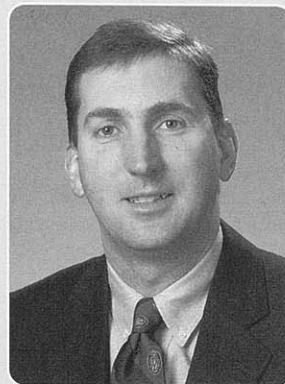
Barry Alvarez is in his second year as the only person among Bowl Championship Series schools serving in the dual role of Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach. The Badger football coach since 1990, he is in his second campaign as athletic director.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (108-70-4 record).

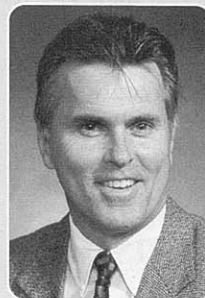
His 7-3 (.700) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college football history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

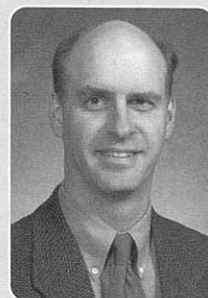

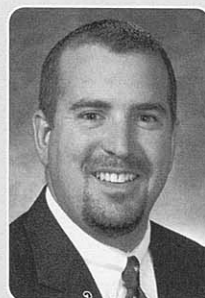

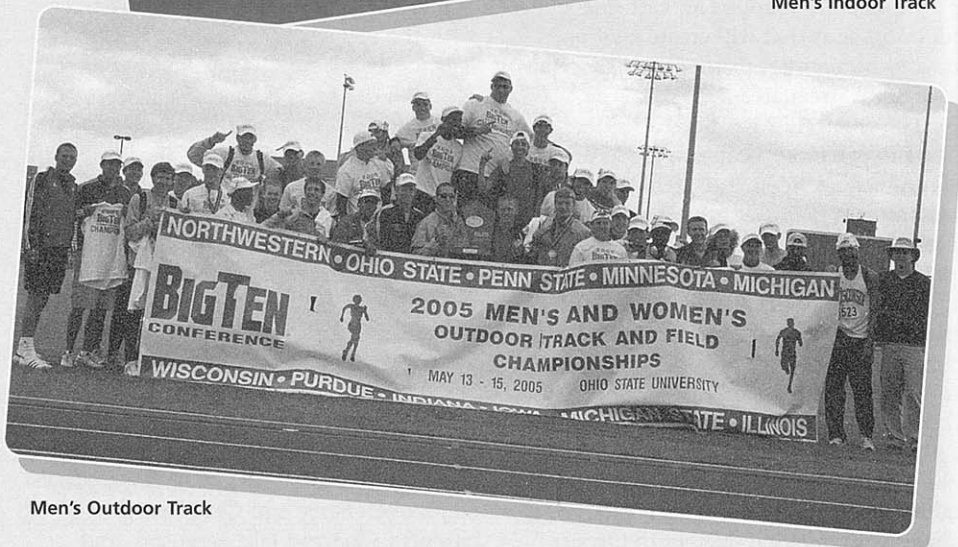
2004-05 Big Ten Conference Champions



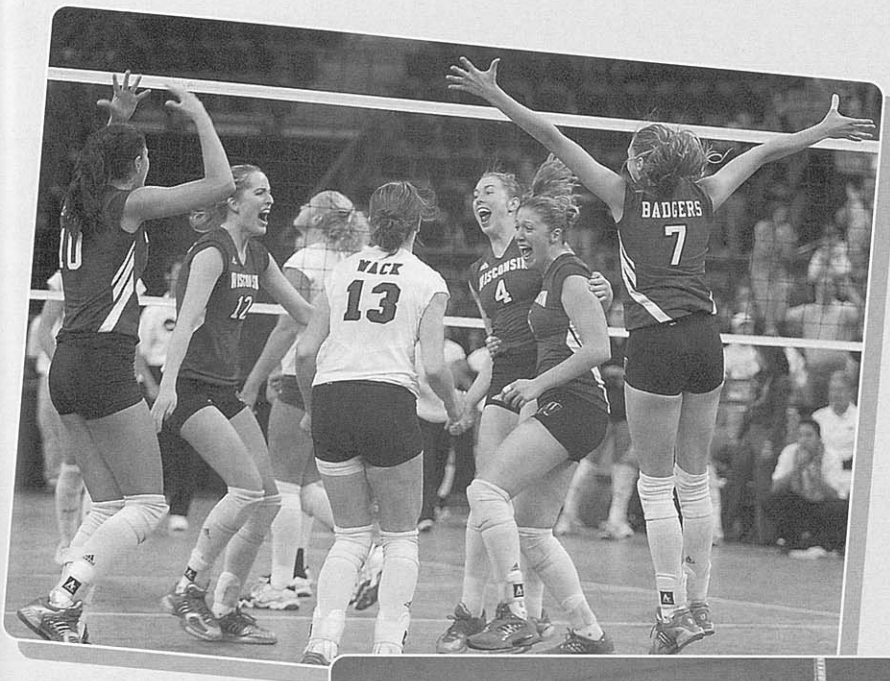

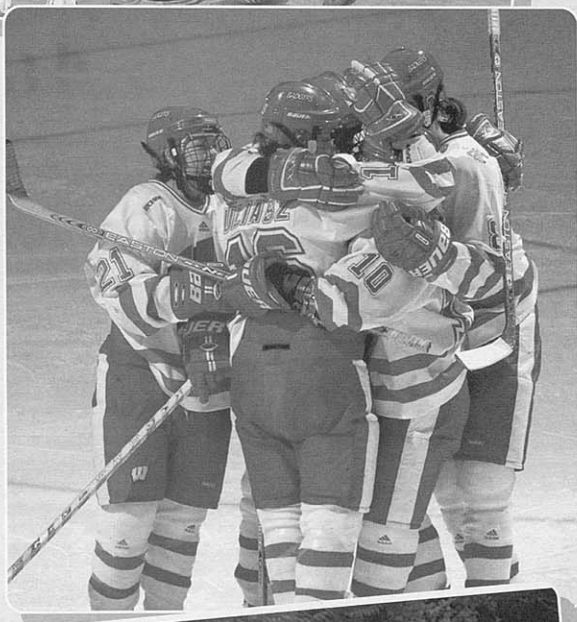

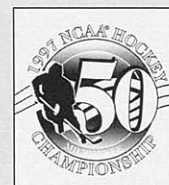
NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

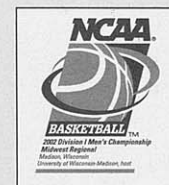
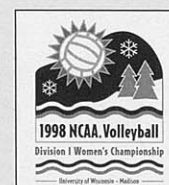
The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell-out in NCAA hockey history.



Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.



The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.



The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

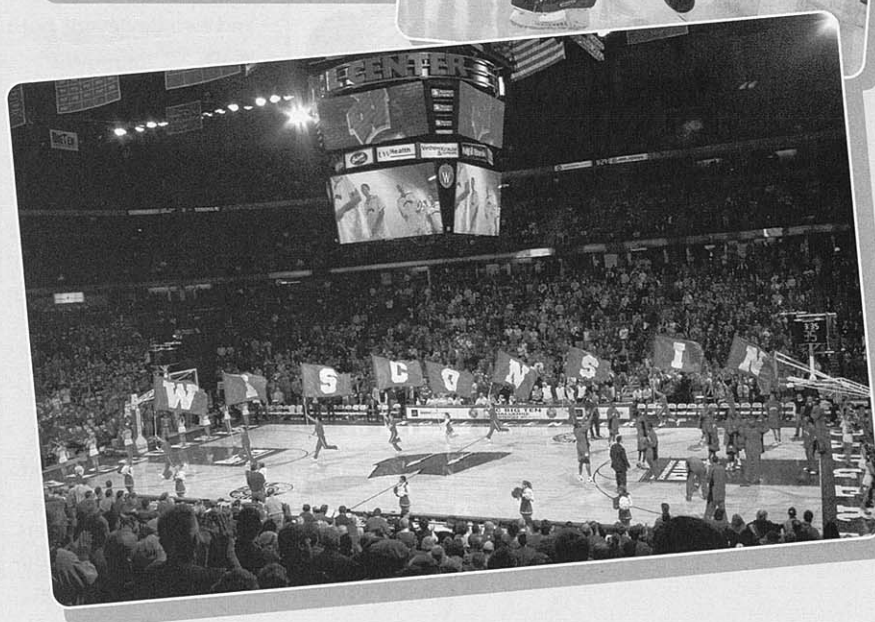
The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.



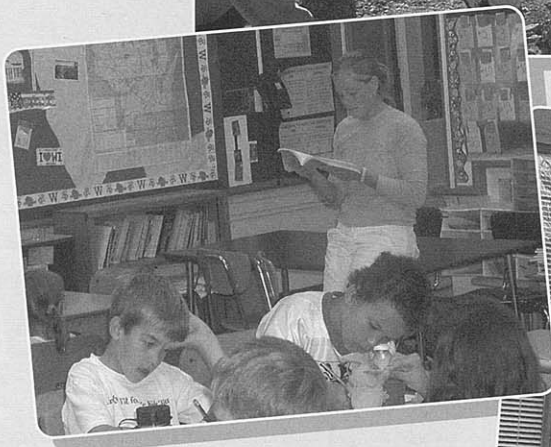
Badgers in the Community

Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

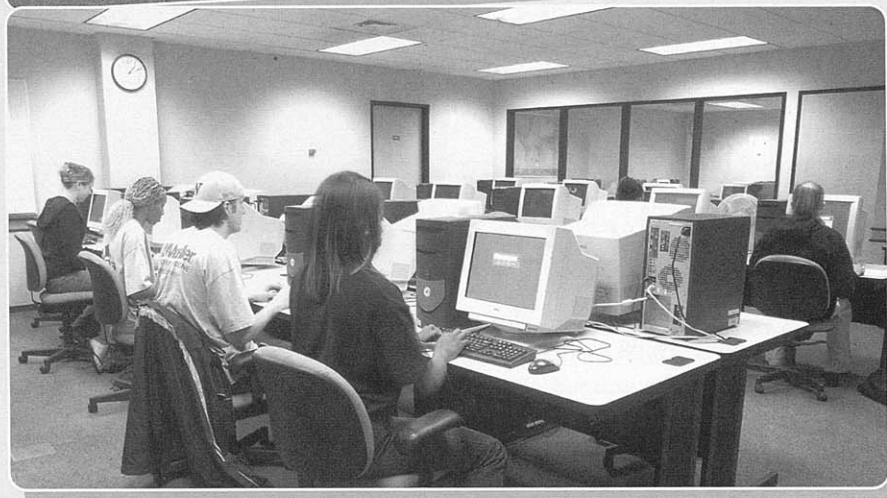
The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all student-athletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the library system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.



The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes eight study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

CHAMPS LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care.

Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Laura King, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

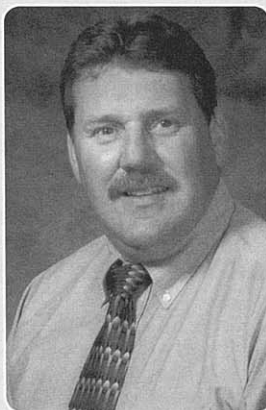
The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Bryan Miller, Mike Potenza and Greg Young work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

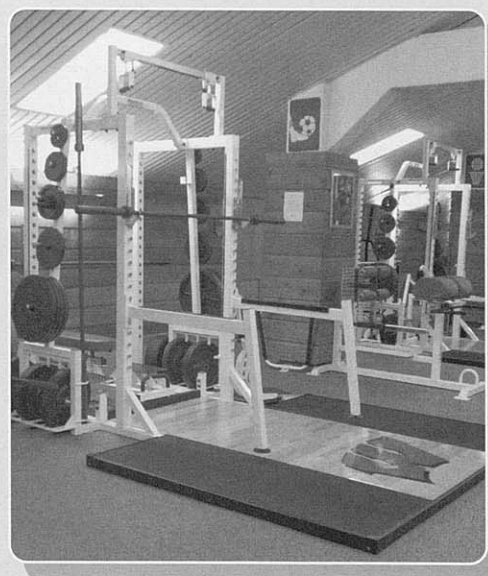
The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.

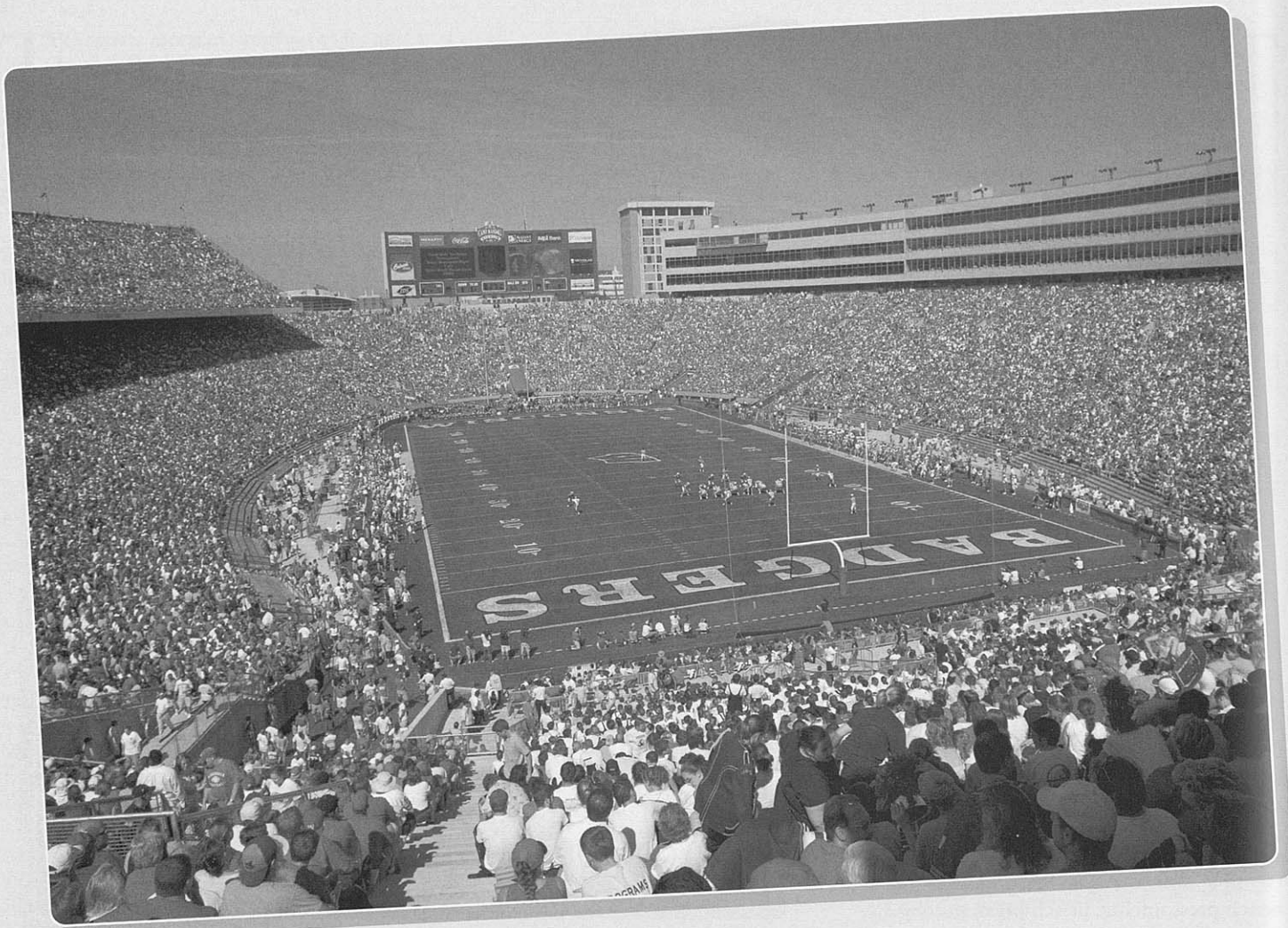

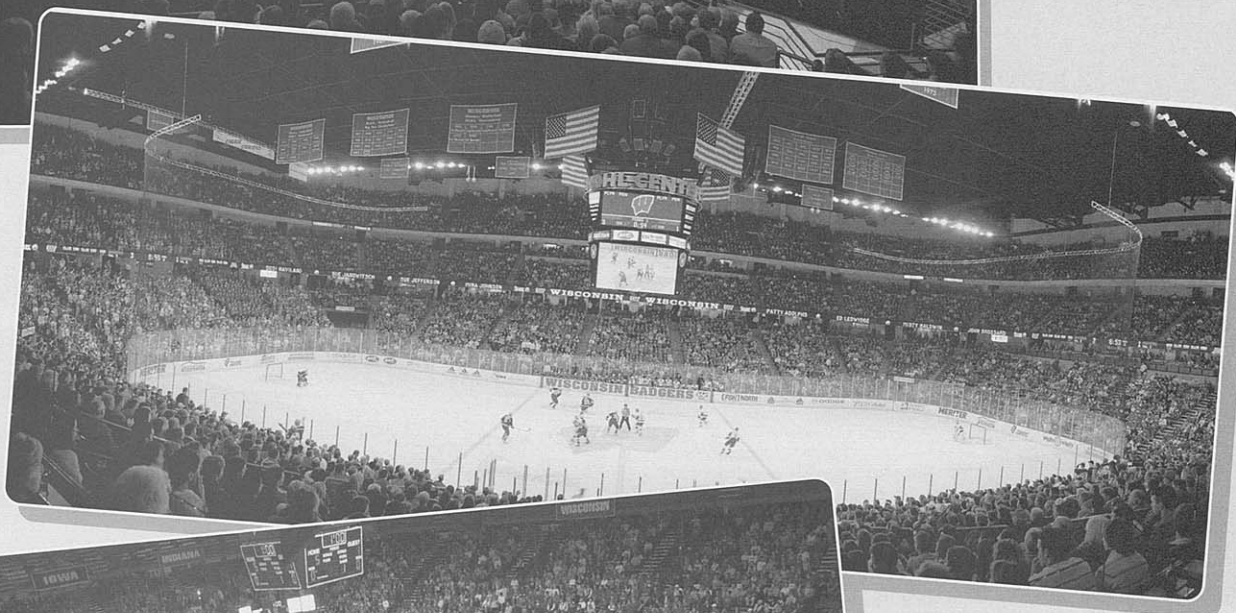
Top: Camp Randall Stadium is the home of the football Badgers and has a seating capacity of more than 80,000. The stadium recently completed a \$109 million renovation that includes a new office building, video scoreboards, suites and club seating as well as other improved fan amenities.

The Natatorium contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic timing system and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter boards, two three-meter boards and a five-meter platform as well as a trampoline and dryland diving board, both with overhead spotting rigs. The Southeast Recreational Facility (shown above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads.

Right: Nielsen Tennis Stadium is the year-round home of the Badger tennis teams. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts and one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.

Whatever your preference for relaxation or recreation, you'll find plenty to do in Madison.

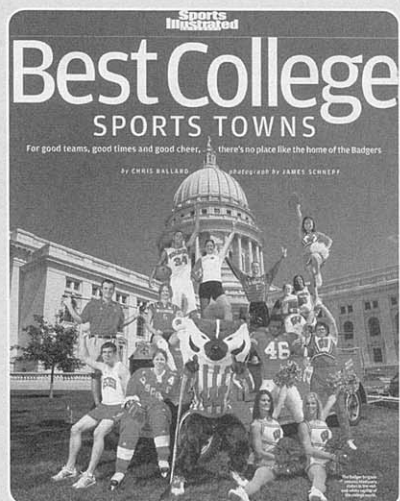
Top: The State Capitol is the center of Madison's isthmus between Lakes Mendota and Monona.

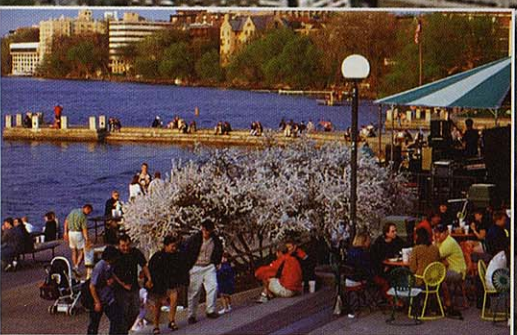
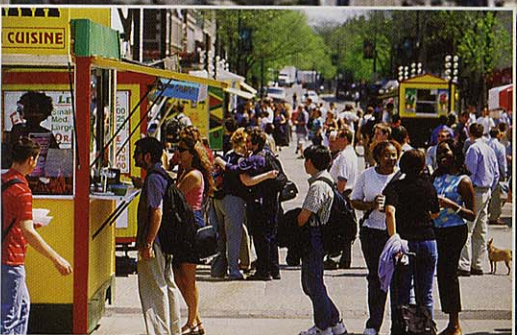
