

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.

That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 72 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into whitewashed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled -usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a timeand 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the sprears of war into the plowshares of peace.'

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from the fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quar-


The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers; the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horse shoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

The current construction project is the third since the end of World War II which began with the completion of the horseshoe at the north end in 1950 and 1951.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field of Camp Randall lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

Assistant Athletic Director Milt Bruhn

Wisconsin assistant athletic director is Milt Bruhn who was appointed to the job following the close of the 1966 football campaign.

Milt is in his 20th year on the Wisconsin athletic staff following 11 years as head football coach (52-45-6

from 1956-66) and seven years as assistant coach to Ivan Williamson from 1949-55.

He starred as a guard on unbeaten Minnesota teams of 1934 and 1935 and coached at Amherst, Minnesota, Colgate, Franklin and Marshall, and Lafayette College (line coach under Williamson) before settling here at Wisconsin in 1949.

Highlight of Milt's coaching career were undisputed Big Ten championships in 1959 and 1962 (performed by only one other coach in Wisconsin history); the

No. 2 national ranking achieved by the 1962 team (highest national finish ever for a Wisconsin team); and the 1963 Rose Bowl performance against Southern California in which a 23 point final period rally fell just short in that memorable 42-37 game.

Bruhn was born in St. Bonifacius, Minnesota on July 28, 1912 and following graduation from Mound High School went on to a distinguished athletic career at Minnesota, graduating in 1936.

Milt's two children, Peter and Mary Anne are both graduates of Wisconsin. Pete graduated in 1964 after winning a major "W" on the 1962 championship team as a center. He served in Viet Nam as an Air Force pilot during 1966-1967.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR IVAN B. WILLIAMSON

Ivan Williamson, the man who re-built Wisconsin's football fortunes during a successful seven year reign from 1949-1955, is beginning his 13th year as Wisconsin athletic director.

He has been a resourceful, imaginative and firm leader under whose direction Wisconsin's athletic program has had a well-ordered planned growth. During the past seven years, Wisconsin's overall athletic program has ranked in the Big Ten's first division.

Ivy, as he is popularly known, succeeded to the athletic directorship following the untimely death of Wisconsin's beloved Guy Sundt, Oct. 25, 1955. Williamson was appointed as Guy's successor on Nov. 12 by the board of regents but did not take office until Dec. 1. Ivy is the sixth person to hold the position of athletic director. Others were Thomas E. Jones (1916-1924). George Little (1925-32), Walter Meanwell (1933-35), Harry Stuhldreher (1936-1950), and Guy Sundt (1950-55).

Williamson first came to Wisconsin in February, 1949, to take over the head football coaching responsibilities. In his seven seasons, Wisconsin won 41 games, tied four, and lost 19 against all opponents. His Big Ten record was just as impressive, the Badgers winning 29 against 13 setbacks and four ties. In addition, Wisconsin tied for the championship in 1952, played in the Rose Bowl, and for the first six years was in title contention or Rose Bowl consideration right up to the final gun of the season.

He came to Wisconsin with an excellent background. He played football at Michigan during the seasons of 1930 through 1932, won honors as an all-conference end, and captained the team in his senior year. In that three-year span, Michigan won or shared three Big Ten titles and lost only one game while winning 24 and tying two.

At Michigan, "Ivy" also earned two basketball letters and his football coach at that time, Harry Kipke, said, "Ivan Williamson is the smartest player I have ever had or hope to have."

Before coming to Wisconsin, Williamson was head coach for two years at Lafayette College. His 1947 team won six games and lost three, while in 1948, his charges won seven games out of nine, bowing only to Army and Rutgers.

Born in Prairie Depot, Ohio (now called Wayne), on Feb. 4, 1911, Williamson was graduated from Bowling Green high school after excelling in both scholarship and athletics. He entered Michigan and upon his graduation had not only won laurels as one of the outstanding athletes in Wolverine history but wound up with special honors in scholarship. He also holds a masters' degree from Michigan, obtained in 1940. He is married and has twin sons, Jack and David, age 30. Son Jack is a 1960 graduate of Stanford, while David completed his college education at Wisconsin in January, 1961.

Following his graduation in the spring of 1933, Williamson coached football and basketball at Roseville, Mich., high school, producing an unbeaten eleven. In the spring of 1934, he accepted a position as assistant coach on the Yale football staff, serving there under Raymond "Ducky" Pond through 1940, and under Emerson "Spike" Nelson in 1941.

In June of 1942, he entered the Navy and put in a

In June of 1942, he entered the Navy and put in a season of coaching under Potsy Clark at Pensacola, Fla., Navy base. His war-time service also included duties at the naval station in Sanford, Fla., the Gunnery school at Hollywood, Fla., the Cadet Selection board at Detroit, Mich., and the training carrier, USS Wolverine, Chicago.

After his discharge in 1945, he resumed his former football duties at Yale, this time assisting Howie Odell. He left there in 1947 to take over head coaching duties at Lafayette.

JOHN COATTA
Head Football Coach — 2nd Season

Wisconsin's head football coach is **John Coatta**, a 39-year-old 'bundle of energy' who starred on some of the Badgers' finest football teams during his collegiate career here.

John is starting his second year as head coach—he was named to succeed **Milt Bruhn** on December 9, 1966—and his fourth season on the Badger staff after serving two years as an assistant coach.

A native of Dearborn, Michigan, John Coatta was the star quarterback on the 1949, 1950, and 1951 Wisconsin football teams—coached by Ivan Williamson—which compiled a three season mark of 18-7-2.

Playing career highlights were many for the talented **Coatta** who enrolled here in 1948 after a sparkling prep career that included a year at Kiski Prep school

He was a highly effective short passer and still holds the Big Ten record for completion accuracy of .642 set in 1950 on 52 completions in 81 attempts in seven conference games. Against Ohio State in his junior year he threw ten straight completions (matched by John Boyajian against Minnesota last year) in a 19-14 defeat by the Buckeyes in as fierce a game as ever played between the two conference schools

Another highlight came in 1951 when he completed 19 of 32 pass attempts for 164 yards (a Wisconsin school mark for completions in a conference game that was equalled by Ron Miller in 1961 against Min-

nesota) in a 14-10 defeat at the hands of Illinois. That was the only loss suffered by the 'Hard Rocks' as the team of that year has been affectionately remembered through the years by Wisconsin fans.

Holds Completion Record

John was Wisconsin's top scorer for the 1950 season when he tallied one touchdown and booted 17 extra points in twenty attempts. Extra points placekicked by Coatta proved to be the winning margin in 7-6 and 14-13 victories over Illinois and Northwestern, respectively, that season.

Coatta left private business in Madison in 1959 to begin his coaching career as an assistant under Perry Moss at Florida State University.

He proved to be a versatile and well-liked member of the Florida State football staff. He was defensive backfield coach in 1959 under Moss, and became offensive backfield coach a year later when the current coach, Bill Peterson, took over.

In 1964 Florida State compiled an 8-1-1 winning record, plus a convincing 36-19 victory over Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl, with Coatta accepting a new assignment as coach of defensive ends and linebackers.

He returned to Wisconsin in January, 1965 as an assistant to serve as offensive backfield coach. In 1966 he coached the defensive ends and linebackers.

High praise for the Wisconsin graduate—who earned both his B.A. and M.A. degrees in Physical Education—came from his former head coach at Florida State, Bill Peterson, who says "John was the most valuable and versatile member of my staff."

Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson commented, "John Coatta will make a fine head football coach. He has the necessary experience and background in all phases of the game—offensively and defensively. "He has illustrated real potential for leadership required in this position.

Wisconsin's 22nd Grid Coach

John is the school's 22nd head football coach and only the fourth "W" man ever to head up the school's football program. The three "W" men who preceded him as coach were Art Curiis, Bill Juneau, and John Richards.

Richards, an end and fullback during his playing days here before the turn of the century coached at Wisconsin on three occasions—1911, 1917, and from 1919 through 1922—and produced a winning record in each of the six seasons he guided the Badgers. His overall record was 29-9-4, and in Big Ten play it was 17-9-3—the fourth best winning percentage by a Wisconsin football coach against conference opposition.

The first "W" man ever to coach here was Art Curtis, a tackle on the 1898-1899-1900-1901 teams—and captain of the latter team—who held the reigns in 1903 and 1904.

William Juneau, also an end and halfback during his Wisconsin career from 1899 through 1902, and captain in 1902, was the other "W" man to become football coach at his alma mater. He guided the Badgers to the 1912 conference championship in his first year.

John is 39 years old and is married to the former Jean Reynolds, the daughter of former Madison Mayor Henry Reynolds, and has three sons and two daughters.

WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1968

"We're going to win some games this year—we're going to be better."

The words are those of Wisconsin head football coach John Coatta who undertook the task of rebuilding the school's depleted football fortunes following the 1966 season and suffered through a winless 1967 campaign.

The immediate challenge facing the coaching staff and the squad in the forthcoming 1968 season is to overcome the effect of not winning a year ago. The Badgers could gain only a 21-21 tie with Iowa among their ten opponents but the general concensus was that Wisconsin was a better team than the record—0-9-1—would indicate.

Badgers Lost Close Games

Wisconsin in 1967 lost five of its games by a total of 20 points—13-11 to Pittsburgh, 17-15 to Ohio State, 17-13 to Northwestern, 14-9 to Indiana, and 21-14 to Minnesota in the season's finale.

"Alumni and fans often told me prior to hie season they didn't mind losing as long as the result was respectable. They didn't like those 51-0 or 50-14 scores.

"After the 1967 season the comment had changed. They were saying, "If we only had a coach, we'd have won those close games."

A few breaks here and there—the ball never did bounce right for the Badgers all season—and the Wisconsin record would have been as respectable as the brand of football played.

"We have to believe we can win."

The nucleus of the 1968 football team revolves around a group of 22 returning lettermen, several talented players from an unbeaten freshman team and immediate help from nine junior college transfers.

Thirteen of the returning lettermen earned their spurs offensively in 1967, including eight starters. The entire interior offensive line returns intact with seniors Brandt Jackson and Ed Hoffman at tackles; senior Wally Schoessow and junior Don Murphy at guards; and senior Rex Blake at center. Schoessow is a highly rated offensive blocker and has been a two year regular—1966 at center and last year at guard.

Ryan Is Two-Year Veteran

Quarterback John Ryan has completed 105 passes in 230 attempts during his two previous seasons here netting 1,136 yards and five touchdowns and may blossom into a full-fledged starter this season. He will be challenged by junior Lew Ritcherson, a prep All-American at Moore High school in Waco, Texas, and sophomore Gary Losse, a talented product of Neenah, Wis.

Wisconsin appears well stocked with running backs but still there is a lack of the break-away runner. Senior **John Smith** was the team's top rusher in 1967 with 362 yards in 96 carries and had a fine spring—he ran well for consistent yardage.

Behind Smith is a talented sophomore from Glenview, Ill.—Randy Marks, the scourge of the Chicago Catholic League two years ago. He runs well, he runs hard, he runs often. In two freshman games last season he gained 348 yards in 60 carries.

The Badgers have a hard-running veteran fullback returning, too—Wayne Todd, a 6-2, 236-pound native of Canton, Ohio—who was the team's top rusher in 1966 as a sophomore with 480 yards in 128 carries, and who averaged 4.6 yards per carry in 55 attempts in 1967 before being sidelined with a broken hand in the fourth period of the Indiana game.

Split-end Mel Reddick caught 42 passes for 524 yards and two touchdowns as a sophomore last year while flanker Tom McCauley has caught 83 passes for 1,214 yards and three scores during his two seasons of play. Three year starter Bill Fritz has graduated leaving the tight end position open and it's expected that newcomer James Johnson or junior Scott Lindsey will battle for the starting assignment here.

Defense Must Be Re-Built

The Badgers last year moved the ball better offensively—2800 yards—than any other Wisconsin team since the 1962 season when the Badgers won the title and played their Rose Bowl spectacular against Souhtern California. The principal weakness was defense as opponents amassed a grand total of 3,404 yards running (2112) and passing (1292).

Defensively, just four starters return. Happily, one is **Ken Criter**, the Big Ten's top linebacker last year with 85 solo tackles and 84 assisted tackles. His spirited play and ability netted him a place on the Big Ten's first all-conference team.

The Badgers will utilize a 4-4-3 defense in 1968 with Criter, John Borders, another letterman, and sophomore Chuck Winfrey already assured starting assignments as linebackers with the fourth regular slated to be picked from among Peter Higgins, a letterwinner as a defensive halfback in 1967; transferBill Majewski, and sophomore Dick Hyland.

The defensive front four must be rebuilt with the lone returning letterman regular being end Lynn Buss. Senior Gary Swalve developed as 1967 progressed and could gain the starting job opposite Buss, while sophomores Bill Gregory and Bob Snell could step in at the tackle positions, though senior letterman Jim Nowak must be rated a contender for one of the tackle jobs.

In the deep secondary halfbacks Gary Reineck and Mike Cavill have been two year regulars with Cavill expected to move over to safety this season. Sophomore Bill Yarborough is expected to start at one of the halfback positions, and newcomers Dan Crooks. Nathaniel Butler and Dan Edwards—a junior college transfer—have the ability.

Junior College Help Available

Immediate help will come from nine junior college transfers. Two of them—wingback Joe Dawkins and defensive halfback Dan Edwards—were first semester Junior College graduates and enrolled in school in February and thus were able to partake of spring practice.

The seven who will report for the opening of drills on September 1 include Adolph Isom. 6-4, 205, a split end or a defensive halfback; Harry Alford, 6-1, 220, an offensive end; Richard Young, 6-0, 230, an offensive guard; and defensive tackles Bill Majewski. 6-2, 230; Joe Meyers, 6-2, 235; Dave Salmons, 6-4, 240; and Mike McClish, 6-5, 265.

Obviously, the emphasis of the junior college recruiting for immediate help centered on defensive linemen. Competition will be keen in the battle for first team positions.

The kicking game figures to be strong with James Johnson handling the kickoff chores, Dan Crooks, the extra points, and Bob Schaffner, a senior, and David Billy, a junior, the punting.

The pieces are there for Coach John Coatta and his staff to fit together into a successful season.

HARLAND CARL

Assistant Coach - Third Season Offensive Backfield

Harland Carl, who coaches the offensive backfield under head coach John Coatta, was a star University of Wisconsin halfback during the 1951, 1952, and 1953

seasons and a highly successful high school football coach at

Neenah, Wis.

Carl, a native of Greenwood, Wis., coached at Neenah High School from 1958 through 1966, first serving as an assistant to the late Marlon Batterman. In 1963 he became head football coach and accumulated four straight Mid-Eastern Conference titles with an overall 27-3-2 rec-

He was named to the Wisconsin football staff in the summer of 1966 following the naming of



offensive backfield coach Fred Jacoby as the first Wisconsin State University Conference Commissioner.

Carl was an exciting runner during his collegiate career-which was hampered by injury-and played a key role in Wisconsin's 1952 Big Ten co-championship season. He was the second leading ground gainer with 414 yards in 56 carries—7.4 yards per attempt—caught 12 passes for 214 yards and he tallied seven touchdowns, including three in the season's opener against Marquette.

His 1953 senior year was highlighted by scoring the winning touchdown against Iowa in a 10-6 decision on a 38-yard scoring pass from Jim Miller, and scoring the go-ahead tally in the 34-7 victory over unbeaten Illinois on a 41 yard second period run.

Harland also earned "W" awards as a sprinter in track in 1952 and 1953. He obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in Education in 1954, and his Master's degree in 1958. He is married with four children.

LES RITCHERSON

Assistant Coach - Third Season Offensive Ends - Flankers

Les Ritcherson, before joining the staff at Wisconsin in February 1966 as coach of offensive ends and flankers, enjoyed much success as head football coach

at Moore High School in Waco, Texas. He accumulated a 16-year coaching record of 132 wins, 38 defeats and three ties at Moore High School for a winning percentage of .763. He guided his squads to the state title game five times-winning the title outright twice.

Ritcherson played football at Wiley College and attained All-American mention in 1945 as an end and fullback. He graduated from Wiley College with an A.B. degree in education in 1947 and an M.A.. in guidance from Prairie View A & M in 1960.

Ritcherson is a native of Waco, Texas, being born there on April 21, 1926, and he graduated from Moore High School in 1943. He returned there as head football coach in 1950 to compile his distinguished record.

He is married and has two sons, Lewis, 20, who is a junior quarterback on the 1968 Badger squad, and Roderick.

GENE FELKER

Assistant Coach - Second Season Offensive Linemen

Gene Felker is a native of Milwaukee, playing his prep football at North High School. He enrolled at Wisconsin in September 1948 and became a vital member of the 1949, 1950, and

1951 Badger teams that won 18 games, lost 7, and tied 2.

He excelled offensively and defensively as an end and led Badger receivers with 23 catches for 266 yards and one touchdown in his junior year of 1950.


Badger fans recall his "all-out" defensive effort against Ohio State at Columbus in 1950, during which he tossed All-American Vic Janowicz for 27 yards in losses even though the Buckeyes rallied to win, 19-14.

Following his Wisconsin career, Gene played in the East-West Shrine game; played professionally with the Dallas Texans; coached service football at Ft. Eustis, Va.—an experience that spawned his coaching career—then spent four years at Drake, six at Arizona State, and two years at Oregon State before accepting the call in December 1966 to return to Wisconsin, where he joins former teammates Harland Carl and Head Coach John Coatta.

Coatta was the Badgers' quarterback in 1950-as he had been in 1949 and was also in 1951—and he and Felker teamed up on a 57-yard pass and run play against Northwestern in Camp Randall for a touch-down that resulted in a 14-13 Wisconsin victory.

Gene, who is married and has a daughter, was born March 4, 1929.




Assistant Coach — Third Season Defensive Ends — Linebackers

Assistant Coach — Second Season Defensive Secondary

Kirk Mee, before joining John Coatta's football coaching staff, was an highly successful head football coach at Defiance College in

Ohio.

Mee, 28, guided his Yellowjackets to an undefeated 9-0 record in 1966, winning the Mid-Ohio Conference championship. His team's performance earned Mee Ohio's NAIA Coach-of-the-Year award in 1966.

Defiance paced all NAIA college football teams in total defense and rushing defense and was ranked 10th in the final NAIA poll is 1966 as it emerged as the only unbeaten college team in Ohio and one of seven

in the nation. Mee served as an assistant at that school for one year before moving up to the head coaching position in 1964 where he stayed for the next three years. Defiance had had just three winning seasons in football from 1954 through 1966, and Mee accomplished the feat twice. His 1964 squad won four and lost four, while the 1965 team won five and lost four. Along with the 9-0 mark in 1966, Mee's three-year record numbered 18 wins and 8 defeats.

Mee is a native of Darrtown, Ohio and graduated from Talwanda High School in Oxford, Ohio in 1957. He attended Wilmington College and played offensive halfback and defensive end while in college, attaining All-Mid-Ohio Conference honors his senior year.

He graduated from Wilmington in 1961 with a B.A. degree in Industrial and Physical Education and received his Master's degree in Education and Guidance from Ohio University in 1963. He served as a graduate football assistant coach while at Ohio University.

Mee also was the head baseball coach at Defiance accumulating a 38-12 record including the Mid-Ohio

FRED MARSH

Assistant Coach - 19th Season Defensive Linemen and Recruiting Co-ordinator

Wisconsin freshman teams have been undefeated during 1966 and 1967 playing two game schedules under Big Ten rules allowing freshmen competition on a limited basis.

Synthetic Grass for Camp Randall

Wisconsin will become the first Big Ten school to play its home football games on outdoor synthetic grass during the 1968 season.

Base preparation of the synthetic playing surface began July 25 and plans are for completion by mid-September.

The \$210,000 project is being funded by the University's Parking and Transportation Board in exchange for Badger practice fields that will be turned into an approximate 500-car parking area north of Camp Randall Stadium.


Three New Head Coaches

#### BADGER BIG TEN NOTES

The Badgers finished third in the conference and the team's fine 11-5 record was Wisconsin's best since the 1954 team won 10 and lost 3.

The hard-hitting Badgers posted a team batting average of .288—secondbest in the Big Ten—and finished first in triples (6), stolen bases (24) and

team slugging percentage (.410).

Geoff Baillie finished third in the conference batting race with a .400 average—the 10th Badger in 29 years to hit .400 in the Big Ten. Mike Setzer. who needed seven more at-bats to qualify for the batting title, hit a cool .565 and ranked second in slugging percentage at .739. Tom Johnson ranked 10th among conference batters, with a .357 average and he tied a Big Ten record on May 24 by blasting two triples in one game. Tom Schinke batted .263 in the conference but tied for the lead in runs (15), triples (2) and home runs (4). R. D. Boschulte batted .311 in conference play and finished ninth in slugging percentage at .533.

Other conference batting averages for Badger regulars were Gary Wald, 300; Bruce Erickson, 255; Ed Chartraw, 231; and Jim Trebbin, .100.

Senior righthander Lance Primis led conference pitchers in complete

games (5), wins (5) and innings pitched (37). He ranked third in strikeouts with 37, which, coincidentally, is the number he wore on his road uniform.


Junior southpaw Mike Nickels, 2-0 in conference action, compiled a fine 0.89 earned-run average—fourth among conference starters. Co-captain






